"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." Hebrews 13:8





The Frost Community Club sponsored this event and provided and served snacks. The Sr. High Youth of Dell shared their Easter Human Video to a packed crowd. Kids from area towns searched for eggs and prizes were given out.

May - May Day Baskets to St. Luke's Nursing Home. Our Sr. and Jr. High Youth prepared gift baskets and treats for health care workers at St. Lukes under the direction of Youth Director, Nick Tofteland. They were well received.

June- "Kids Are Precious In His Sight" Banquet held at Dell with guest speaker, Ray Howell of Kicking Bear Min. Parker Oaks catered the meal. We filled the Fellowship Hall with 100 guests. This event was a precursor to Kicking Bear which was held in July. Ray shared his testimony and all kids received gifts from Ray as well as Dell Church.

July - Kicking Bear took place at Prairie River Camp, Bricelyn, MN which acted as a co-sponsor of the event with Ray Howell. Ray's ministry is to

share Christ to those kids who need mentors through archery and outdoor games. I think all of the 150th Anniversary Committee will rank the marshmallow fight as one that will be remembered for quite sometime. Some of us hadn't laughed that hard in years. Many volunteers were needed for this event from within the congregation and from outside. After a dousing of rain on Friday night during registration, the weekend went well. The Lord's presence was there and ministry took place. We offered Kicking Bear as a free event.

This month held three parades for us in: Kiester, Blue Earth and Bricelyn where we gave out pamphlets about our upcoming events at Dell. We used two banners, a pickup and walkers along side.

Dell also had a fair booth at the Faribault County Fair with Ken Wessels as the organizer. Gerhald Maass and volunteers made 151 small loaves of bread to give away. September - Planning and making ready the 150th Anniversary Event held on October 1 and 2, 2011.

October - 150th Anniversary Celebration. This is the event we have

built up to for all these months. Our celebration didn't start on Saturday, October 1, at 2:00 pm at Dell. It began months ago with our first "giving back to the community" event.

The two day celebration starts on Saturday with a Youth Carnival, Pie and Ice Cream Social, Hymn Sing with Pianist Timothy Schmidt, Hope For Kids Missionary Tom Eggum, Music by the Agape' Messengers and a catered supper. Sunday's schedule; Ray Anderson and puppets for kids through 5th grade, 6th-12th grades with former Youth Director Dan Norman, Adult Sunday School with former pastors Paul Taintor and Myrwood Bagne. Worship Service includes Association of Free Lutheran Churches President Elden Nelson and Hope For Kids Missionary Tom Eggum. 12 noon catered lunch and open mic for memories to share. History of

The Blue Earth Evangelical Lutheran Church (Dell)

As taken from "Thanks Be To God" 100th Anniversary booklet
In the summer of 1857, the first Norwegian settlers came to Faribault
County. They were Ole Nelson Hauge, Ole Nelson Humdrey, Knut Johnson
Skernes, Gjest Anderson Flaten, Jens La, Henrik Larson, Jens Tue, Henry
Ronnei. The next year (1858) came: Eric Amundson Husebo, Ole Legried,
Hans Urness. All originated from Sogn County, Norway. They came the
long way from southern Wisconsin. These sturdy men and women settled
along the Blue Earth river, where they found building material, firewood,
water for livestock and protection from the wintery blasts. The first years
were trying and difficult. The Indian massacre at Spirit Lake, a days
journey from the new settlement, spread fear among the settlers and some

gathered their meager possessions and retreated to a safer distance from the frontier.

The nearest marketplace at the time was St. Paul, a distance of 150 miles; Red Wing, McGregor, Hastings were others of approximately the same distance. Here, they journeyed with oxen to dispose of their wheat and meat and buy the necessities of life. The majority of the settlers had come from Norway

empty handed and none came here expecting that everything should be in readiness for them upon their arrival. On the other hand, they looked forward to hard labor and many difficulties. They were young and strong, possessed rugged constitutions, ambitious and hopeful. All entertained hope of having a home of their own.

Under all these trials, tribulations and toils laid a keen desire to have the word of God preached in their midst. They were accustomed to congregation and the means of grace from Norway and they soon felt that life without God's Word was empty and unprofitable. It is told that the first

minister who visited the settlement was a pastor, Frederickson. Later they were visited by the well known layman, Arne Boyum, who under took to ride horseback long stretches among settlers. No organization of a congregation got underway until the Rev. C. L. Clausen had paid the settlement several visits. He organized the congregation, October 2, 1861. The first members of the congregation were:

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The first two interments in the Dell cemetary were two children of Albert Knutson: Marianne Kristine and Karen. They were interred by Pastor Clausen on October 4, 1863.

