May is emergency preparedness month and after last month's extended power outages and wild weather, what better time to pack/repack your 72-hour kit.

Some ideas for inclusion into your kits:

Food for 72 hours. Choose things that are easy to cook and require minimal water to prepare.	Bottled water or a way to purify it. Plan for at least 4 liters/per person/ per day
Clothes for all seasons (think layers) – twice a year check to make sure that kids haven't outgrown them.	Entertainment – consider adding new books or games, a new toy, and a charged battery backup pack
At least 3 days worth of essential medications	Batteries and extra gas for your generator
Light source – candles and flashlights	Pet food, medication, and supplies
Copies of essential documents in case you have to leave in a hurry	Garbage bags, sawdust, toilet paper, and 5 gallon pail for a makeshift toilet

Remember - each kit should be tailored to what your family needs. Seniors, children, infants, and pets all have specific needs, and it is important to keep those specific needs in mind as you build your kit.



SPRING - NEW BEGINNINGS By Marion Urquhart



Gardening In Murillo from CBC News

A gardener and seed supplier from Murillo, Ontario says while the pandemic is having negative impacts on nearly all aspects of life, it is also providing some opportunities for teaching people about growing food.

Wendy O'Connor is one of the suppliers for Superior Seeds, a collective that provide locally adapted, sustainably grown seeds.

O'Connor said initially, she was not optimistic about what the pandemic was going to do to local agriculture gardening. However, O'Connor now believes it has many people looking at their backyards as a potential source of both comfort and sustainable food.

O'Connor said Superior Seed Producers is a collective of Thunder Bay area seed growers. The members promote the saving and distribution of locally adapted, sustainably grown, open-pollinated, non-GMO seeds in Northwestern Ontario. The group does this through educating and supporting those who want to learn more about saving seeds, and by making locally grown seed available to gardeners in the region. Northwestern gardeners only have from 100 to 110 frost free days. (Wendy O'Connor)

O'Connor said she has definitely noticed an increase in interest in vegetable gardening this spring. She said for new gardeners in the northwest, a key thing to keep in mind is the short growing season.

O'Connor said the frost free time in the northwest, by Ontario standards, is pretty short; and according to the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food, is 100 to 110 days. She said when you go to your hardware store or you go online and are ordering seeds, you want to look at the days to maturity for those seeds. If you pick anything that's under 100 days and get it planted out at the end of May beginning of June that variety will have time to produce its vegetable or fruit within that time period.

"So generally we're going from beginning of June to just within the first third of September for a frost free time here in Thunder Bay," she said. "So don't get a seed packet for something that says one hundred and thirty days because unless we have an exceptional season that's not going to produce."

Foraging

Harvesting edible wild plants can be a fun, educational and sustainable activity for all ages if it is done properly. Ontario Nature has identified some basic rules for harvesting wild plants to ensure the safety of participants and the sustainability of plants involved.

Be sure you know what you are harvesting, and eat only plants you can positively identify as edible. Learning about plants from a local expert, consulting books and taking courses or workshops are recommended..

Harvest plants in areas where you know the risk of contamination from industrial and other pollution is low.

Eat only a small quantity of any plant you have not eaten before and assess how it affects you before eating more.

Although foraging for edible plants is permitted on most public land in Ontario, obtain permission from the owner before collecting plants on private property. Another best practice is to obtain permission from the local First Nation community before harvesting on traditional territory.

Most importantly, take only what you can use and use what you take. Edible wild plants are a shared resource. Users of them must take responsibility for ensuring that they will continue to thrive year after year.

Ground Rules of Foraging

Never harvest more than 10% of the crop.

If you're not after the root of the plant, say fiddleheads for example, don't take the root.

Know what you're picking and know it well, especially with mushrooms, but this goes for sumac, fiddlehead look-a-likes, and more. Do your research.

Bring your fillet knife, snips, or pocket knife.

Spring Foraging

Fiddleheads: These scrumptious greens are incredible fried in a pan with a bit butter of bread crumbs. Warning: Fiddleheads can cause sore stomachs when they aren't blanched (boiled lightly) before roasting/frying or cooking them otherwise. There are also different types of ferns that look similar; make sure you do a full identification before setting off.

Morels: These mushrooms are a favourite amongst foragers and for good reason. Warning: Do not eat morels raw, and remember the old saying: "There are old mushroom pickers and there are bold mushroom pickers, but there are no old, bold mushroom pickers." In other words, know what you're picking.

Antlers: A fun scavenger hunt for "white gold" while you're out and about is never a waste of time. If you find one, look for its mate nearby; you may just get lucky.

Wild Leeks (Ramps): These garlicky-onion tasting greens are great additions to camp breakfasts and dinners. Save the harvesting area some stress by cutting wild leeks off above the bulb. You'll have to dig a bit, but it's worth it, especially if you want to continue coming back to the patch you've found!
