



Quilt Project Planner

Describing the tasks involved in completing a quilt can help break down the process into manageable steps. Here's a way to outline the journey from start to finish:

<i>Tasks:</i>	<i>Date Due:</i>
1. PLANNING:	
Design Selection: Decide on a quilt pattern, theme, or block style (traditional, modern, improvisational).	
Fabric Choice: Choose fabric types, colors, and prints that align with your design.	
Tools & Supplies: Gather necessary quilting tools (rulers, rotary cutters, Studio 180 tools, thread, batting, etc.).	
2. PREPARATION	
Fabric Preparation: Wash, press, and starch fabrics as needed.	
Cutting: Use precision tools to cut fabric pieces according to the pattern requirements.	
3. PIECING THE QUILT TOP	
Unit Construction: Assemble smaller units (e.g., half-square triangles, flying geese, etc.).	
Block Assembly: Piece units together to form blocks.	
Top Assembly: Join blocks, sashing, borders, or other elements to create the full quilt top.	
4. ADDING LAYERS	
Backing Preparation: Prepare and piece the quilt backing, if needed.	
Batting Selection: Choose batting based on loft, warmth, and desired drape.	
Quilt Sandwich: Layer the quilt top, batting, and backing, ensuring alignment and smoothness.	
Basting: Secure the layers together using safety pins, spray adhesive, or hand basting.

5. QUILTING	
Design Selection: Decide on a quilting motif or pattern (stitch in the ditch, free motion, ruler work, etc.).	
Execution: Quilt the layers together, ensuring even distribution and avoiding puckering.	
6. FINISHING	
Trimming: Trim excess batting and backing to square up the quilt.	
Binding: Create and attach binding to the quilt's edges, either by hand or machine.	
Labeling: Add a label with details such as the quilt's name, maker, and date.	
7. FINAL TOUCHES	
Inspection: Check for loose threads or imperfections.	
Washing and Blocking: Gently wash and block the quilt to enhance its shape.	
Presentation: Fold or hang the quilt for display, gifting, or personal use.
