Things to Remember —

1. The mission of the fair is to encourage better agriculture, horticulture, stock raising and all relative industries. It induces men to think and urges them to put forth better efforts for the purposes of all phases of agriculture. It is the place to demonstrate the results of years of integrity and experience.

2. That the fair is not run for profit. All money taken in at the fair will be paid out in fair expenses, fair premiums, and fair improvements.

3. That the fair is what you make it. Will you help us make it a success?

4. That the fair tends to increase the values of livestock, agricultural products and real estate in this surrounding territory.

5. That the superintendents of the different departments will be glad to furnish you with any information desired and assist you whenever possible.

6. That the fair tends to promote friendly rivalry and bring greater unity, strength and friendliness to our community. It is an annual meeting place of friends and tends to formulate more and better acquaintances.

7. That you should attend the fair, be a promoter and encourage all exhibitors and those who are trying to make the fair a success.

8. That you should study the premium list carefully and enter your exhibits under the proper departments and classes.

9. That the decision of the judges shall be final except in the case of fraud or protest.

10. That this is one of the largest strictly Agriculture Fairs in Eastern Kansas and with your help and assistance will continue to do so.

11. That all officers, fair officials and superintendents serve without pay, and your cooperation will be highly appreciated.

12. NO CANDY TO BE THROWN. WALK ALONG THE VEHICLE.

Rules and Regulations —

1. All entries except horses shall be made between 1 pm and 7 pm the first day.

2. The superintendent shall issue a card for each entry, containing the number, class and lot; a duplicate of which shall be attached to the article displayed.

3. Judges shall award premiums according to the merit of the articles and in no case shall premiums be paid in excess of the printed list. In case of no competition, only one premium may be awarded and shall be decided by the judge on the merit of the article over his signature.

4. The exhibitor will give personal attention to the article displayed when necessary and will take charge of the article at the close of the exhibition.

5. Entries shall not be removed until 4:00 pm of the last day of the exhibition, and no premiums will be awarded on articles removed otherwise. Not responsible for articles after 5:00 pm of the last day.

6. All possible care will be taken of exhibits, but the association will, in no case, be responsible for loss or damage sustained.

7. No cash premiums will be paid on any article not listed in this book, unless admitted by the superintendent.

8. Two entries made by the same person shall be considered competition unless other entries are made for the same premium.

9. Superintendents finding exhibits erroneously entered shall have the right to make proper re-entry, provided the class shall not have gone to the judges.

10. Judging will begin on all classes except horses, at 8:00 am on the second day of the fair.

11. Premium money will be distributed by individual department heads as entries are picked up beginning at 4:00 pm on Saturday. Premium money not collected by exhibitors will become the property of the Fair Association after 5:00 pm Saturday.

The top edge of the photo must be 1-inch down from the top of the photo matte. Sides of the enlargement photo should be equal distance from the edges of the photo matte. Remove white border from enlargement prints. A permanent mount should be made by using photographic adhesive.

No lettering permitted on the front of the photo matte or picture. On back of photo matte write name, address, location where photo was taken.
 Photos must be exhibited in 2 gallon plastic bag.

5. Photographs taken with a digital camera and having no more adjustments than exposure, color intensity, or correction, red eye removal, cropping, dodging and burning should be entered In the standard color or black & white classes.

6. Monochromatic prints including sepia prints are considered color photos and must be entered in correct color class.

7. Digital images with objects added or removed, filter effects applied or black & white and color combined must be entered in the class for Computer Manipulated Photo class.

8. Computer manipulated photos must be done from an original taken by the exhibitor. Exhibitor must include a second 11x12 ¹/₂-inch matte board mounted with standard size print or prints (if more than one photo was used) of the original photo(s) and a 3x5 index card explaining the manipulation. 3. Baked food items should be exhibited on foil covered cardboard cut to the size of the exhibit and covered with food grade plastic wrap or in a plastic bag.

4. Food entries must comply with guidelines found in K-State Research & Extension publication: 4-H 712, *Food Safety Recommendations for Acceptable Fair Exhibits*, and Georgia State Extension publication: *So Easy to Preserve*, or *Ball Blue Book of Preserving (2003)*. Food not meeting safety standards will not be judged.

5. Recipe card required for all food exhibits. Label the bottom of the plate with exhibitor's name.

6. Entire product must be exhibited. Unfrosted cakes should be exhibited with crust showing, bundt cakes should have top crust down.

