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Marley and Dakota — An Adoption Story - By Susan Skowronski

The original owner of collies Marley (a female white factor) and Dakota (a male tri) transitioned into a nursing home leaving the two dogs at their home for a lengthy period of time, mostly alone. The owner's caretaker and caretaker's family visited the dogs to feed them and provide playtime. For the majority of hours in a day, the dogs were left without companionship behind a high fence that made them non-visible to passers-by at the neglected property. At the time of pickup, the property was weed infested and the grass was overgrown.

Neglected and mostly alone, the dogs were void of vet care and their fur became severely matted and overgrown. An internet map view of the property detailed a bald path worn by the dogs around the circumference of their lot where they mostly likely paced to combat boredom and loneliness.

Pam Demko from NorthEast Ohio Collie Rescue was contacted by the caretaker's daughter and worked patiently with her for several weeks to collect details and determine arrangements for intake of the two dogs. Pam, along with Leon Skowronski, met with Shari Somogyi to pick up the dogs and transport them to the vet for evaluation and follow-up.

The vet determined Marley to be approximately six years old and Dakota two-three years older. Dakota was suffering from significant dental deformities that later led to extraction of three teeth. Shari and Frank Somogyi, former owners and lovers of collies, were happy to be contacted to foster the dogs as the last of their collie family had passed away several months earlier.



Shari immediately began devoting great care and attention to her new fosters. She shaved their matted fur and crafted coats for sun protection to cover bald spots when the dogs were outside. Dakota, at time of pickup, exhibited limited mobility. Shari and Pam discovered that the fur on his

Meeting Minutes 2/18/18

The meeting was called to order by President Tom Hoadley at 1:15 p.m. Everyone at the meeting introduced themselves as there were 27 people in attendance. Some people who were not there had contacted Tom expressing interest in the organization.

The minutes of the last meeting were read. Betty Hodgson corrected the minutes by stating that Christine Vrooman was Adoption Coordinator and not Intake Coordinator.

The fourth quarter and yearly treasury report were read and accepted.

Betty talked about fostering some dogs for a couple of months. The people do want their dogs back for various reasons. There are currently no dogs available for adoption. Since 2001, over 300 dogs have been fostered. The NEOCR list that Betty maintains began in January of 2007; it shows 279 intakes and 221 placements since that time.

Nomination and elections were held for offices.

- Pam Demko, Roseanne Cyngier, and Karen Longo were elected as Board Members.

Sign up sheets were put out asking for people to volunteer for various positions.

There was a discussion about Petfinder having free listings. It was stated on our web page when you clicked on the Petfinder link it went nowhere. Lunar pages handles our current website. There was discussion on possibly changing our web provider to GoDaddy. Marian will check on website pricing.

Tom said the event committee will ask people about upcoming events. It was also stated that we do not place dogs at events. We have no formal limit on adopting dogs.

We will take a dog back if the owner is no longer able to care for it. One of a Kind Pet Rescue vet usually does our spaying and neutering in Akron. We do not microchip dogs at this time. NEOCR currently does not have a home check form. We have used forms from other groups.

The Winery at Wolf Creek — every Tuesday, you can bring to the patio May-October. May 5, Saturday, is Pet-tacular at 313 Medina Road in Medina. June 9 and 10 is Lake Farm park. The NorthEast Ohio Collie Rescue picnic is September 16. We currently do not have any date for the Tremont Tap House.

Ohio State has an event to get exposure for rescue groups. Benefit Wines could be another possible source of income. It as stated that we could possible do a dog wash to generate income in July. Also Thirty-One products could be used as a fund-raiser. CafePress has printed our calendars in the past however, the project doesn't provide much income.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:15 p.m. Next meeting will be June 10, 2018.

Meeting Minutes 6/10/18

The meeting was called to order at 1:20 p.m. at the North Royalton branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library. In attendance were Tom Hoadley, Betty Hodgson, Joanne Dugan, Roseann Cyngier, Leon Skowronski, Susan Skowronski, Mark Demko, Pam Demko and Jennifer Bortner, as well as two guests, interested adopters Jim and Barb Sherwood.

In the absence of the Secretary/Treasurer, review of the minutes of the April meeting, as well as the current financial status, was dispensed with (see Treasurer's Report for update).

Coordinator reports were presented.

Intake — Pam Demko reported on the status of her ongoing efforts to secure two dogs from an elderly owner in Brunswick who faces foreclosure as well as a move to

assisted-living. Pam was optimistic that this situation would be resolved soon.

Fosters — Betty Hodgson updated the status of Ellie Mae, our only currently adoptable dog, and the behavioral issues that limit potential homes for her.

