CRC Executive Meeting Highlights...

Tuesday, October 10th at the Schaefer Home in North River. Members in Attendance: Greg Schaefer, Ellen Schaefer, Ellen Collins, Julie Milner, Nancy Haggerty, Sue Davis, Susan Rollings and guest Harold Stackhouse.

Director's Report: Sue Davis attended the ADK meeting for Ken Shea. Her report was included in the October newsletter. However, Sue noted that she is moving to the Rochester community for most of the year and can no longer represent CRC. This was her last Executive Committee meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Nancy Haggerty reported a \$815.70 deposit was made 10/10/17, bringing the current balance to \$8,248.19. The treasurer will be implementing a claim form to track expense records. Nancy will be collecting checks for the Holiday Party to confirm reservations.

Outings Committee: An email from Judy and Greg assures that things are fine. All CRC events are free unless otherwise specified. Members will be notified in advance if there is a cost attached to an activity.

Newsletter: Julie reports that newsletter goes to all CRC members and all affiliates who have requested it. A few members did not receive it and she will follow up with ADK headquarters. Copies requested by mail will be printed in black and white.

Membership: Ellen Collins reports we still have lots of members, but our growth rate is slowing down. According to August's report there are 2 less households, 4 less individuals, 2 less affiliates. The Cold River Chapter started in 1960's in Long Lake. Not much is known about CRC from 1960's thru 1990's. A new charter was created in mid-2000's. The Adirondack Mountain Club began in 1922.

Old Business:

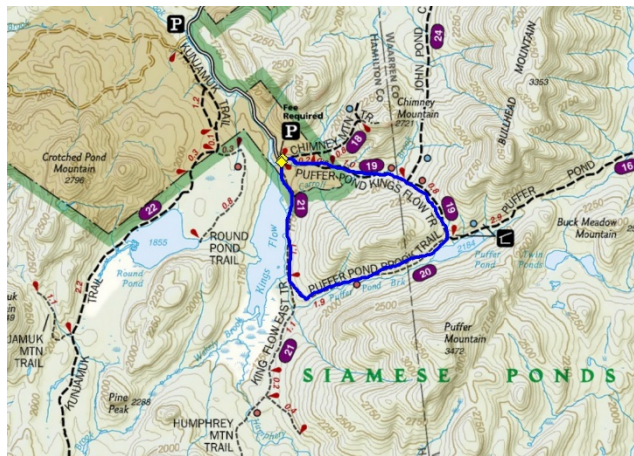

A report from CRC member and SPITS leader, Rick Morse

On November 1st, I met some friends at Old Farm Clearing at 9 am for a hike and some trail maintenance. The plan was to hike in on the Puffer Pond trail for about three miles, and then work on the way out to widen the trail and to remove blowdown. We had a strong crew: Jake Haker (Assistant Forest Ranger), Greg Schaefer, Tom Lapham, and me. I had been on that section of trail four days earlier, when there wasn't much blowdown, so I figured that this would not be a long day. Rain was forecast for that evening, but we should be out by 3 pm or so, so that shouldn't be a problem. I threw rain gear and a small headlamp in my pack, just in case.



As it turned out, a windstorm had knocked a lot of trees down since I had been in there. But we had 2 chain saws, a brush saw, and Tom had his trusty machete. It was slow going, carrying the heavy equipment and with all the trees to clear. On the way in, we were passed by two men who were hiking into Hour Pond. They looked to be in their seventies and were enjoying the day.

With darkness and cold rain approaching, we were cutting the last cluster of downed trees across the trail, about a half mile from the parking lot. Suddenly a hiker came upon us. He was one of the men who had hiked into Hour Pond. He reported that his friend had collapsed on the Puffer Pond trail with a suspected heart attack. Unfortunately, they had taken a wrong turn on the way out from Hour Pond and had hiked toward Puffer Pond rather than toward Old Farm Clearing, adding hours to their trip. We interviewed the hiker and Jake called it in to D.E.C. (Department of Environmental Conservation) on his radio. Tom and Greg escorted the distraught man to Garnet Hill to call their families and carried our saws out. Jake and I turned around and headed back in about four miles to look for his friend. We found him at about 6:30, but he was nonresponsive and apparently deceased. Jake relayed information to D.E.C. Ranger Art Perryman, who was heading in on his fat tire bicycle. Art arrived and coordinated the rescue. Other Forest Rangers and the Indian Lake Fire Department were on their way in with an ATV. At about 8 pm, Jake and I headed out, arriving at Old Farm Clearing at 10 pm. That concluded a 14-mile, 13-hour day in the woods. The D.E.C. Ranger made it out an hour later and met with the families at Garnet Hill Lodge. Greg and Ellen Schaefer did an excellent job of being with the families until he arrived.

I was sad for the deceased man, his friend, and their families. On the other hand, when I found him, he was in a very peaceful place, and he had died doing what he loved.

I was thankful that I had my headlamp, rain gear, and extra warm clothes. All the training and experience that I have had as an EMT and with Lower Adirondack Search and Rescue came in handy. As difficult as the day was, I was glad that we were there and had cleared the trail. Otherwise the rescue would have been much more difficult and would have taken most of the night.

We were in there that day because we are members of the Siamese Ponds Trail Improvement Society (SPTIS). Our mission is to work with D.E.C. to maintain trails in the Siamese Ponds Wilderness, Vanderwhacker Mt Wild Forest, and Wilcox Lake Wild Forest. We started about ten years ago with a group of four volunteers who helped Forest Ranger Steve Ovitt build the Botheration Pond Loop, the Schaefer Trail, and the Raymond Brook trail. Now we have 51 members, all volunteers who work to maintain the trails that we love. 25 of us are also ADK Cold River Chapter members. We are the official D.E.C. Stewards for 85 miles of trails in our area. We follow D.E.C. trail maintenance standards, are supervised by D.E.C., and are covered by N.Y.S. Workers Compensation. We have 28 people who have volunteered to be a steward for their favorite trail. Only D.E.C. trained and certified people use chain saws. We mainly work for about a month in both the spring and the fall when we are allowed to use power

tools in wilderness. An important part of the work is to simply do minor cleaning on trails when we hike on them.

Beginning at the trailhead on Barton Mines Rd. we hiked to the intersection of the Bothenation Loop, a distance of about 1.5 miles. Although cool at the start, the day quickly warmed up under bright sunny skies. One goal of the hike was to identify the location of trees that had fallen across the trail which will be removed by the SPTIS crew, a group of volunteers lead by Rick Morse that help maintain the 60+ miles of trails in the Siamese Pond Wilderness area. Along the route, Bob Eberhard and Richard Wang cleared all of the small trees and branches that

had fallen over the trail leaving just two trees too large to remove without cutting with a chainsaw. After our 2-hour hike, we enjoyed lunch at Chrissy's Cafe in North Creek.