On October 15, 1864 Rev. Thomas Johnson conducted the first confirmation service for the following:

All these new settlers were of meager means and could not see their way clear to support a full time pastor. They turned to Jackson Lake congregation (near Amboy) in hope of procuring the part-time service of their pastor. The next year, 1865, these two congregations agreed to issue a call jointly, with the understand that Jackson Lake should have the parsonage and 80 acres were purchased near that place for a minister's home. The Blue Earth congregation was served occasionally by Pastor Johnson and serval times by Pastor T.A. Torgerson, who had the distinction of performing the first marriage, that of Edward Larson to Inger Karine Evansdatter, on September 21, 1866.

In 1867, a call was extended to candidate, T.H. Dahl, who became the congregation's first established pastor. He delivered his installation sermon December 10, 1867 at the Lars Olson home (the Arnold Amundson home). The established salary was \$350, and prorated according to the membership of the congregation. Pastor Dahl lived in Jackson Lake the first two years. The congregation seemed to gain little headway and the Blue Earth group deemed it best to locate the parsonage here. In 1869, the congregation bought 12 acres of land from Selmer Mikkelson for \$220, 2 acres of which was to be used for a cemetery. It was decided to build a frame house 22 ' x 18 ' (which is now the kitchen and back entry), and a log stable 16 ' x 20 '. These buildings were built at a cost of \$416.50. It was also decided at the congregational meeting on March 15, 1869 that the congregation would donate to the pastor 100 bushels of wheat and 300 bushels of oats and corn combined, this being in addition to his salary and acreage for his use.

When Pastor Dahl came to Jackson Lake and Blue Earth the country round about was not as we see it today; there were no roads to be relied upon, but much swamp land and many sloughs to wade through from one congregation to another. This congregation had now grown to such proportions (about 700 members) and covered such a vast territory, stretching from a few miles north of the Blue Earth river to a considerable distance over what was then called "South Prairie", and into Winnebago County, Iowa. At the beginning of Pastor Dahl's service here there were two organized congregations in this part of Minnesota, the two served by him.





He was effective in organizing and serving congregations at Delavan, Medo, Wells, Jackson, Heron Lake, Long Lake, Blue Earth City and Estherville, Iowa. In the immediate section served by Pastor Dahl, there are now nine churches of the original Norwegian synod: one here by the Blue Earth river, North Blue Earth, South Blue Earth, Wells, Bricelyn, Trinity, Liberty at Rake, Frost, Blue Earth City and Bethany. So, as we give thanks to God for 100 years of His Word and means of grace in our midst, we rejoice for the inheritance that has been shared. Most of the other churches and communities of the whole Norwegian settlement in southern Faribault County and northern Winnebago County, Iowa can trace their origin here. This whole settlement at one time had it's church service here at the Blue Earth (Dell) church.

Services up to this time had been held in various places in the congregation; in private homes, school houses, under the open heavens. Confirmation services, at which time people streamed to Blue Earth (Dell) from far and near, were held in the woods on the banks of the river, where the river banks served as pews and an oak stump as a pulpit. On May 10, 1869, the synod President, Rev. H.A. Preus, visited the congregation and strongly urged the members to build a church. This was done in 1871 on December 10 of the same year the edifice was put to use.

The congregation had become so wide spread that it became necessary to divide it into two sections, North and South Sogn.

The records show that Parochial schools had been discussed at nearly every meeting of the congregation since it's establishment. Parochial schools were held from time to time, although they were conducted by teachers who stayed here for only the duration of the school. In 1879 the congregation bought 10 acres of land for resident parochial school teachers. From that time some of the resident teachers were: D.L. Melby (father of the present pastor), Ole Underdahl, Mr. Gubbrud, Miss Elise Kittleson, Mr. Halvorson, Hans Osness, Mr. Christianson.

Of the many trials and tribulations that go to make up the pages of this congregations history the diphtheria epidemic of 1879 and 1880 can perhaps be named as the greatest. It claimed a toll of 85 children's lives.