7. Recipe box/notebook exhibit – Juniors need 10 recipes; Intermediates need 20 recipes; Seniors need 30 recipes.

8. Food Gift Boxes can not contain any alcoholic beverages. A food gift box must contain at least 3 different food items prepared for **human consumption**, made by the 4-Her, in a suitable container no larger than 18" x 18" x 18". Additional food items can be added. Recipes must be on all prepared food items. On a recipe card, answer the following questions: a) what is the intended use; and b)what food safety precautions were taken during and after preparation.

9. Food flop exhibit -4-Hers need to write a short note explaining to the judge what caused the food product to flop and share solutions for the failed food product. Ribbon placings how well the 4-Her understands the reason for the poor quality food product.

10. Food preservation exhibits – exhibit size is one jar of Sweet Spreads or Syrups; Fruits, Juices, Low Acid Vegetables, Pickles, Relishes, Tomato/tomato products. Processing times must follow USDA's Complete Guide to Home Canning, or Georgia State Extension's So Easy to Preserve. Open kettle food products are not accepted. Jars must be sealed when entered. Sweet Spreads must be in half pint or pint jars. Pickles and sweet spreads **must** be processed in a water bath process; low acid products **must** be pressure canned properly for altitude of the residence; tomato products requiring acid should be real lemon juice or citric acid.

11. Dried foods should be exhibited in a canning jar; food exhibit should be 1/3 to 1/2 cup, or 4 pieces. Recipe and process must be written on recipe card. Jerky not heated to 160 degrees F will not be judged.

Educational exhibits can be a poster (22" x 28" maximum), notebook, or display(2' x 3' tri-fold display board). Follow copyright laws explained in General Rules. Note: a collection of favorite recipes is NOT an educational exhibit.

Plexiglas covers required and must be removable from top. Screws, locks, or other devices preventing judges from removing Plexiglas cover should not be used. All Plexiglas covers must slide out of the top.

2. Exhibitors are to identify each display box by placing a gummed label (from Extension Office) with name, county and number of specimens in the upper left hand corner of the Plexiglas cover (inside use clear double-sided tape to adhere gummed labels) and by attaching a gummed label with the same information on the lower-right corner of the box (outside). 3. Geology specimens should be labeled with the specimen number, date collected, specimen name or description and locality (county) where collected.

4. Classes 1-7, specimens should be mounted in the box by proper groups – rocks, minerals and fossils. These specimens must be collected from locations in Kansas. Out-of-state specimens will not count in the minimum number for the class, nor will they be considering in judging.

5. Classes 1-7, each specimen must be properly labeled:

a. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum, Class and Genus level. More thanone specimen the same genus of a fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents different geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction; Composite Brachiopod from Morrill Limestone not just Brachiopod. Typed labels are best.

b. Rocks must be labeled with the name of rock type, formation, and the name of the rock.

c. Minerals must be labeled with type of mineral and name of specimen. 7. No mechanically polished or tumbled rocks are to be included in any class other than classes 8 and 9.

7. Display of at least 60 different rocks, minerals, or fossils, at least 5 of each. **Fifteen new specimens must be collected during the current year.** Exhibitors limited to two exhibit boxes. List the rocks as igneous, metamorphic, or sedimentary.

8. Educational exhibit relating to project work. Exhibit relating geology to everyday living or to a mineral test, a rock formation, geological history, one kind of rock or Indian artifacts. Exhibit limited to 4' table space or no more than 2 exhibit boxes with Plexiglas covers.

9. Display at least 30 stones and minerals that will cut or polish. Five specimens must be collected by the member from a native site (not limited to Kansas). Polish 15 of the gemstones by tumbling. Label giving identification of material and county where collected, or state or country of origin for non-Kansas material.

3. Name, county, age and year in project should be in a prominent location on the exhibit.

4. Display or poster must not exceed 22"x 28". Maximum size for trifold display is 2'x3'.

CLASS 4-H Q - 4-H ENTOMOLOGY Prizes: 1st - \$1.25 • 2nd - \$1.00 • 3rd - \$.75

1. Exhibits are to be placed in Plexiglas covered wooden boxes 18x24x3 1/2". Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise. 2. Exhibitor must identify boxes by placing an identification label available at the Extension Office with name, county, and class. One label goes in the upper left corner of the box (on the inside) and the other goes on the lower right corner of the box (outside).

3. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on the exhibitor's box identification label.

