Historian; Jake Delgaudio: "Blurbs Blog":

Greenwich, A Brief History Part II...This is the next installment about the town! This continues with the history of the underground railroad in Greenwich. And YES, I am getting a bit "long" with this but it is just so interesting I find I can't help myself. All historical information below is gathered from various internet sources, town historians, Wikipedia, and so forth.

Part III is next month when the saga continues! Picking up where we left off last month: Refer back to last month's edition

for a refresher if needed!

North of Union Village (what Greenwich used to be called), abolitionist fever was even hotter. The Eastern New York Antislavery Society, which was organized by Rev. Abel Brown, an Albany abolitionist, and whose president was Corliss, also included as a vice-president, Noadiah Moore of



known to have aided fugitive slaves. His involvement is reported in Frederick Seaver's *Historical Sketches of Franklin County* published in 1918, which cited several sources. One of them, Marshall Conant, was an ancestor of a Dr. Conant, an officer in the Eastern New York Anti-Slavery Society. He reported that, "Mr. Parkhurst was an ardent abolitionist, and many a runaway was harbored and fed at his home." An 1847 report of a Liberty Party meeting in Union Village (Greenwich) noted that Parkhurst and Noadiah Moore were among those attending.

Research indicated that Moore and the Keese family in Peru, NY, collaborated in the Underground Railroad. Below is the house of Keese family member Stephen Keese Smith.

Jabez Parkhurst, who lived in Franklin County next to Clinton, in the small village of Fort Covington, only a halfmile from the Canadian border, was



The Adirondacks were an alternate route. Though convenient to Canada, almost all of the fugitive slave communities there were located in western Ontario. This made central and western New York situated along Lake Ontario more likely destinations. As a result fugitive slaves which were sent from New York City to Albany were more often moved to Syracuse and other locations in Central New York

For further information check out the forgotten posthumous biography of the abolitionist Rev. Abel Brown in 1998. See <u>One Man's Journey</u>.

The book was a goldmine of information about the Underground Railroad in eastern and northern New York. Brown made several lectures tours into the Adirondacks, riding the packet boats on the Champlain Canal and sending fugitive slaves to the vicinity of Lake Champlain. On one occasion while on the Lake Champlain steamer, *Burlington*, he wrote: "Many a slave has enjoyed the

indescribable pleasure of leaping from the liberty-loving 'Burlington,' to feel the pleasure of being free under the protection of a Queen whose pleasure it is to make the lowest of her subjects happy."

He also collaborated with the radical abolitionist, Charles Torrey, in operating the Albany antislavery newspaper, *Tocsin of Liberty* (later renamed *Albany Patriot*), openly publishing accounts of its aid to fugitive slaves. The ad (right) is one example.

WOOLLEN PAIRS SOCKS WAN TEDI The Ex. Com. of the East. New York A. S. Society have made arrangements so that they can dispose of Woollen Socks, at seven and a half cents, for a good common acct. We hope our sisters in the country who know how to make them will furnish us 500 pairs within eight weeks. The proceeds of them will be applied to supply the Cor. Sec'ry. and Mr. Lewis Washington, the excellent colored lecturer, and to aid fugitive slaves. Let one and all send immediately to ABEL BROWN, Cor. Sec ry of the E. N. Y. A. S. Society Albany, Jan. 1st 1844. IF Will the Liberty Press and Country please insert, once or twice.



Both Brown and Torrey had died by 1845, and the operation of Albany's Underground Railroad had shifted its leadership to black conductor, Stephen Myers, who was aiding hundreds of fugitive slaves annually during the mid-1850s. The Albany Vigilance Committee Office, where Myers lived and worked for a time was discovered to be still extant and is now a museum operated by the UGR Workshop.

In Troy, just north of Albany on the other side of the Hudson River, where the Champlain Canal began, a dedicated group of abolitionists, both black and white operated the Underground Railroad. They also were connected with a small group of radical abolitionists in Sand Lake, NY, where Rev. Abel Brown was pastor of its Baptist Church for one year. From about 1838-to-1848, Henry Highland Garnet was pastor of Troy's Liberty Street Church and was regularly aiding fugitive slaves.

By 1850, the leader of the Troy Underground

Railroad was a black barber, William Rich. One of his associates was John H. Hooper, a cousin of **Harriet Tubman.** On April 27, 1860, Tubman was visiting Hooper when a uproar had been created by the arrest of Troy man, Charles Nalle, on the charge of being a fugitive slave. Nalle had originally fled to Sand Lake but moved to Troy after obtaining a job as a coachman for the wealthy businessman, Uri Gilbert. Of course, Tubman was not about to stay out of the fracas, and when Nalle was being taken out of the city jail in the custody of federal marshals, she led an hysterical mob in overpowering the marshals and freeing Charles.





The Nalle Rescue is an incredible and powerful story, and you can read all the dramatic details, as well as story of the life of Nalle leading up to, and after, his escape and rescue, in Scott Christianson's wonderful book: *Freeing Charles*. After the Civil War, Tubman settled in Auburn, NY, not far from Ithaca, where she often stopped along her rescue missions bringing fugitive slaves to Canada. Her destination there was the AME Zion Church, which has documented this association.