The strife which went through out the Norwegian synod regarding pre-destination also reached here. As shown in the records, it made itself manifest as early as 1881 and grew in intensity until in 1884 it reached serious proportions. In South Sogn, a number withdrew membership from the synod and joined Bethania congregation of the Hauge's synod or Liberty (Rake) congregation, but North Sogn became divided into two congregations: North Blue Earth and Blue Earth at Dell. A lengthy and bitter controversy followed as to the ownership of the church property, until the fall of 1890, when an agreement was finally reach, whereby the anti-Missourians (Dell) gained possession of the church parsonage by paying \$2,700.00.

Through these years of strife, 1885 - 1890, each faction had it's pastor. Those who left the Blue Earth congregation retained Pastor Dahl until 1888. The Blue Earth congregation served by Rev. Andres Larsen Underthun from 1885 - 1889, when he was forced to resign because of ill-health. Later this congregation was served by Pastors: N. Ofstedahl, Fuglebak and O.C. Anderson. When peace again regained following the doctrinal controversy, candidate E.H. Sandvik was called. He was installed June 26, 1890.

Liberty Congregation in Winnebago County, Iowa which had recently been organized, joined this congregation in extending the call to Pastor E.J. Sandvig. In addition to these two parishes, he served the congregation in Blue Earth for ten years. When Pastor and Mr. Sandvig visited Norway from the summer of 1896 - 1897, these congregations were served by Pastor Evanstrand from 1896 - 1897.

On January 5, 1892, the Blue Earth congregation met and made plans to raise \$3,640.00 for a new church, apparently feeling they had outgrown the old structure. The new structure was to be 56 feet long and 36 feet wide and complete with a furnace, sacristy, balcony and provisions for a choir. On February 26, John Engum and John Njoes (members of the congregation who had been chosen as contractors) presented three plans drawn by Erickson of St. Paul. The voting members chose the plan for the building which was constructed a few feet south of the original edifice. The secretary's record shows that the church was completed and the first business meeting was held in it on December 14, 1892, Just over eleven months after the first business meeting held to plan for it. The congregation went on record then as thanking God for the beautiful edifice; as accepting the church from Engum and Njoes through the building committee and as

thanking them for their business-like manner of handling the construction. The church was dedicated May 28, 1893. Today we worship in this church, which has retained it's original architectural plan and rural setting among the fields and trees near the Blue Earth river.

On October 4, 1903 Pastor Sandvig delivered his farewell sermon, Pastor N.C. Brun of Lake Mills, Iowa served the congregation until July, 1904 when Pastor J. J. Akre was called to fill the pulpit. In the spring of 1906 Pastor Akre resigned and a call was extended to Pastor P.B. Trelstad, who took up his work here in August of that year.

At a congregational meeting November 26, 1901 it was decided that a church be built in Frost providing the necessary funds were forthcoming without incurring any indebtedness and on the condition that the church be owned and controlled by the Blue Earth (Dell) church. Several of this congregation's members lived in Frost and the church was built there in 1902. Services were held there from time to time, usually Sunday evenings when the local minister was en route to Dell after having preached at Liberty Church at Rake, Iowa.

In the summer of 1917, Pastor Trelstad resigned. His resignation was accepted September 12 of that year and on that day, Liberty congregation became separate parishes. While here, Pastor Trelstad also served Bethlehem Evangelical Church at Buffalo Center, Iowa.

Pastor C.S. Halvorson of Thompson was then called (1917) and he served the Blue Earth (Dell) and Frost congregations until 1920. At this time the congregation was organized in Frost and at a meeting of the Blue Earth congregation, March 23, 1920, the church edifice at Frost as given to the newly organized congregation there.

The Blue Earth congregation then extended a call to Pastor Jorgen Danielson Swalestuen of Jasper, Minnesota in 1920, who served here until his resignation in 1924. It was in the same year that the congregation decided to build and equip a modern basement beneath the church structure.

Pastor H.O. Mosby took over his duties here in the fall of 1925, which marked the beginning of a 27 year ministry. When the congregation in

Pastor Mosby was called to serve there also.

On October 4 and 5 of 1931, the Seventieth Anniversary Celebration proved a festive occasion for both young and old. The older generation was moved back to the day of its teens in the earlier days of the church's history, while the younger folks were permitted a glimpse into the stern realities of pioneer

life. Able speakers related the joys and sorrows of the pioneers who toiled for the establishment of the church. They forcibly brought to the attention of all the price with which the privilege of worship has been purchased. A highlight of the program was Mr. Nels Henjum's reading in the Norwegian language, the history of the Blue Earth congregation compiled by Mr. I.G. Peterson and Mr. Henjum. It was later translated and put into booklet form by Mr. Stanley Johnson. Other speakers were Pastors: P.B. Trelstad, Strand, Gerhard Peterson, Halvorsen and Torger T. Thompson.

