Don't Get "Ticked Off"

assy is a very sweet sevenyear old sable and white collie who was rescued by a neighbor when her owner died. The neighbor contacted NEOCR to see if we could help with placing Sassy in a good home since her landlord would not let her keep Sassy but said she could have a couple weeks to find her a home. The neighbor took her to the vet and got her examined and her shots updated and insisted on paying for those expenses.

Judy Lester, our Adoptions Coordinator, had an application from some folks wanting an adult, female collie so she contacted them. Since we weren't sure if Sassy was spayed and Sassy needed a dental cleaning, we asked the family (the Wilsons) if they would consider fostering her with intent to adopt and get her totally checked out, spayed if needed and her teeth cleaned prior to the actual adoption. They agreed.

We picked up Sassy from the kind neighbor and transported her to meet the Wilsons. Sassy seemed happy to meet them and their small mixed breed puppy, and all was supposedly well... but not quite.

Sassy was limping slightly on one back leg, but when she went to the vet she was limping on her one of her front legs. We requested pre-surgical blood work for Sassy. It appeared her levels were not good for BUN, Creatinine, and albumin, all being pretty far out of the normal range.

On the second visit, the vet noticed that Sassy was limping on the other front leg and recommended a test for Lyme disease. He knew that Lyme disease in dogs may cause lameness that moves from leg to leg. He was correct. Sassy tested positive for Lyme disease.

Lyme disease in dogs is different than in people. It can go for years with no symptoms. After being bitten by a tick that transmits Borrelia burgdorferi spirochetes, a dog may or may not become ill. However, when illness does occur weeks or months after the infection, arthritis signs are noticed and there may be a fever. Heart and neurological issues are rare but can occur. Usually dogs respond to a course of proper antibiotics (doxycycline, amoxicillin) and are fine.



Glomerular disease is the most serious long term problem that can occur in dogs with Lyme disease. This type of kidney damage occurs when the immune system is stimulated over a very long time by a latent infectious organism (or other immune stimulus). This results in the dog losing inappropriate amounts of protein through their urine. This happens because the on-going inflammation causes "holes" in the kidney's microscopic filtration system allowing protein molecules to *Continued on page 3...*

escape and not be returned to the body.

The primary vector of Lyme disease in the U.S. is the deer tick. Ohio is not typically listed is a high risk area, but the veterinarians I spoke to said that more and more cases are being seen. It's important to note that Sassy was an indoor dog, living in the city. Don't think your dog isn't at risk just because it isn't a "country" dog.

The female tick lays 2,000 eggs in the spring, the larva hatch, and attach to a host such as a mouse. If the mouse is carrying the Lyme disease spirochete, the larva becomes infected. When the larva is full of blood it will drop off and lay dormant until the following spring. Then the larva molts into a "nymph" that attaches to larger animals such as dogs, deer, etc. They mature into adults and mate and feed on the host's blood. It takes 48 hours for the Lyme spirochete to be brought up from the tick's gut to the mouthparts so the key is to kill the tick before that happens.

The three stages of the deer tick include the larva (bottom right), nymph (bottom left), and adult female (top). Hence, tick control medicines are effective

when properly administered. There are many effective products including Preventic[®] collar, Advantix[®], Frontline[®], Vectra 3D[®], and Promeris Canine[®]. All of these will either kill the tick or cause it to drop off prior to the 48 hours necessary for the spirochete to infect the dog.

Veterinarians can test for Lyme disease. There is an immunological test for antibody against the "C6 peptide" — which is unique to Borrelia burgdorferi, and dogs vaccinated for this strain won't erroneously test positive. It is simple and usually available as an in-house test kit run in most veterinary hospitals with results available in about 10 minutes. However, it does not address distinguishing active infection from exposure.

Types of Vaccines

There are three types of vaccines available, but vaccinating remains controversial.

The cons include:

- About 90% of infected dogs will never get sick
- 5-10% that get sick can be easily and inexpensively treated.
- It is possible the same antigens involved in the immune stimulation that caused the kidney disease are in the vaccine.
- It is easily prevented by keeping dogs on tick control products.

The pros include:

- We vaccinate ourselves to prevent the flu so why not vaccinate our dogs to prevent the disease?
- We don't want our dogs to be a reservoir for the Lyme spirochete and a potential source of human infection.
- We don't really know what spirochete antigens are implicated in this condition; the recombinant vaccine exposes the patient to only one spirochete and prevents the introduction of the spirochete into the dog's body.

Back to Sassy — her blood work will be rechecked after she has been on the medicine for a while, and we will hopefully see some improvement. But, there are no guarantees, so Sassy may or may not pull through. We remain hopeful that she doesn't have severe kidney damage, and she seems to be improving.

We thank the Wilson's for dealing with this situation. Eryn said in an e-mail (paraphrased) that "Sassy keeps her going as much as she keeps Sassy going; they help each other." So we are all hoping for a happy ending to this story.

On a side note — We have multiple dogs at our home, and we don't seem to have a flea or tick problem in our yard. Typically, we don't use the products mentioned because we hate to give collies chemicals/drugs if they really don't need them. But we are definitely rethinking this position and will be treating our dogs because we take the dogs on walks where they could be exposed to ticks. We will also be speaking to the vet regarding testing our dogs for Lyme disease.




this dog to fit herself into and lie down—often on her back, with her legs in the air.

Branwen