AME Zion Church, Ithaca (above)

Below Right is a map of the Central New York Underground Railroad sites, which Tubman and others could have accessed, created in 1903 by Elbert Wixom, a Cornell student. Wixom's family, who were Quakers, participated in the Underground Railroad. This map was based not only on family information but other persons still alive who participated or knew those who did, and whom Wixom interviewed.



In addition to Syracuse, which was probably the most active Underground Railroad location in upstate NY, Oswego, and Rochester became major Underground Railroad terminals, and the Niagara River, and ports like Pultneyville, where Captain Horatio Throop lived, important crossover points.

Perhaps the most renowned crossover point in New York State was the Suspension Bridge, just south of Niagara Falls, which Harriet Tubman is known to have used.

Safety Officer; Jake Delgaudio: "March 2017 Blurbs Blog"!

This is a great time to get your bike ready for the season ahead and an important part of that preparation is Motorcycle Brake Maintenance! Here

are some tips to keep your motorcycle at peak condition. NOTE: Some newer models HD require that service be done at the shop and you should not do anything to the brake system

yourself other then visual inspections. ANY doubt at all regarding your braking system, get your bike over to McDermott's HD!

Motorcycles accelerate fast and have a high top speed but it is your brakes that you depend on to stop you when you need it. Learning to perform your own motorcycle brake maintenance on your bike will keep your brakes in top condition.



Motorcycle Brake Maintenance

Brakes

Tip: Brake fluid absorbs moisture over time and becomes less effective. **Replace brake fluid every two years** (More often if you are a high-mileage rider and your brakes will perform the best they can.

Modern bike brakes have just an amazing stopping power, well beyond that of what the regular rider will encounter while riding.

Motorcycles have up to two brake fluid reservoirs, one for the front, usually found on the handlebars and one for the back. Both should be checked regularly. Topping up should only be done from a new, sealed bottle as brake fluid tends to absorb moisture over time (throw out those old bottles of old brake fluid and buy new). Be sure to consult your owner's manual as to the type of brake fluid your bike uses. If your brake pads are thin and due for replacement get over to McDermott's and get them tended to! Also, **Beware - brake fluid, if spilt on paintwork eats right through to the bare metal.**

Check the thickness of the brake pads. If you allow them to go right down to the metal your brake disc will be damaged resulting in an unnecessary and expensive replacement. Fitting braided steel brake lines will increase the performance of your brakes by roughly 50% if you want to go in that direction. If you need brake pads and do not perform this service task yourself, then simply have McDermott's HD do your pads & fluid replacement at the same time. This article is to make us aware of the importance of changing our brake fluid .

The Parts


How to Bleed Motorcycle Brakes

Tip: Any brake bleeding kit will do just fine but make sure you have a small bucket to put the tiny brake bleeder fluid container in as it is very likely to overflow.

It is actually not very hard to bleed (renew) your own motorcycle brake fluid. This should be done at least **every 2 years**. Or when the brake fluid turns from clear to a brown to black color (darker it is, the worse it is). When doing my own, I had water and floating "goop" in the cylinders...so these unsafe ingredients DO get into your cylinders and lines and do effect braking. Stacey and I lost our rear brakes coming down Mt Equinox one time on a chapter ride and this was the cause.

Note: Brake fluid will eat away at plastic and paint, be sure to cover any paint or plastic that may get splashed with brake fluid. Wipe any spilled fluid with the rag and lots of water.

Step 1: Make sure you have the tools to bleed your brake fluid. The tools you require will vary, based on your bike type but generally this is what you will need:



A. Wrench/Spanner (average 10mm)

B. Brake bleeding kit (rubber fitting, clear hose, small container)C. Brake fluid overflow container (to put the brake bleeding kit small container in)

D. Rags

E. Brake Fluid (check what type of brake fluid you need for your bike. e.g. DOT 3). Make sure to have enough brake fluid in the DOT type you require. (500ml should be more than enough).

Step 2: Attach the brake bleeding kit to the brake fluid nipple located on the brake caliper.

Step 3: Loosen the nipple so the fluid is free to flow down the brake bleeding kit tube and into the small container

Step 4: Remove the master cylinder cap (top) so you can monitor and refill more brake fluid into the master cylinder as you bleed the brakes.

Step 5. Pump the brake lever so the old/new brake fluid is forced through the tube into the brake bleeding kit fluid container

Step 6: Keep the volume of the master cylinder constant (near full) as to not have it empty. Keep pumping on the brake lever until the fluid coming out is clear (rather than the old brown/black colour).

Step 7: Once all the tiny air bubbles are gone hold pressure on the brake level and re-tighten the brake fluid nipple to close it off.

Step 8: Replace the master cylinder top cover. (inspect the rubber gasket/seal. If any doubt get to McDermott's and buy a replacement)

Step 9: Remove the brake bleeding kit from the caliper and use the rag with water to clean up any spillage.

Tip: When you remove the top lid off the brake cylinder, if you see any "floatie's" or debris, remove before pumping the fluid through the lines for removal. That way you do not risk clogging a brake line.

This fluid change should be part of your regular maintenance! If you are not comfortable doing this valuable service yourself, call McDermott's and make an appointment! Your safety depends on it!