Pastors Trelstad and Thompson returned ten years later on October 5, 1941, to address the congregation and friends gathered to commemorate eighty years of Christian progress and to give thanks to Him who makes all things possible.

The depression of the '30's was felt keenly in this area. It was Pastor Mosby who brought the congregation through this difficult time with a sense of spiritual enrichment in spite of great financial stress. It is worthy of note also, that the church, during the depression, by the grace of God was able to meet it's synodical obligations.

July 22, 1951, was a proud day for Pastor and Mrs. Mosby and the Blue Earth congregation when Carola, the Mosby's eldest, was commissioned as a full time missionary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church after which she departed for her field of service in Japan.

Feeling for sometime the physical burden of his ministry, Pastor Mosby tendered his resignation in December, 1951 and preached his farewell sermon in April, 1952.

In the interim between Pastor Mosby's resignation and Pastor Peterson's ministry, the pulpit was filled by neighboring pastors and

young men from the seminary, including Richard L. Peterson. Pastor Peterson was installed at Blue Earth church on November 8, 1953 to 1956. A forward step during Pastor Peterson's pastorate was the adoption of voluntary stewardship with a unified budget, replacing the assessment system of church finance. Robert Maland, son of Mr. and


Rev. Myrwood Bagne Mrs. Henry Maland, was ordained into the ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church at Blue Earth Church on June 7, 1953.

Pastor Melvin Kaatrud served his parish for several months in 1960 while the congregation was without a regular pastor.

Pastor Myrwood Bagne was ordained into the Christian ministry on a call from this parish and he began his duties here when he was installed, August 12, 1956.

On October 15, 1956 Pastor Bagne conducted the funeral service for Pastor H.O. Mosby who died following a stroke at his home in Mason City, Iowa, where he had been ministering to the aged at Good

Samaritan Home. Doctor C.M. Weswig preached the funeral sermon. Pastor Mosby was buried in the cemetery of the Blue Earth Church, being the only pastor whose final resting place is there. (Take note that Pastor William Ostroot, who served at Dell from 1967-1974 is also buried in the Dell cemetery).

Johnson, missionaries to the Sudan in the French Cameroun of West Africa, at an annual cost of \$2,300.00 for the sponsorship. His wife, Helen, a nurse in charge of the medical dispensary, died suddenly, March 27, 1958 and was laid to rest beside the new stone chapel her husband had built.

Ernest, an industrial school teacher, was married to Evelyn Jolson in June, 1961.

Funds for the missionary sponsorship have been raised by the annual corn drive, harvest of the acreage of the congregation owned land and voluntary gifts.

Lowell Erdahl, son of Mr. and Mrs. Christ Erdahl was ordained into the holy ministry of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church at his home church in Dell on June 27, 1958.


After Pastor Bagne's resignation to accept a home mission call, Pastor H.W. Melby moved to the parsonage at Dell, August 31, 1960, to serve this parish. A parsonage in Frost was completed by the United Lutheran Church and was dedicated in May, 1961. Pastor Melby and his family became the first occupants, leaving the Dell parsonage without a pastor's family for the first time in 92 years.

Great response was experienced to a series of Bible studies led by the men of the church in spiritual preparation for the Centennial; group meetings were held in the homes in the spring of 1961.

Ostroot and his wife Judy along with their four girls to Dell. During these years a revival of youth took Rev. William Ostroot place and many teens were brought to the Lord 1967-1974 through the singing group The Agape' Messengers. He introduced the gifts of the Spirit and much growth occurred under his pastoralship. Ostroot is buried in the cemetery at Dell. 19

The altar painting, chancel chair, baptismal font, brass candelabra, flags, brass cross and brass Bible stand, were saved from the fire by quick thinking parishioners, Phillip and Andy Monson and Dale Erdahl.

Andy tells the story that he, Phillip and Dale ripped the altar painting out of the frame while the fire was raging around them. The three-some tried unsuccessfully to bring the piano out, but couldn't budge it through the door. They escaped using the back door located to the left in the picture above. Most objects saved can be found in the current Dell Church.

