Lecturn

The following is taken from the Januaary 2025 Newsletter, Show & Tell and presented for the Excellence Awarrds: The Lecturn was built for the RMYC Port

The Lecturn was built for the RMYC Port Hacking Sailing Division. The timber was from the Workshop Shed and had to be re-purposed for this project. The timber was Australian Sassafras from Northern Australian Coast and from old government office/buildings and close to 100 years old.

The timber was joined to give the desired width using the thicknesser and drum sander. The Lecturn was made in 3 separate pieces so that it could be disassembled for storage.

I engraved the Lecturn with club's logo and a little bit of history of the timber.

This is my fourth attempt at this project.

When I first saw a picture on the internet I thought it was a piece of cake but it was more difficult than I thought. The first two attempts are in the rubbish bin. The initial problem was finding the right drill for the job.

The brad point drill bit was my first choice but that didn't work out. I thought the step drill bit would solve my problems but the increments are 2 mm and hole size between each row is too obvious. The hole size should decrease gradually towards the pered ends of the bowl.

I bought a cone shape abrasive drill attachment and that saved the day.

As I was working towards the lower part of the bowl I realised the wall thickness was increasing so I had to do some more hollowing. I had to be extra careful because with most of the holes drilled the project was at a very delicate stage. One mistake and the whole bowl would turn into splinters. Finished it with three or four coats of polyurethane, light sanding between each coats.

The following has been taken January 2025 Show & Tell:

The Bowl was set up on a face plate to enable the recess to be turned in the bottom. This also allowed me to turn the outside. I reversed the bowl holding it by the recess and commenced turning the inside. After aligning the lathe, I completed the inside of the bowl and then sanded. The inside is finished with food safe beeswax and mineral oil mix. The outside is finished with Danish oil.



Gary Healey Jewellery Box

The jewelery box design was from one of the books from the workshop library. The design consisted or 3 layers but I modified the design to fit in a particular location, height restriction.

The box was constructed of jacaranda timber from my daughters neighbours garden that I received about 2-3 years ago. I painted the ends of the log and put it aside in my "workshop" and after about 2 year I cut the 350mm log into boards 15mm thick. I weighed each board and noted the date and weight on each of the boards and stacked them with 10mm slats between boards to keep them flat and to enable the air to circulate. I re-weighed each board every couple of months until their weight stabilised. The drying took about 9 months.



I mitred the corners and put feathers in the corners for strength. I made a template to drill the holes for the links to ensure the box sat level when opened and placed a leg on the back of the top draw to ensure the box was stable when opened.

The dividers in the top draw were cut thin, 3mm and I left the raw edge exposed. The draws were lined with suade material supplied by Ray Bywater. The box was finished with 3 coats of Kunos Oil I purchased from Bungendore Wood Works, easy to use and smells pleasant.

Making a jewelry box presents quite a few challenges:

- Knowing you are creating an item of beauty.
- Planning and designing it, from an image in your mind.
- Attention to fine detail.
- Using the Laser to have a different coloured inlay in the lid.
- Recovering from and hiding the occasional mistake.
- The high degree of accuracy required, especially in this case, ensuring that a
 narrow band of brown grain continued and joined up at the 4 corners, when the
 rest of the timber was a beautiful red.









The anchor clear spray created a most beautiful finish highlighting the quality of the Rosewood which is a beautiful fine grained timber that is so easy to work with.

Seeing what you picture in your mind looking so good and being happy with the outcome. Seeing the delight on the recipient's face. But all the work was worth it. The outcome was very rewarding.

Thank you again to Ian Rudd for your patience and great teaching.

Jacaranda Bandsaw Box

"I have made a few of these from lumber felled in 2015. This one is a three drawer version. The drawer cavities were cut on the Laguna bandsaw which has the Carter blade guide allowing smaller radius cuts. Entry cuts were alternated from left and right sides to make for easier glue/clamping of the body. Each drawer was lined with green flocking over a thin sealer coat prior to a final thicker base coat of the same green acrylic paint. The drawer handles are natural edge bark from offcuts. I downloaded a Shutterstock image of a portion of Jacaranda branch in flower for added effect and lasered it onto the top of the box. CA glue was applied to areas of unstable bark, followed by 6 coats of Anchor Satin finish.

SHOW AND TELL

It was made from an old teachest (for shipping bulk tea) I measured it and traced the butler, then scanned to the lazer program, added joints for easy assembly as the old one was precisely named with very small pins.