4. Arrangement of specimens: The preferred method is to arrange the insects in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box (see illustrations in 4H 829). Specimens are to be arranged in the box according to Order. Begin with the more primitive orders first (Collembola) and follow the sequence used in Insects in Kansas, as revised in 2000. 5. For each collection class, two labels will be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. The common name label is closest to the specimen and the second label has the date/locality

6. Emphasis in judging will be placed on the overall variety of Kansas insects represented in the collection, accuracy of identification, skill and technique acquired in mounting of specimens, and overall arrangement and appearance of the collection.

CLASS 4-H Q - 4-H ENTOMOLOGY continued

7. Specimens of soft bodied insects such as aphids, lice, collembolan, termites etc. should be exhibited in alcohol filled vials.

8. Educational Class. Label to include exhibitor's name, county and class. Displays may consist of specialized groups of insects, or relate to any aspect of insect life. Displays should be presented in a clear, concise, and interesting manner.

9. Educational classes are limited to one standard box, a maximum of 150 specimens and work performed during the current year. Title of the exhibit should be indicated inside the box.

1. Junior/Intermediate Collection. Display in one standard box a minimum of 50 and maximum of 125 species representing at least 7 orders. Follow the general rules listed for all collections. Specimens should be grouped according to order with the order labels pinned to the base of the box. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon at the KansasState Fair, whichever comes first.

2. Junior Educational Exhibit. Follow rule 8.

3. Intermediate Collection. Display in one standard box a minimum of 75 and a maximum of 150 species representing at least 9 orders. Follow instructions listed for all collections in general rules 1-7 above. Specimens should be grouped according to order with the order labels pinned to the base of the box. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first.

4. Intermediate Collection. Display a minimum of 100 and a maximum of 300 insects representing at least 10 orders. Two standard boxes can be used. All specimens should be grouped to order. In addition, family identification is required for all insects in any **two** of the following six orders: Orthoptera, Hemiptera, Homoptera, Coleoptera, Diptera, and/or Hymenoptera. Observe that the number of families identified in these two orders must be recorded on the box identification labels. Families represent subdivisions of order grouping, with family labels pinned to the bottom of the box to represent subdivisions ofhe appropriate order. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years.

5. Intermediate Educational Exhibit. Follow rule 8.

6. Senior Collection. Display a minimum of 150 and a maximum of 450 insects representing at least 12 orders. Three standard boxes may be used. Family identification is required for all insects belonging to the six basic orders as outlined under the intermediate phase. Family identification of insects in the remaining orders is optional, but desirable as long as accuracy is maintained. All butterflies appearing in the collection should be labeled with the correct common name

7. Senior Educational Exhibit. Follow rule 8.

1. **Junior exhibit**: a minimum of 10 different leaves from Native Kansas trees collected within the year. Exhibit may include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from Kansas Native trees. Front cover should include: name, club, age and number of years in project.

2. Junior exhibit: a minimum of 5 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected.

3. **Intermediate exhibit**: a minimum of 20 different leaves (including 10 new specimens) from Kansas trees. Exhibit may include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas Trees.

4. **Intermediate exhibit:** with a minimum of 10 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 5 new Leaf, twig, and fruit specimens.

5. **Senior exhibit**: a minimum of 30 different leaves (including 10 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. Exhibit may include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees

6. **Senior exhibit:** with a minimum of 15 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 5 new leaf, wig, and fruit specimens.

7. Advanced exhibit: with a minimum of 40 different leaves (including 20 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. Exhibit may include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees.

8. Advanced exhibit: with a minimum of 20 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 10 new leaf, twig, and fruit specimens.

How a Tree Grows

9. Display required project notebook with 10 or more seeds collected with pictures showing germination study or a mounting of a thin section of wood cut from the end of a log or top of stump labeled with information such as kind of wood, age of tree, when cut or exhibits an illustration of how a tree grows.

1.Judging of 4-H Horses will begin at 10:00 am on Saturday. The Horse shows, both Open Class and 4-H will be held at the Kincaid Ball Park, south of Highway 31.

2.4-H horse dress code will be observed.

3. A properly executed identification certificate identifying the horse the 4-H member will exhibit or ride must be presented to officials at the time of check-in.

4. All horses should be accompanied by a negative EIA (coggins test, issued within 12 months of exhibit). This should be made available to officials at check-in or upon request.

5.All classes will be held in accordance with the Kansas 4-H Horse Show Rule Book.

6.If there are less than 3 participants in a performance class, the judging may be combined with other age groups at the judge's discretion. Participants will still receive individual class awards.
