Avoiding Hazards on the Road

Whether you're a novice or a skilled motorcycle rider, there are going to be times when hazards on the road test your handling abilities. The best defense you have is the ability to react quickly and calmly to the hazards that appear in your path. Depending on whether you're riding in slick conditions like rain, snow or leaves or trying to avoid hazards in the road such as potholes, debris or uneven pavement, here are a few motorcycle riding safety tips that could help you react in ways that will keep you and your bike safe. A quick reminder to point out hazards and maintain the proper staggered.

Reduce your speed - A slippery surface will result in a longer stopping time. Slow down and pay close attention to changes in the driving surface.

Use both brakes - Your front brake is responsible for three-quarters of your braking ability. Apply the front brake slowly and consistently without locking the wheel. Apply the rear brake in the same manner. Try not to brake mid-corner and remember the risk of sliding increases with acceleration. Avoid sudden moves - On a slippery surface, sudden movements will be exaggerated and could cause you to lose balance. Gradual, deliberate movements will help keep the bike steady and help you avoid skidding.

Try to avoid the slickest areas - The center of the lane and intersections are where oil and other slippery substances tend to build up. To avoid these areas, ride where you're most likely to be seen AND avoid the hazard. Try to avoid the sides of the road where dirt and gravel collect and cause low-traction conditions.

When Debris or Hazards Appear in Your Path - There are times when hazards such as potholes, roadkill, or other objects seem to appear out of nowhere in the lane you're riding in. It is very important that you practice avoiding hazards and are able to react quickly and calmly when they do appear. Potholes are much more than an inconvenience that can damage your motorcycle. Even the most conscientious biker can be involved in an accident when encountering poor road conditions such as potholes. Hitting a pothole at even a low speed can cause significant damage to a tire rim or cause a motorcycle to go down. Accidents also can be caused by motorcyclist swerving to avoid a pothole.

If you have to ride over an object, uneven surfaces like potholes, broken pavement or railroad tracks, it is important that you:

- Slow down
- Hold onto the hand grips tightly.
- Keep a straight course.
- Rise up slightly on the foot pegs to absorb the shock.
- Try to cross the uneven surface at an angle

Once you have driven over an object or hazard in the road, it's a good idea to pull over and inspect your bike and tires for any damage. Chapter members have discovered bent rims. If you take the steps to identify and react quickly and calmly to the hazards that you could face on the road, you are in a much better position to come out of a potentially dangerous situation unscathed.

Be sure to get a picture by the historic Sturgis sign!

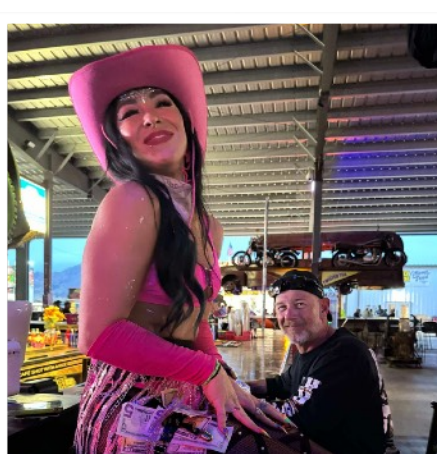


Concert Venues

Mount Rushmore

Mount Rushmore never gets old. Gutzon Borglum designed the Mount Rushmore National Memorial to embody the founding, expansion, preservation, and unification of the United States through the colossal likenesses of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, and Theodore Roosevelt.

Each year, over two million visitors from across the globe come to experience the grandeur of South Dakota's Black Hills and explore the nation's history and development. Mount Rushmore has evolved into a powerful symbol of American ideals, representing freedom and hope to people of all backgrounds.

The memorial and its surrounding landscape reflect the diverse cultures that contribute to America's heritage. A key part of the experience at Mount Rushmore is fostering an understanding and appreciation of our nation's history and the importance of preserving its legacy for future generations.



Devil's Tower

Devil's Tower, a must-see landmark in Wyoming, is a geological marvel that stands 1,267 feet tall above the surrounding landscape. Its origin is the subject of scientific debate, but it is generally agreed that around 65 million years ago, molten lava was forced into existing rock formations. Over millions of years, the lava cooled and eroded, creating this striking formation. The site holds sacred significance for the Lakota people and many other Plains Tribes. In 1906, President Theodore Roosevelt recognized its importance by designating it as the nation's first national monument.

At Devil's Tower, visitors often leave offerings as a sign of respect and reverence. These offerings typically include:

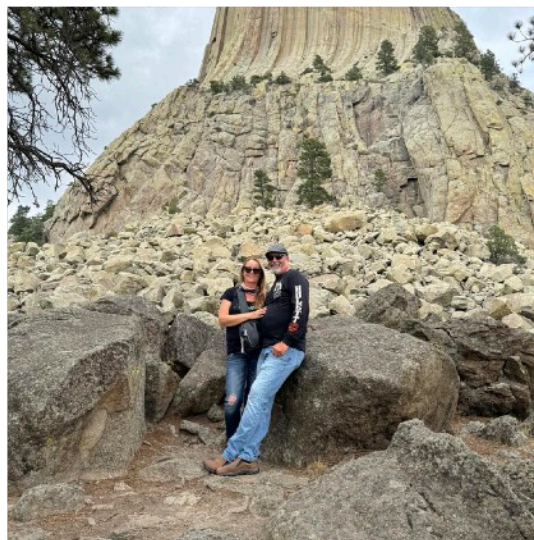
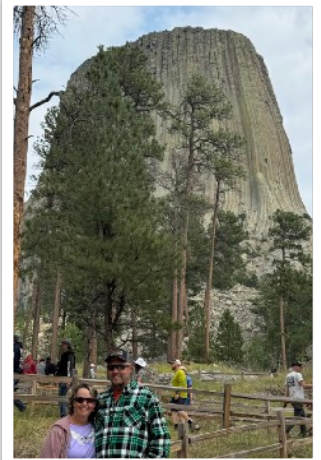
Prayer Ties: Small bundles of cloth, often tied with string and sometimes containing tobacco or other sacred substances. These are left on or near the site as a form of prayer or a wish.