Brian Harward Cutting Board

Regarding the cutting board, the inspiration came from a YouTube video which was very informative and included some dimensions. The Timbers used were Merbau, Tasmanian Oak and Pine. If I was to do it again I would use something better than pine. The finish is the usual mineral oil and a little bees wax.





Craft Box

Last year I was given some Silky Oak timber and as I had never had the opportunity to use this timber previously, I was determined to produce one or more items from this beautiful timber to do it justice.

After preparing the timber I ended up with sufficient timber to make 2 identical craft boxes, one of which is shown in the photo.

I was really delighted with the timber's golden colouring that emerged after applying multiple layers of shellac. The other first for me in making this box was the use of so-called rare earth magnets which I placed in three of the corners of the box and accompanying lid. I took great care to ensure that the magnet's polarity was correct. The lift out tray's base and internal box base were covered with a deep red flocking material.

Ray Tregoning

Wedge blocks to help make beds

These blocks are a copy of an injection moulded plastic one Richard brought in to make a copy for his own use. I took a copy of the pattern to make a couple for my own use. As it happened a lady brought in a piece of 250x70 finger jointed pine which was just perfect to make two.

I called upon Ian to laser engrave them with "Helps make you bed" then sprayed them with 100% gloss Anchor. One of our Woolooware Shores workshop members has had a look and asked if his wife could have one, so finding some 250x70 Oregon at the Club I have made another six with enough leftover timber for another six if needed as these could be a useful item down here at Woolooware Shores for some of our residents.



Shire Woodworking Club farewells its oldest member

Doug Wickens, the oldest Shire Woodworking Club member, has died at age 103.

Mr Wickens was a man of many talents, particularly in the workshop, where one of his life's passions was tinkering with wood and transforming drab planks into toy marvels.

Established in 1998, the Shire Woodworking Club was created as a space for people to meet, chat and give back to the community.

Based at Lilli Pilli in a hall, the club's home was a supportive hub for members to develop friendships, build crafty skills, learn from each other's projects, and guide each other through life's ups and downs.

Mr Wickens joined in 2002. Alongside others, he helped make wooden toys, which were delivered to charities supporting disadvantaged families and sick children in hospitals.

As one of the more experienced members, Mr Wickens was quick to pass on any tips and tricks of the trade but was also willing to keep learning and expanding his fine woodworking skills.

Fellow club member Graham Ethell said Mr Wickens was still a very active member and continued making woodwork items until his 100th birthday.

"We remember him as specialising particularly in box making and woodturning," Mr Ethell said. "He was a very regular attendee at the monthly meeting of club members and was particularly interested in the 'show and tell' items. He would always ask some questions about some aspect of woodworking he hadn't done before, then go home and try it out.

"One particular instance I recall is when I showed a small table I had made and French polished. He was really interested in French polishing, asked me a lot of questions, and then went home and made a beautiful piece of furniture, which he then French polished at about age 95."

Mr Wickens was born April 30, 1921. He lived at Ferndale Nursing Home at Mortdale. He died on January 8, 2025. "Doug Wickens was a remarkable individual who dedicated his life to serving his country and participating in his community," Oatley MP Mark Coure said. "I have had the privilege of knowing Doug and his wife Betty for over 30 years. His contributions, whether through his service or the works he created, will continue to be cherished by all who knew him. My condolences to Betty his wife for over 75 years and to the Wickens family, he will be sadly missed."

CLUB CLEAN-UP

A couple of weeks ago several of our club members completed a clean-up of the wood storage area on the Western end of the club property. If you look now you will find that the shed has now had a significant amount of timber removed making the shed now much more accessible. We will be installing a couple of solar powered lights to provide good visibillity in the shed. There are still several areas of timber storage inside the workshop viz in the storage room in the south west corner, on the mezzanine floor of the workshop, on the southern end of the workshop (top shelf) and in the gallery room (several tassie oak pieces from the Cronulla RSL.) We do plan to do further work to rationalise our timber storage arrangements. Time frame TBA. Members please note we must be much more judicious with receiving further timber. If in doubt, talk to a committee member. We have also retained some timber for members personal use at home. (winter is coming). See picture.



At the same time we have also completed a clean out of the store room adjacent to the kitchen in the gallery building. We will continue to use this room for storage of chairs but we do plan to alter the internal shelving and a coat of paint to the exterior wall of the storeroom. Ray Tregoning is our interior decorator and he has plans to also re-position the large RSL desk to the front door.

We now have a significant of tooling that is available for sale to members, friends and the public. Have a look next time you're at the club and any reasonable offer will be accepted.
