GRASSROOTS

In Flanders Fields

In Flanders fields, the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie,
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

"In Flanders Fields" is a war poem, written during the First World War by Canadian physician Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae. He was inspired to write it on May 3, 1915, after presiding over the funeral of friend and fellow soldier Lieutenant Alexis Helmer. According to legend, fellow soldiers retrieved the poem after McCrae, initially dissatisfied with his work, discarded it. "In Flanders Fields" was first published on December 8 of that year in the London magazine Punch. Flanders Fields is a common English name of the World War I battlefields in Belgium and France.

It is one of the most quoted poems from the war. As a result of its immediate popularity, parts of the poem were used in efforts and appeals to recruit soldiers and raise money selling war bonds. Its references to the red poppies that grew over the graves of fallen soldiers resulted in the remembrance poppy becoming one of the world's most recognized memorial symbols for soldiers who have died in conflict.

Finnish Turnip Loaf ~~ Norma Kivela

3 small turnips or 1 big one 3 tbsp flour 1/4 cup butter or margarine

salt and pepper to taste

Peel and dice turnips. Boil in slightly salted water until done. Drain well and mash. Add butter, flour, and a sprinkle of pepper. Whip with a fork. Turn into a buttered casserole dish and bake in a 350°F oven for about 45 minutes. Loaf tastes better if baked in a low oven at about 275°F to 300°F for two to three hours.

Boil until it forms a very hard ball in water (265°F)

2 cups white sugar 1 tbsp vinegar 1/2 cup brown sugar

Paddy Bundles~~Laina Maki

6 tbsp flour (heaping) 3 heaping dessert spoons of butter 1 tsp baking flour sweet milk or cold water to make a soft dough

Cut into four pieces. Do not roll, but on each piece put a peeled and cored apple. With floured hands work the dough up and around the apple. Fill the hole with sugar, butter, and a couple of cloves or a bit of cinnamon. Work the dough over the hole. Brush with milk. Place a pan, adding a little sweetened water. Bake 30-40 minutes at 325°F. Serve with cream and sugar or the sauce they were cooked in.



PREVENT HEATING EQUIPMENT FIRES

WHAT'S THE RISK?

Heating equipment fires account for 1 in 10 home fires.

Heating equipment is the **second leading** cause of home fires.

In 29% of home heating fires, the cause is lack of routine maintenance of heating equipment.

The majority of chimney fires occur in the shoulder seasons of November and April.

The leading causes of heating equipment fires are:

- woodstoves
- 2. fireplace/fireplace inserts
- chimneys.

Statistics for Ontario between 2010-2014. Provided by the Office of the Fire Marshal and Emergency Management

How do I prevent a heating fire?

- Have your heating system and chimneys inspected and cleaned annually by a qualified service technician.
- Ensure all outside heating vents are not blocked.
- Ensure woodstoves, fireplaces and fireplace inserts are installed by a qualified technician according to manufacturer's instructions.
- Always use a fire screen around the fireplace.
- Allow ashes from your woodstove or fireplace to cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Keep the container outside.



All homes with a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage must have a working carbon monoxide alarm installed outside all sleeping areas.



Helpful Hints from the Senior Citizen Centre 2001

- To remove greasy stains from knits, try club soda
- To remove blood from clothes, soak them in cold salt water. Never put blood stains in hot water. If stain persists, soak in diluted luke warm ammonia solution. Rinse. Work in meat tenderizer. Rinse and launder. If blood is hard and dry, steep for a few hours in cold water mixed with a pinch of baking soda. Washing and bleaching will finish the process.
- To remove glue from fabrics, soak in hot water and vinegar, or vinegar alone. Soak in warm water and boil if necessary.
- Undiluted hair shampoo when rubbed into grass stains will remove them easily
- To get gum out of fabric, first rub with an ice cube and scrape off excess with a dull knife. Then sponge with carbon tetrachloride or solvent until gum yields.
- To start your lawn mower after the long winter in a damp garage or shed, try putting it out in the sun for a while to warm it up. Better still set it on concrete or black top to speed the warming.
- To prevent further rusting of car paint, rub petroleum jelly in scratches and chips in late autumn.
- When baking rhubarb pies, bake the bottom crust for eight minutes before putting in the filling. This prevents the pie from becoming soggy
- Easy lemon and lime storage, store them in an empty egg carton. They won't roll around, or get lost, inside the fridge.
- To collect cat and dog hair on couches and rugs put on a pair of rubber kitchen gloves and rub your hands along the surface. The hair will accumulate in a little ball, ready to throw away
- The best way to ensure that your dinner guests will enjoy what you serve is to keep them waiting until they are good and hungry