Another special item found in the rubble of the basement after the fire was our ceramic Sunday School bank. Though burnt and discolored, it was found under the heavy bell that had fallen from the steeple through three floors to it's resting place covering the bank. Today, the bell can be found by the parking lot to the west of the church in a memorial built by the Johnson family of Frost, MN.

Pastor Donald Pederson came to Dell's parish in 1975 and stayed one year. A highlight for many of the church parishioners was our July 4th celebration where we road horse and drove wagons to church in honor of our nations 200th birthday. During Pederson's time at Dell, the second church structure was hit by lightening and burned to the the ground in the early morning hours of the summer of 1976.

With the church building gone the vote came to

1975-1976
rebuild a church on the same site. Pastor Pederson
chose to stay as pastor of United Lutheran Church of Frost (our sister church at the time), leaving Dell.



In 1977 the new church building you see today was built. The bell tower that sits next to the front entrance of the church was built a few years later. Dell had called Pastor Irving Tweeten, along with wife Marion, to shepherd us after Pastor Pederson's departure. Pastor Tweeten held our first church services as a congregation after the fire, under the canopy of the oak trees at Dell and in the Frost high school gym. He held us together and under took the oversight along with the Church Council,

the building of the new structure. Much of the inside finishing work, plumbing and electricity was done by talented congregants. Our Altar was a gift from God. While tilling his father's land in 1972, Marty Monson ran into a large rock. After removal of the rock, it laid broken in two parts in the ditch near the Bob Volz farm for a few years. Rebuilding the church in 1977, Marty suggested Dell use one half of the rock as an altar. The stone had three stripes and was broken completely against the grain issuing a thought that the rock would make a beautiful remembrance that God is faithful to continue to give Himself to us through the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Pastor Roy Mumm and wife Florence came to us from Bricelyn Lutheran Church as he was interim pastor there. He answered the call to be pastor, since Dell was looking for a pastor due to Irving Tweeten tendering his resignation and entering retirement in 1978. Pastor Mumm chose to continue residing in Albert Lea while serving as Dell's pastor and didn't use the church parsonage. In the many years he shepherded Dell the congregation grew and

heavenly rewards were felt.

In 1986, Pastor Roy Mumm gave his final sermon to those at Dell and retired, living in Albert Lea, MN. Needing an interim Pastor, Dell congregants heard that former Missionary to Cameroun, Pastor Ernie Johnson and wife Evelyn were back in the United States living near Austin, MN. Pastor Johnson, who was fluent in Swahili, would often find himself slipping in and out of other languages while preaching.

making for entertaining sermons. We felt we had come full circle having sponsored Pastor Ernie Johnson for many years, then to have him come back to Dell as our interim pastor. We enjoyed his teaching until 1987, when the call to Pastor Paul Taintor was placed.

Pastor Paul Taintor with wife MaryJo and three vibrant young boys came to Dell in 1986 and were here through 1989, when their fourth boy was born.

In 1986, Dell celebrated our 125th Anniversary while we installed Pastor Taintor.

These were pivotal years in the life of our congregation. Dell was a member of the ALC (American Lutheran Church). Around the time Pastor Taintor was with us, the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church of America) was formed and we needed to make a decision whether to go with the ELCA or a different Lutheran body. Dell decided to go with the AALC (Association of American

Lutheran Churches). At that time, Pastor Taintor chose to be a part of the ELCA and took a call to northern Minnesota.

In the short years they were here, many friendships were made and remain close to our hearts.

Pastor Paul Wiekert and wife Karen along with one daughter, Kristine were the next pastoral family to inhabit the church parsonage. Pastor Wiekert was known through out our neighboring towns as being an evangelist. He would go to cafes and shops and was always willing to talk about Jesus with any one. His ministry seemed to be the pulpit and friendship evangelism. As a church body, we watched Pastor Wiekert succumb to a brain tumor

and pass away on Easter Sunday, 1997. Our former "sister" church, United Lutheran Church of Frost helped with the lunch and the serving thereof for his funeral.

Having lived through a season of sadness and growth, Dell looked for another pastor willing to share our pulpit. On an interim basis, we found Pastor Roy Hendrickson of Albert Lea, MN. He shared sermons filled with healing and wholeness as we mended from the loss of Pastor Paul Wiekert. His time at Dell was a short year, but a beneficial year for us. We learned that through patience and endurance, the Lord answers prayers and gives to those who wait patiently.

