The Overlooked Degree?

Masonry has within it, many memorable, and profound degrees. No matter if a man joins a Rite or stays within just the Blue Lodge system. And many of us have our "favorite" degree. The one that touches or resonates within us. I have attended many degrees during my time. I have witnessed countless men just start their journey on the first degree, seen over a hundred be raised to Master. I have seen, and read the degrees of the Scottish Rite, and am currently winding my way through the York Rite. Yet, I have witnessed very few Fellowcraft Degrees. And, it seems, I am not alone.

In conversation I have spoken to many who have rarely attended a Fellowcraft Degree, and even those who will say, I do not really care for that degree. And now as I study that degree, I find myself wondering why.

Aside from its historical significance, the second degree seems to try to convey all that is Masonic in a single degree! Aside from the architecture references, which after being modeled on a building society, is self-explanatory, it goes into great detail about Man's roll in studying God's creation, how he interacts with others,

And, how he should govern himself. In essence the Fellowcraft being the second degree now, is fittingly the "core" or center of Freemasonry.

The working tools teach us how to behave as men and towards others. Walk upright in your path with God and man, treat everyone fairly, and travel upon the level path of righteousness.

In this degree we cover the senses of man. Those invaluable gifts given us to be able to explore and learn from the world around us. We learn about the liberal arts, or systems of instruction that allow us to order and express our thoughts so that we may be able to share knowledge with others.
