The Good News Letter

Most expectant mothers and new parents collect memories of their child's first years in one of those *Our Baby's First* ______ books. In this book is recorded the date of their baby's first smile, their first steps, or their first words. But Sue Diaz, writing in *Child Magazine*, believes that there should also be another book: *The Book of Lasts*. This book would keep track of the moments we don't think of as precious until they're gone. For example, Diaz remembers the morning her daughter, Anne, crawled into bed with her and her husband. She writes, "A short time later, I woke up wedged between my husband and Anne's excess of elbows. I got out of bed, slid my arms beneath Anne and tried to lift her. No go. The little girl I used to bounce in my arms was gone. On a day I don't remember, I had carried Anne for the last time. When I set her down, I didn't know it would be forever."

I must admit that I am anticipating the experience of a lot of "lasts." My last sermon to you will be delivered in a few weeks. My last time planning a worship service for you and the last time we will celebrate Holy Communion together is right around the corner. When I give up my keys to my office and the church, it will be the last time I enter the building as your pastor. We will soon deliver communion to the homebound for the last time. I will soon have my last Session meeting as well as my last Board of Deacons meeting. It is all a part of the process, although for me, it also involves the end of a career begun almost 36 years ago.

This is all a part of the process of grieving the loss of our relationship. In the grief process we experience all kinds of emotions—shock, pain, anger, sadness, and eventually acceptance. I've seen some of these in you, and I am experiencing them as well. Although Susan and I are staying in the area, after March 31st I cannot do any pastoral duties nor come to worship at the church until well after you call a new pastor. I cannot call any of you, although you can call me. These are guidelines given by the presbytery and they are necessary so that you will bond in a healthy way with your next pastor. Susan is not under these restrictions.

I will miss all of you although I look forward to retiring. People have asked me what I will do, and that remains to be seen. I will rest, do work around the house, rest some more, play golf as soon as my knee is ready, sleep late, and enjoy my time with Susan, Benjamin and other friends, colleagues and relatives. The rest of it is unplanned for now. God has blessed me richly for having been with you, and I am sure God will continue to bless. We will worship together for the last time on Easter, and we will place our hope in God, who brings us the good news of the resurrection. All thanks be to God.



Presbyterian Women met Feb. 1, 2024 for a short business meeting followed by a robust Bible Study discussion with a delicious cheesecake served by Brenda.



Easter: The Celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord

Easter Sunday is the day we most celebrate the rising from the dead of Jesus Christ. Every Sunday is a day to celebrate the resurrection, but Easter marks <u>the</u> day that Jesus rose from the grave. His rising serves to give all humanity hope that all the things Jesus taught and showed us were true. It also gave the world hope that death does not have the final say, so we need not fearespecially as we seek to do God's will and reveal God's realm in our midst today.

The week before Easter is known as **Holy Week**. We use this time to prepare for Easter Sunday. Here are scriptures you could read for each day:

Monday—John 12:1-11, Isaiah 42:1-9, Psalm 36:5-11.

Tuesday—John 12:20-36, Isaiah 49:1-7, Psalm 71:1-14.

Wednesday—John 13:21-32, Isaiah 50:4-9a Psalm 70.

Maundy Thursday—John 13:1-17, 31b-35, Exodus 12:1-14, Psalm 116:1-2, 12-19.

Good Friday—John 18:1-19:42, Isaiah 52:13-53:12, Psalm 22.

Saturday—Mark 16:1-8, Ezekiel 37:1-14, Psalm 98.

When we prepare, then we are better able to behold the glory of the risen Lord on Easter. Gather together that morning at worship when we will sing hymns, hear beautiful music, celebrate with Holy Baptism and Holy Communion, and most of all, rejoice!

"In the Garden"


A favorite Easter hymn is "In the Garden," and it has been called one of the most popular gospel hymns ever along with "The Old Rugged Cross." The hymn and music were writer by C. Austin Miles in 1912. Miles gives this account of how the words were written:

"One day in March, 1912, I was seated in the dark room, where I kept my photographic equipment and organ. I drew my Bible toward me: it opened at my favorite chapter, John 20—whether by chance or inspiration let the reader decide. That meeting of Jesus and Mary had lost none of its power to charm.

"As I read it that day, I seemed to be part of the scene. I became a silent witness to that dramatic moment in Mary's life, when she knelt before her Lord, and cried, 'Rabboni!'

"My hands were resting on the Bible while I stared at the light blue wall. As the light faded, I seemed to be standing at the entrance of a garden, looking down a gently winding path, shaded by olive branches. A woman in white, with head bowed, hand clasping her throat, as if to choke back her sobs, walked slowly into the shadows. It was Mary. As she came to the tomb, upon which she placed her hand, she bent over to look in, and hurried away.





"John, in flowing robe, appeared, looking at the tomb; then came Peter, who entered the tomb, followed slowly by John.

"As they departed, Mary reappeared; leaning her head upon her arm at the tomb, she wept. Turning herself, she saw Jesus standing, so did I. I knew it was He. She knelt before Him, with arms outstretched and looking into His face cried 'Rabboni!'

"I awakened in full light, gripping the Bible, with muscles tense and nerves vibrating. Under the inspiration of this vision I wrote as quickly as the words could be formed the poem exactly as it has since appeared. That same evening I wrote the music." (101 Hymn Stories, K.W. The white Christ Candle—Lit for Easter and for all the worship services of the season of Easter.



The open tomb—Reminds us that the holy love of God and Christ conquers death.



The cross over the globe—Signifies the victory of the cross over all the world.




The peacock—The molting peacock grows new feathers still more brilliant than the ones that were lost.



The Phoenix—This legendary bird dies in flames and rises out of the ashes to new life.



The Butterfly—The caterpillar wraps itself in a cocoon and then bursts forth into new life and begins to fly with new wings.



March 2024 Daily Bible Reading Prophecies and Jesus' Death & Resurrection

Just as many Old Testament verses foretell of Jesus' birth and ministry, others prophesy of his death and resurrection. Some Bible scholars estimate that hundreds of OT passages allude to or are a precursor of Jesus. J.C. Ryle is quoted as saying that the Old Testament gospel is the bud, the New Testament is the gospel in full bloom.

The time and manner of Jesus' death and resurrection were not happenstance, but a fulfilling of God's plan from the beginning, as Jesus was from the beginning, our Passover Lamb. 1 Corinthians 13:12 says that in our Christian walk now we look through the mirror dimly and know in part. The prophets saw dimly, and Jesus perfectly fulfilled their predictions. He is the Savior and the Light!
