
Dear campers,

Do you miss your family?


Not much, but they are coming to see me after I leave camp. . . .





## THE INSULIN PUMP

The insulin pump is a machine to help diabetics control their blood sugar better. There are many different types of insulin pumps. The Auto Syringe is a box that is five inches long and three inches wide. It weighs about one pound.

The Auto Syringe has a basal rate that works continuously all day long. Basal rate is an amount of insulin the pump gives you over 24 hours. So if one's basal rate is 26, that means you get 26 units over a 24hour period.

The pump has a sound that can be shut off or on. When you hear the sound it means the pump is injecting insulin.

The Auto Syringe also has a bolus which means every time before you eat a snack or a main meal you keep in a certain amount of insulin.

The pump is connected to your body through a needle about three quarters of an inch long. It is put into your skin or fat like a butterfly needle. The needle has a tube that is 24 inches or 42 inches long that goes to the pump where it connects to a 3cc syringe which is positioned a certain way inside the box.

The pump is worn at all times; day and night. The only time it is taken out is to go swimming, to take a shower or just to switch the position. The position of the needle is switched every 2 to 3 days.

The pump stays on the hip like a Sony Walkman. It is comfortable except when you have to get used to it or try to sleep. It is a very good way to control your diabetes if you are out of control.



## THE INTERNATIONAL DAY DANCE

The dance on July 3rd was held to celebrate International Day. Too bad it was so hot in the dining hall. We all liked it when we got soda and popcorn. Some CBC s campers got nervous when a EPJ guy asked them to dance. Some even said NO! All of the international decorations were great. Some of the countries represented were Ireland, Greece, Italy, Japan, Switzerland, and the good 'ole U.S.A. At first, people really didn't understand what the piñata was for. But, when Meg started to lower it on a rope, everyone figured it out. The kids really got excited. Everybody was shouting "OLE" when each camper swung at the pinada with a bat. After it finally broke, each camper got one piece of gum, if they weren't greedy. Some people wore international costumes. Some of the staff and CITs got dressed up. People sat on the porch and walked in and out at all times. We had lots of fun!





MIKRAKI