This brings us to our most recent gift from God in Pastor Joseph S. Ocker and his wife Lesa along with their two children, Amanda and Aaron. Pastor Joe Ocker grew up in Sioux City, Iowa. The parish he was pastoring at the time he came to Dell was in Neola, Iowa.

During Pastor Joe's tenure, we found a new church synod and became members of the Association of Free Lutheran Churches, Plymouth, MN.

It was a fit that seemed inevitable as we look at our church laws and bylaws and in keeping with the belief that God's Word is inerrant.

He brings with him the gift of passionately teaching the Word of God and knowing it will change lives, counseling, organization and preaching from the heart and friendship. He appreciates the group of men we call the Elders as a source of blessing. He is continually grateful for the love and support given to him by the congregation. Pastor Joe has a gifting in encouraging congregants in pursuing new ministries that has resulted in: Sr. and Jr. High Youth Ministry, Pioneer Club, expanded Confirmation ministry, Vacation Bible School in a myriad of formats, Christmas programs at Frost Viking Community Center, parade outreaches and mission trips.

Pastor Joe participates in the Blue Earth Ministerial Association, Devotions at Parker Oaks and KBEW, Faribault County Jail Bible Study, Pastor's Prayer Group, AFLC Home Missions Committee and Lutheran Mission Societiess' Alaska Mission.

Pastor Joe has the distinction of being Dell's shepherd during our 150th year of being a church. Thank you for the years of service to the Lord. May He be praised as you continue to lead this flock by the river, Dell Lutheran Church, Dell, Minnesota.

Dell's Youth Ministry

Dell's first Youth Director was Dan Norman, along with his wife, Rachel. He called Dell home from 2003-2008. In those years he started PyrosinC., our Senior High Ministry as well as B.L.A.S.T. (Believers Living A Strong Testimony) our Junior High Ministry. With his help, we received from the Frost Community Club, the B.L.A.S.T. Junior High room in the basement area of the Viking Gym. He, along with the kids, painted and furnished the room. It is still used today by the confirmation class, which meets there Wednesdays as well as both B.L.A.S.T. and PyrosinC. groups. His giftings were friendship with the kids, mentoring and organizing activities. The youth program took strides under his seasoned Youth Ministry hand.



The History of

The Women's Missionary Federation of Dell

Taken from the "Thanks Be To God" booklet, 1861-1961

A few ladies gathered the latter part of November, 1886 at the church in Dell to organize a Ladies' Aid to promote the work in the church at home and abroad.

Eight ladies signed their names in the treasurer's book at this meeting, namely: Mrs. Ingeborg Erdahl, president: Miss Lean Erickson, treasurer; Mrs. Martha Dahle; Mrs. Marit Urness; Mrs. Martha Hanson; Mrs. Anna Brujeld; Mrs. Kristi Sabin; Mrs. Synneva Helseth. There were a few more ladies present but they refused to sign their names before they saw how this worked out. The first regular meeting was held at the home of Rev. Underthun.

Homes were far apart, approximately three or four miles in every direction from Dell. Meetings were held in the homes. As the distance to go to meetings was often great, the ladies who could get horses and wagon would drive and take their neighbor along. Sometimes they walked even six or eight miles and were present at the meeting at ten o'clock in the morning. Upon arrival they were served lemonade and cookies or homemade grape wine and cakes.

After Scripture reading and prayer these diligent pioneer women began their work. Some would bring sheep wool to the meeting and spin yarn, which was knitted into mittens, men's socks and children's dresses, aprons, etc. The left-over materials were made into quilts. Beautiful knitted and candlewick spreads were also made. All the articles which were made during the year were gathered together and a day was set for a festival. A big dinner was served and then the articles were auctioned. The group felt God's blessings over their work, which gave them courage to continue and increase their work in the Lord's vineyard. Year by year they increased their membership and income.

When Mrs. Sandvig took charge of the Aid and led devotions at each meeting, she was opposed to so much eating at the meetings and often said "We must eat less and work more for the missions." Thus dinner alone was served and it consisted of two kinds of meat with vegetables or "Lutefisk" and "Flatbread". They also served "Lefsa", "Molsa", "Flotegrod", cakes, cookies, pie, etc. Because of the amount of food served, it finally became hard to find hostesses. It was decided to meet in the afternoon and serve a lunch before going home.

Soon after the "new" church was built, it was decided that all the ladies who belonged to the congregation should also be members of the Aid. In 1904, the Aid sent the first church bell ever sent to the Madagascar mission field.

