



### Apple Pancakes from Grassroots 1989

2cups sifted all-purpose flour


- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 well beaten eggs yolks
- 2 cups milk
- 2 stiffly beaten egg whites
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1 cup finely chopped apples

Sift together all dry ingredients. Combine egg yolks & milk. Pour wet ingredients into dry ingredients and stir well. Stir in butter and apples. Fold in egg whites. Let stand a few minutes. Bake on a hot griddle using 1 soup ladle of batter for each pancake. Use a spoon to spread batter evenly. When done dot with butter, sprinkle with confectioners sugar. Roll up. Makes 12. Serve with maple syrup, bacon, orange juice, and coffee

### Harvesting Tips For Your Garden

Handle the produce carefully when picking or harvesting. Hold fruits and vegetables firmly but twist them off the stems or soil gently. Morning is the best time to harvest as water content in vegetables, fruits, and even flowers is still high. Don't harvest during the rain as this could cause damage and spread plant diseases.

Pick gently – When harvesting, grasp the veggie gently, but firmly. Ripe produce can easily bruise, which can lead to premature spoilage.

Snap cleanly – Some vegetable stems have a natural breaking point while others may rip or tear when the fruit is removed. Use scissors or a knife to make a clean cut. Damaging the plant can reduce future yields.

Step carefully – It's all too easy to step on vines when moving around the garden. This not only damages the plant, but it gives an entry point for disease. If you spot yellow leaves or rotting vegetables, remove them. No sense in letting the plant put forth energy into a plant or vegetable you won't be able to use.

Use a basket – Baskets prevent damage to the produce during harvest and transport. Low, long baskets are preferable for vegetable harvesting. Taller containers create a column of weight which can damage the produce at the bottom.

Check regularly – Warm weather and adequate rainfall helps veggies grow and reach maturity quickly. Check the garden on a daily basis to prevent vegetables from becoming overripe.

Garden harvesting info can often be found on the back of seed packets and plant tags. The description of the size and color of mature veggies as well as the "days to maturity" provides a harvesting guide to help gardeners decide when and how to harvest their veggies

### Home Remedies or Old Wives Tales?

Eating Chocolate for Nausea

Eating chocolate might not be your first choice when you are feeling queasy, but it can help. The tannins in chocolate dry out your mouth, which helps to counteract the excess saliva production that happens when you are nauseous. This remedy is especially good for motion sickness.

Cure Athlete's Foot with Garlic

Athlete's foot causes a scaly rash that burns and stings. A compound in garlic called ajoene has antifungal properties that fight the cause of athlete's foot. Simply crush a few cloves of garlic and mix them with olive oil. Then, use a cotton ball to apply this mixture to the athlete's foot rash a few times a day until it clears up.

Try Lemon Juice for Earaches

Earaches can be very painful. Lemon juice has long been known for its antiseptic and antiviral properties, usually on the surface of the skin. However, it can also be used to cure an earache. Simply squeeze some lemon juice into a bowl and dip the end of a Q-tip into it. Gently roll the q-tip around in the ear (making sure to stay superficial so you don't puncture your eardrum), and the lemon juice will do the rest. The acidity in the lemon juice will help both destroy the bacteria causing the ear infection and rebalance the pH level in the ear.

Have a old fashioned remedy, drop me a line. I'll do the research and see what we come up with. Of course this by no means replaces going to a doctor for you medical needs, just curious what remedies used to be used before modern medicine.
