2023 Emerald Coast Quilt Show

March 3rd & 4th at the Fort Walton Beach Fairgrounds, Beal Pkwy

The quilt show is fast approaching.

The deadline for entering quilts is <u>Feb.1</u>st. Entry forms are on the web site. I recommend using your computer, a Tablet or Notebook rather than your phone to download. Pictures can be sent to my email address

(quilt60@hotmail.com). It takes time to process your entries and to develop a layout for the show, so please don't wait until the last minute. You can save time by sending your entries directly to my home address. We need volunteers to work during the show. Please see note below from Konnie Glaze for more information.

If you do not live very close to the show but are going to volunteer prior to and during the show, or just plan to attend multiple days, I have a block of rooms on hold at the Best Western in Niceville for those who do not want to drive back and forth. You need to book your room now. The Fairgrounds also has RV hook-up for \$30/night (including, water and electricity).

It takes participation on everyone's part to make the show a success. If you have never been to a show or involved in a show, I can guarantee it is well worth the effort and rewarding for everyone!

Volunteers: Konnie Glaze

Thank you to all the guild members who have already signed up to volunteer at the upcoming quilt show. We still have openings to fill. Please see Konnie Glaze, at the workshop table, at the January 12, 2023 general membership meeting to sign up to volunteer. If you volunteer 4 hours or more, you will have free entry to the quilt show. Volunteering is a great way to meet other guild members and make new friends.

Jips for Entering your Quilt in the Quilt Show: Diane Roberson

First, read and comply with the instructions for entering the quilt.

Next consider the following seven general characteristics judges use in evaluating a quilt:

General appearance – corners square, edges straight, clean, meets the rules of the category it is entered into.

Tension – stitches are consistent, free of bird's nest, eye lashes, and gaps.

Edge finish — binding is a consistent width as is flange or piping if used, binding is full to the edge and securely applied, miters stitched closed front and back, border miter align with binding miters; if faced, backing fabric not visible from the front and vice-versa.

Design – color and value contrast to fully visualize design, quilting thread match, blend or complement the top.

Piecing – piecing thread is invisible in seam lines, seams are secure, lines straight, curved piecing is free of distortion, points sharp/free of bulk, sashing consistent in width/align to cornerstones, free of shadowing of dark fabric under lighter fabric, loose threads are clipped, border designs turn the corners well.

Surface design – beads and embellishments are proportional/scale to area and securely attached.

Quilting – design complements, grid lines are straight, consistently spaced, change in thread color shows good attention to detail, stitch in the ditch is in the ditch, consistent in density across the quilt, starts and stops are secure/knots buried, quilt is overall free of distortion from quilting.

The sky is the limit, so let your creativity blossom.

Members who are participating in the UFO group will prepare a list of 12 unfinished projects and hand it in to the UFO Coordinator. The Flying Needles Quilt Guild donates to ECCAC and others

Niceville, FL (December 13, 2022)...Over the years, the Flying Needles Quilt Guild in Niceville has donated Christmas stockings and quilts to the Emerald Coast Children's Advocacy Center (ECCAC), and the organization is doing it again this year.

In addition to ECCAC, other organizations who received these home-made gifts of stockings, quilts, blankets, pillowcases and drawstring bags are Children in Crisis, Catholic Charities and the Northwest Florida Guardian Ad Litem Foundation. The Guild also supports the Quilt of Valor Foundation by making over 100 quilts a year for service members and veterans touched by war.

The Flying needles quilt Guild was started in 1989 by a group of 19 quilters and has grown to over 100 members. They meet regularly at New Hope Baptist Church in Valparaiso to make, discuss and learn quilting techniques.

Member Linda Renner-Weiss further added, "Our goal is to serve the community by donating to other service organizations and by serving as a source of information and education by means of exhibitions, demonstrations, lectures and workshops. a Jrip Down Memory Lane, January: Deb Chilcote, In29 Historian


The Flying Needles Quilt Guild is over 30 years old now, but most of you were not members for all those years. So, to get you up to speed on what our guild has gone through, I will be starting a new series that focuses on what happened during the <u>current</u> month, and share tidbits of interesting information for that particular month over several years. I can't include everything that happened, but I will give you a glimpse of what we did as a group.

in 1993

-- The members have been meeting at the <u>First Presbyterian Church in Niceville</u>. We met three times a month

1996

-- Our first raffle quilt was made by various members in a combined effort. It was called <u>"Parade of Homes"</u>, with 20 blocks, each depicting a house made by a participating Flying Needles member. Many of the members have been long gone, but there were still blocks made by those we still remember today – Doris Olig, Gloria Thomas, Betty Davey, Harriet Standifer, Carolyn Ripp, and Karen Boswell (who recently passed away) each made a block. Doris sent it off to be entered into a quilt contest sponsored by <u>Better Homes & Gardens American Patchwork & Quilting Magazine, where it became a finalist!</u> Over \$1,500 worth of tickets were sold, and the winner was someone from Beaver Creek, Ohio who had come to this area on vacation, and bought a ticket from Doris when she was selling tickets outside Sam's Club.



<u> 1999</u>

-- Our "raffle" quilts were changed to our "Opportunity" quilts.

2008

-- Our by-laws were changed to include Family Memberships for multiple people in the same household.

2010

-- We switched meeting places, and started meeting at the <u>Niceville Church of Christ</u> in January of this year. (We were there for 5-1/2 years until we came to our current meeting place of New Hope Baptist Church in August 2015).

2020

- -- Members voted to buy a <u>new laptop and the Quickbooks</u> computer software program for the Treasurer to keep our books in a consistent format for years to come.
- -- Our new website kicked off! Managed by GoDaddy.
- -- <u>A new Opportunity Quilt History Book</u> was started by Deb Chilcote, our Historian, which features all the details and pictures of the Opportunity Quilts the guild has made to date. It will be updated as necessary.





If you sign up to be in the UFO program at the beginning of the year, each month you either bring a <u>finished</u> UFO to show, OR you have to donate a Fat Quarter. Those at the end of the year who finish the most UFO's in the UFO program get to have all the Fat Quarters that have accumulated for that year. This year, it was a tie between <u>Jayne Pendergast</u> and <u>Margaret Jacobs</u>, so they each got half of all the Fat Quarters.
