



Quilt Jips

Here are a few of the tips shared at the June meeting.

For disposal of bent pins and used needles, have an empty spice or herb container. Larger ones work well to drop the needles into the holes and shut the lid. When full, it is safe to throw in the trash.— Martha Rose

When your rotary blade gets a little dull, flip the blade to extend the life.—Doreen Hoyt

When my rotary blades get dull, I don't get rid of them. I transfer them over to another rotary cutter that I only use to cut paper. I label this cutter with the word "PAPER" so that I don't mix them up.—Deb Chilcote

Keep the containers the rotary blades come in, and mark one of the "used." Put your used blades in this, and when it's full you can tape it up and throw it out, saving some bleeding fingers if you inadvertently reach into your trash can.

For those who sew clear vinyl into pouches and bags, wrap a piece of masking tape underneath the back half of the sewing foot to allow the clear vinyl to be sewn without sticking to the foot as it feeds through.—Deb Chilcote

Use textured vinyl shelf liner under quilt rulers to hold your rulers in place when doing ruler work. They hold securely, can be cut to whatever size you want, and can be moved around to let you read markings on your ruler.—Mary Lou Roszhart

Get eyebrow razors from the Dollar Tree or Amazon; they make excellent seam rippers.— Sherri Hays

Use leftover pieces of batting on your Swifter floor sweeper to gather up all the dust on your floors. –Linda Hudson

Smaller pieces of leftover batting can be used to dust tables, sewing machines, and other surfaces.— Peggy Murrell

a Jrip Down Memory Lane: Deb Chilcote, FN29 Historian

JULY This is the 7th installment of a new series that focuses on what happened during the <u>current</u> month, and I will share tidbits of interesting information for that particular month over several years to give you a glimpse of what we did as a group. -- Deb Chilcote, FNQG Historian

<u>1992</u> – <u>Gloria Thomas</u> made a label for the quilt guild that will go on the quilts for Sharing & Caring. It depicts a banner with flags & stars.

<u>1993</u> – <u>The first mention of a Guest Speaker</u>. Bewlay Maney came back from Russia with fabrics, and shared her information on the Russian heritage.

<u>1994</u> – Our newsletter started having a <u>combined July/August issue</u>. It wasn't until 10 years later that we had an issue for each month.

2000 – It was announced that the Singer Sewing Machine store on Beal Parkway & Racetrack Rd. (now known as The Sewing and Training Center) has a new owner – Sherry. (She has recently retired, and Brandi has taken over).

2006 – There was a show called "Porcelain and Quilts" held at the Ft. Walton Beach ADSO (Arts & Design Society), arranged by Tann Dallas.

2010 – We're now on Facebook, thanks to Gina Curtis! The next year, member Ernest Nettles started taking pictures during Show 'n' Tell, and posting them on Facebook.

2013 – A big month for <u>Quilts of Valor</u> presentations this year! Some members travelled to New Orleans for a Quilt of Valor presentation of 88 quilts (30 of them from our guild) – it was the Armed Forces Reunion for returning Wounded Warriors, primarily for Navy veterans. The Admiral who was the key note speaker was presented with one that was made by our own <u>Barbara Fyffe</u>!

(<u>Sandra Congleton</u> also presented Tom Rice with the Fisher House Quilt of Valor a couple months ago this year.)

<u>2015</u> – Big news about where our guild meets! Our last month to be at the Niceville Church of Christ was in July 2015, which is when we started going to the New Hope Baptist Church in Valparaiso, and where we remain today.

2016 – The 2016 Quilt of Valor Opportunity Quilt "Lone Star Salute" was featured in the July newsletter. Made by <u>Janet Kinner</u>, it was a Jenny Beyer design. It garnered \$1,266 in ticket sales, according to <u>Sandra Congleton</u> who managed the sales, and the winning ticket was drawn in December of that year. Winner was Kira Bell.

<u>2018</u> – New member from last year, <u>Deb Chilcote volunteers to take over the Historian duties from Gloria Thomas</u>, who has been the Historian on and off for the last 25 years.

Door Prizes: Sign-ups for providing door prizes has dropped off in recent months, however, members continue to bring prizes. Kerry noted the great success of the spring pot-luck.



<u>Joan Martin</u> made the quilt on the left for her uncle, from a layer cake, and the quilt on the right for her aunt.


<u>Polly Shields</u> made this quilt for her granddaughter's graduation. She wants to be a vet, and the quilt has horses on it.

Recipes

CHICKEN CASSAROLE: from the kitchen of Sherri Hayes

Ingredients:

- 1 large package of Extra-Wide Egg Noodles
- 1 BIG can of white chicken (drained) 2 if you like a lot of meat can also use tuna
- 1 big can of cream of chicken soup
- 1 small can cream of mushroom or celery
- 1 soup can of milk
- Salt and pepper to taste
- ~2 tsp of chicken powder (Wylers Bouillan)
- 3 cups shredded Seriously Sharp Cheddar Cheese (Cabot White Cheese)
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese (orange) Paprika

- 1. Cook egg noodles in salted water until tender
- 2. In a big bowl, combine the chicken, soups, milk, salt (sparingly) & pepper, bouillon, & the Seriously Sharp Cheddar Cheese. The texture should be creamy not soupy. If it is too thick, add more milk.
- 3. Drain the egg noodles and gently fold into the soup mixture
- 4. Place into a large casserole dish and top with remaining grated cheese and a sprinkle of paprika.
- 5. Cook at 350-degrees for 45-50 minutes.
- ** Caution: Go easy on the salt since there is salt in the boiled noodles, bouillon, and cheese
- ** Note: If you are making the night before, add a bit more milk the noodles will soak up some of the liquid and when it is cooked later it will still be creamy. If you don't, your dish will be a bit dry.

Alaska Sheet Cake: from the kitchen of Grace Grimsley

Cake:

- 2 cups all-purpose flour, plus
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup water
- 3 eggs
- 2 cups white sugar
- ½ cup buttermilk
- 1 ½ teaspoons baking soda
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon almond extract (Optional)

Icing:

- ½ cup butter
- 5 tablespoons milk
- 1 (16 ounce) package confectioners' sugar, sifted
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F and grease and flour a 10x15 inch sheet pan.
- 2. Stir together the flour and salt in a large mixing bowl.
- 3. Place 1 cup butter with the water in a saucepan, and bring to a boil over medium heat. Remove from the heat, and set aside to cool.
- Beat eggs in a separate mixing bowl, and stir in the sugar, buttermilk, boiled butter mixture, baking soda, baking powder, vanilla extract, and almond extract until well combined.
- 5. Pour the egg mixture into the flour mixture, and stir until the batter is well mixed. Pour the batter into the prepared baking sheet.
- 6. Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted in the center of the cake comes out clean, about 15 minutes. Let the cake cool before icing.
- 7. To make icing, place 1/2 cup of butter and the milk into a saucepan, and bring to a boil over medium-low heat. Remove from the heat, and beat in the confectioners' sugar, chopped pecans, and vanilla extract. Ice the cooled cake with the warm frosting.