Tom Hoadley discussed our current senior fosters, Cosmo and Pumpkin. Cosmo has neurological issues and continues to decline, but still has a good appetite and attitude, even with impaired mobility. Pumpkin continues to adjust to "life in the pack," but her extreme shyness as well as her age probably makes her unadoptable.

Adoptions — Susan Skowronski briefed the board on current potential adopters and their status.

In the absence of the respective coordinators, no reports were received regarding the newsletter, website, social media or membership.

Colleena

About ten years ago, we adopted two-year-old "Lena" whom we called Colleena, a mostly black tri-colored collie. In October 2017, our beloved Colleena passed away. We were fortunate to have her for ten years after she was rescued as a young dog.

Clearly, she was the most gentle and smartest collie we have had, and we have had several wonderful sheep dogs of one kind or another for more than forty years. I have often thought this, but Colleena proved it nearly every day, dogs have a wide and wonderful ability for empathy. In fact, Colleena used stuffed dog-toy farm animals for clear patterns of empathetic play. (Something I have not ever read or heard of about dogs.)

The first few years we had her, she set up whole farm scenes, with toys lined up for milking times, then spread them randomly in the living room "pasture." Later in her life with us, who have no farm, doggie day care scenarios appeared in the same way a young child might create sequences and characters in imaginary play.

On the day we took her to the vet, knowing it was for the last time, we searched the house for her favorite lamb toy, to take that along with her because she always kept it close in thunderstorms and scary times. We couldn't find it that day. She usually kept it tucked between the dog-bed edge and the pillow, so the toy and the dog could keep watch on one another all night. But it wasn't there that day.

A week later, the toy showed up in a place it had never been, tucked between the mattress and the springs of our bed, so it would be close to Tom, in the same way she had always kept it close to her. She will be hard to replace with just any new dog. So we are choosing to wait a while before we decide on another dog.

We have appreciated this beautiful member of our family for this last decade. Thank you again and again.

- A rescue story as told by Dakota

"You will never want for anything," this two-legs whispered in my ear. I didn't understand the words, but I understood the tone. It was full of compassion, like her touch. I licked her face and gave her my ragged matted paw. She looked me in my eyes, and I looked back into hers.

Does she see I am tired? So very tired. Does she know I hurt? My fur hangs off me in tangled, dirt-filled mats. I can't move my head anymore. I can't walk because my mats pull and pinch at every step. I am so thirsty. My teeth hurt me.

I do not know these two-legs that came and took me away from that place. It used to be safe there. I was loved, once. But something happened to my first two-legs. She became forgetful of her pack of three: the girl, the mean one and me. She didn't notice our water was green and vile. She didn't feed us carefully, so we fought for every kibble. She didn't take us to the brush place to get us clean and pretty anymore. She forgot how to take care of us. It's not her fault; we know that there was something wrong with her. It has been a long time since I have been happy.

These rescuers are kind and gentle and yet seem to be in shock as well. But they told us that *today*, June 20, 2018, is our *birthday*...the first day of our new lives. Thank you for taking us home.





Cosmo's Return and Final Journey

February the 20 was an unseasonably sunny and mild day as Betty Hodgson and I set out for Burton, and the former home of NEOCR's long-time friend, **Ed Plottke**. Over the years NEOCR volunteers had kept in touch with Ed, who had adopted several dogs from us. As Ed's health declined, he asked Betty if NEOCR would be willing to take in his last dog, Cosmo, a 15+ year-old collie-border collie mix, adopted when still a puppy. Of course Betty said "Yes," and here we were, saddened by Ed's death, to pick up the "old man."

Cindy and I had agreed to welcome Cosmo into our pack, where he could get the love and care he needed as an old, senile, deaf dog with large fatty tumors. We figured he'd fit right in and, while he could be whiny and annoying at times, I never regretted that decision. You only had to look into his eyes to know that, senile or not, he hadn't lost any of his border collie brains nor (to the chagrin of our Pomeranian) his herding ability.

In the time since he came to live with us, Cosmo continued the slow decline of old age, finding it increasingly hard to get up on his own, and was a bit wobbly when helped up. Even so, he herded his way into my heart where he will remain, long after he left us to rejoin Ed.

We are deeply saddened to say that Cosmo went to his final rest on Thursday, October 4, while we were out of town. He left this world in the loving arms of Betty Hodgson; we'll not see his likes again.



We were touched and, to say the least, very grateful to learn that Ed, in recognition of his long-standing relationship with NEOCR, had named us as a beneficiary on his annuity and we were humbled to find that his generosity resulted in an infusion to our treasury of over \$ 20,000. It is my hope that much of this can be used, in Ed's memory, to assist older dogs whose needs may be increasing even as their caregiver's financial means may be declining. I think Ed would be gratified to be remembered by the existence of a "Cosmo Fund."





Lay your gentle soul to rest.
