



Bag Project Planner

Making a bag involves many of the same thoughtful steps as quilting, but with its own unique tasks. Here's an overview of the process, from start to finish:

<i>Tasks:</i>	<i>Date Due:</i>
1. PLANNING:	
Pattern Selection: Choose a bag style (tote, crossbody, backpack, clutch, etc.) and the corresponding pattern.	
Material Choice: Select fabric, interfacing, hardware, and embellishments appropriate for the bag's design and intended use.	
Tools & Supplies: Gather tools like a sewing machine, rotary cutter, rulers, and specialty presser feet (e.g., zipper foot, walking foot).	
2. PREPARATION	
Fabric Preparation: Wash and press fabric to ensure stability and prevent shrinking.	
Cutting: Cut fabric, interfacing, and lining according to the pattern dimensions, marking important details like darts, pleats, and seam allowances.	
Interfacing & Stabilizers: Fuse or sew interfacing and stabilizers to fabric pieces where needed for structure and durability.	
3. Constructing the Bag Body	
Outer Panel Assembly: Sew any piecing, quilting, or decorative elements to create the outer panels.	
Pockets: Assemble and attach interior or exterior pockets (zipped, slip, patch, etc.).	
Bag Base: Construct and reinforce the bottom of the bag if applicable (e.g., boxed corners, foam stabilizer).

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4. Adding Hardware	
Zippers: Insert zippers for closures, pockets, or compartments.	
Straps & Handles: Prepare and attach straps, handles, or adjustable elements using sliders, D-rings, or rivets.	
Magnetic Closures or Snaps: Attach closures to the bag's main opening or pockets.	
5. Assembling the Bag	
Lining: Construct the lining, including any internal compartments or stabilizers.	
Main Assembly: Sew the outer bag and lining together, leaving an opening for turning.	
Turning & Pressing: Turn the bag right side out and press seams for a clean finish.	
6. Finishing Touches	
Topstitching: Add topstitching around the bag's edges for durability and a polished look.	
Final Hardware Installation: Attach any decorative elements like tassels, bag feet, or charms.	
Inspection: Check for loose threads, uneven seams, or skipped stitches.	
7. Personalization & Presentation	
Customization: Add embellishments like embroidery, appliqué, or labels.	
Packaging: Prepare the bag for gifting, sale, or personal use.