Feathers: Feathers, particularly from birds like eagles, are sometimes left as symbols of respect and connection to spiritual beliefs.

Beads or Small Tokens: Beads, coins, or other small tokens are left as offerings to honor the sacred nature of the site.

Traditional Items: Some visitors leave small traditional items like pieces of cloth or other culturally significant objects.

These offerings are part of a long-standing tradition of respecting and honoring the sacred nature of the site, particularly for the Lakota and other Plains Tribes for whom the Tower holds deep spiritual significance. Visitors are encouraged to be mindful and respectful of these traditions and to avoid leaving items that could harm the environment or disrupt the site's natural beauty.



Badlands

A picture cannot capture the beauty of the badlands. The Badlands, located in South Dakota, are a dramatic landscape of eroded buttes, pinnacles, and deep gorges formed over millions of years by wind and water. This unique terrain is characterized by its striking geological formations and vibrant colors. The area is also a treasure trove of fossils, offering a glimpse into ancient life, including prehistoric mammals. Renowned for its stark beauty and otherworldly scenery, the Badlands are both a geological wonder and a rich archaeological site, attracting visitors with their surreal landscapes and diverse wildlife.



Crazy Horse

Take as many rocks home with you as you can carry!

Crazy Horse Monument, located in the Black Hills of South Dakota, is an ongoing monumental sculpture dedicated to the Lakota warrior Crazy Horse. When completed, it will depict Crazy Horse riding a horse and pointing into the distance. Carved into the Black Hills, the monument aims to honor Native American heritage and culture. It is the largest mountain carving in the world and was begun in 1948 by sculptor Korczak Ziolkowski, with work continuing today through the efforts of his family and the Crazy Horse Memorial Foundation.

Needles Highway

The Needles Highway is much more than a 14-mile stretch of road; it's a breathtaking journey through pine and spruce forests, meadows framed by birch and aspen, and towering granite peaks. The highway gets its name from the needlelike granite spires that punctuate the horizon along the route.

Meticulously planned by former South Dakota Governor Peter Norbeck, who surveyed the route on foot and horseback, the highway was completed in 1922. Travelers along the highway will encounter the picturesque Sylvan Lake and the striking Needle's Eye rock formation, named for the natural arch carved by wind, rain, and freeze-thaw cycles.



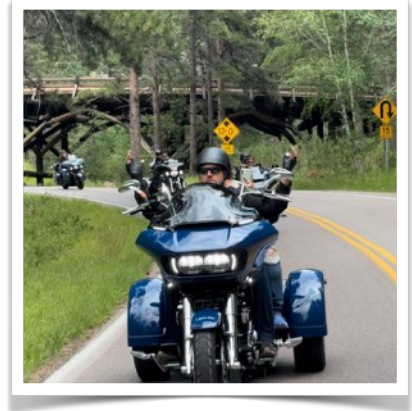
Iron Mountain Road

Iron Mountain Road (16A) offers an extraordinary 17-mile journey through South Dakota's Black Hills, renowned for its unique blend of scenic beauty and architectural marvels. This winding road is designed to slow travelers to 35 miles per hour, encouraging them to fully appreciate the surrounding landscapes and architectural features, such as pigtail bridges and one-lane tunnels that frame the iconic Mount Rushmore like a living picture frame.

As you drive, be prepared for memorable encounters with wildlife, including buffalo, antelope, deer, and possibly even mountain lions. The road connects two major destinations: Mount Rushmore National Memorial and Custer State Park, providing a stunning contrast between these landmarks and the natural beauty in between.

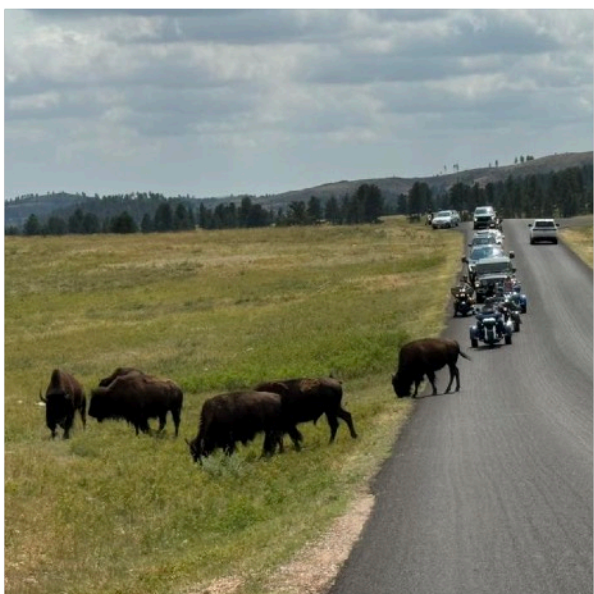