After Rev. Trelstad came to serve this congregation he urged the men to come to the Aid and made each meeting exceedingly interesting by reading books of continued stories about mission work. The interest was so stimulated that large crowds gathered and they decided to divide the Aid into East and West districts. As membership increased and crowds grew larger

it was decided to set aside \$200.00 each year until they could build a basement. During the stay of Rev. J.D. Swalestuen the basement was completed. Both Aids meet together every two weeks and hear the pastor preach the mission gospel.

Big events for the entire community were the Ladies Aid sponsored 4th of July Celebrations on the church grounds complete with it's early cook shanty and later it's pop stand and the more recent Lutefisk Suppers held in the church basement.

The Blue Earth Evangelical Lutheran Church at Dell joined the Women's Missionary Federation in 1931. Mrs. Mosby worked hard to get the interest and enthusiasm necessary to get the Federation established in our parish. In all departments the W.M.F. has worked according to the program outlined by the W.M.F. office.

The Dell Women's Missionary Federation have been hosts to the Circuit Women's Missionary Federation Conventions on many occasions.

In 1940 the Aid began to meet as circles during January and February. The Bible Study was led by a member of the circle. Under Pastors Peterson and Bagne the regular W.M.F. Bible Study series was led by the pastor at our meetings and Bible courses from Lutheran Bible Institute were studied at our circle meetings after the leaders were given instruction by the pastor.

Dell's Women's Missionary Federation 2011

We thank the Lord for establishing the "Aid" that began in 1886. As it moved through the years you may have read the changes that occurred: lutefisk for dinner at Aid meetings, wine and cake being served for snack time, pastors sharing the Bible reading and missionary stories, and adding men to the gathering. All movements in the direction of who we are today as women of Dell. We still are the W.M.F.

Our records don't say how many ladies were present at the meetings back in the 1800's, but, we do know they came from near and far, on horse back, wagon and walking. We also know there were many women in attendance as they needed to break the group up into East and West "Aids".

Dell's WMF (Women's Missionary Federation) of 2011 is part of the American Free Lutheran Church. Dell WMF is part of the AFLC Central Tri-State District National Meeting Day for the WMFs. Dell WMF is part of the annual Central Tri-State District AFLC Spring and Fall Rallies of which we have enjoyed being the hostess on a rotating basis. WMF is still 'mission minded' as were our predecessors. You will find that the Dell WMF includes events for ladies of all ages. Dell WMF annual events include the bake sale for Dell's Lutefisk Supper held on the first Sunday of February from 1:00 PM to 6:00 PM with attendance around 575 people.







The altar in 2011

Our altar comes from a large granite rock which was found 30 yards east of the Dell Church acres by Marty Monson in 1972. The story is told that Marty was plowing the ground and hit the rock. Phillip, Andy and Marty Monson, along with Bob Volz tried digging it out by hand. After a futile effort, they drug it out of the ground with a long chain and a tractor. The rock was pulled out whole, but split once they drug it to its resting place in the ditch near the Bob Volz farm where it laid for a few years in two pieces. It was surprising how it came apart as it broke against the grain in a perfectly flat fashion.

In 1976 after the old Dell church burned and a new church edifice was being built, it was suggested that the rock be used as our new altar. In preparation, the stone was polished with a sand blaster. At that time the three stripes became visible, with the thought "By His stripes we have been healed". They remind us of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, which is evident in our worship.

Marybelle was notoriously known for breaking down and had several different engine failures. The Agape' Messengers continued to use her faithfully through the years.

This deeply committed group of kids from 7th through 12th grades were held together by their adult advisors, Richard Johnson of Frost and Wayne Olson of Blue Earth under the direction of then Pastor William Ostroot.

The text below was taken from The Blue Earth Post from 1970

"Singing out to declare their own spiritual rebirth and help spread God's love, some forty Frost area teens make up a unique vocal group. The Agape' Messengers have spent the past 17 months performing locally at church gatherings as well as traveling to near-by communities of Mountain Lake and Mason City. To date, the group has put on about 55 performances."

The following is taken from the Congregational Report as given by Pastor William Ostroot, 1971

"The youth awakening has spilled over into the third year. Lives continue to be transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit. It is a thrilling experience to attend the weekly Bible Studies and prayer sessions. Again and again Satan has tried to torpedo turned on youth. But always at the critical moment deliverance comes!"
