Canadian Thanksgiving started in 1859 when Protestant leaders called on the colonial government to create a day for giving thanks. As many Canadians gather this weekend to enjoy a feast with loved ones, some Indigenous households are reclaiming the holiday and practicing Indigenous gratitude instead. The name Thanksgiving is unique to the U.S. and Canada. No other English-speaking countries celebrate a holiday with that name. Harvest celebrations, however, are nothing new. For the First Nations people who lived in North America before European settlers came, harvest celebrations were an important annual ritual.

Foods traditionally served at Thanksgiving include roasted turkey, roast beef, ham, stuffing, mashed potatoes with gravy, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, sweet corn, various autumn vegetables including various kinds of squashes, but also Brussels sprouts, pumpkin pie, apple pie, and glazed yams.

Heating your Home

Most Important!

- Check all smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to make sure they work and change the batteries. It is the law for all Ontario homes to have a working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas. This covers single family, semidetached and town homes, whether owner-occupied or rented.
- Have a useable fire extinguisher available.

Fireplaces and Woodstoves

- Have heating appliances serviced and chimney flues examined for defects.
- Have fireplaces and fireplace dampers checked.
- Fireplaces should be equipped with an appropriate screen or glass enclosure to prevent sparks from flying out.
- Wood burning stoves should be examined and the flue and chimney checked for creosote buildup. Creosote is a deposit from smoke that can build up in a chimney and can start a fire.
- Use only seasoned woods, and avoid soft woods like Pine, etc.
- Never use a flammable liquid to start a fireplace.
- Never overload the hearth with wood or artificial logs, the resulting fire may be too large for the unit.
- Put all ashes outdoors and away from the house in a metal container.

Space Heaters

- Make sure that any space heaters are surrounded by at least three feet of empty space.
- Never place clothing or any other objects on a space heater to dry.
- Do not place space heaters near furniture or drapery.
- Turn space heaters off when you leave the house or go to bed.
- Avoid storing any combustible items near heaters.



Queen Elizabeth II History

- ◆ Elizabeth Alexandra Mary; 21 April 1926 8 September 2022
- Queen of the United Kingdom and other Commonwealth realms from 6 February 1952 until her recent death.
- Her reign of 70 years and 214 days is the longest of any British monarch, the longest recorded of any female head of state in history, and the second-longest verified reign of any sovereign in history.
- Elizabeth was born in Mayfair, London, as the first child of the Duke and Duchess of York (later King George VI and Queen Elizabeth).
- She was educated privately at home and began to undertake public duties during the Second World War, serving in the Auxiliary Territorial Service.
- In November 1947, she married Philip Mountbatten, a former prince of Greece and Denmark, and their marriage lasted 73 years until his death in April 2021. They had four children: Charles, Anne, Andrew, and Edward.
- The number of her realms varied over time as territories gained independence and some realms became republics.
- Her many historic visits and meetings include state visits to China in 1986, Russia in 1994, and the Republic of Ireland in 2011, and meetings with five popes.
- The Oueen visited Thunder Bay in 1951 before her coronation, 1959, & 1973
- Significant events include Elizabeth's coronation in 1953 and the celebrations of her Silver, Golden, Diamond, and Platinum jubilees in 1977, 2002, 2012, and 2022, respectively.
- She was served by more than 170 prime ministers across her realms. Throughout her lifetime, support for the monarchy in the United Kingdom remained consistently high, as did her personal popularity.
- Elizabeth died aged 96 at Balmoral Castle, Aberdeenshire, on 8 September 2022, and was succeeded by her eldest son, Charles III.

Cooking & Baking Hints from Nolalu Community Cookbook 1975

- When cutting hot bread, use a piece of common twine instead of a knife and it will not crumble
- Brown leftover bread pieces in the oven and dry thoroughly. Then roll or grind up fine, add seasonings such as paprika, salt, pepper, or seasoned salt. Store in a tightly covered jar. Use for baked chicken, fish, or meat
- When preparing lettuce for the table, place it in a dry linen bag or fold it into a cloth & shake for a minute. This absorbs the moisture
- Never place potatoes where the sun shines on them, as the light will give them a
 queer, unpleasant flavour. Also the green from too much sun on the potatoes is poisonous
- Dip an onion in boiling water and then begin peeling at the root and peel upwards.
 Less tears.
- To freshen old or wilted vegetables soak them in very cold water for two to three hours before cooking
- Stuffed prunes make a delicious salad when stewed, then chilled, and seeded. Stuff with cream and nuts
- When you need to cook vegetables quickly add a pinch of baking soda to the boiling water, it will hasten the cooking
- If you wet your hands before touching fish, you will find that the odour will come off readily when you are through preparing it


From the Editor's Desk





<u>Unsafe, Unacceptable, and Deteriorating Quickly</u> <u>Rural Roads of Lybster Township!</u>

At the Local Roads Board Annual Meeting, held Sept 21,2022 there was a majority consensus that the roads of Lybster Township are Unsafe, Unacceptable and Deteriorating quickly. There has been minimal repairs and maintenance done to our local roads and the question as to why was presented to the local board and MTO representative. Here is what we learned... During the reading of the financial report, it was evident that the community has significant funding available to do maintenance and repairs on our local roads but over the past two years very little has been done. This raised the question Why?

We have a local roads board, we have an annual meeting, the roads board has shown due diligence by completing their annual inspection of the Lybster Township roads, these findings are presented to the Ministry of Transportation and from this meeting a work program is set in place, and then...Nothing!!!

The work program is to be managed and supervised by the MTO and this is where the system breaks down. In an area that once had 22 employees there are now 3; three people to manage, organize, and supervise work projects across the NorthWest Region Municipal Section. If you concerned about the condition of our roads, the lack of maintenance, the lack of repairs and the empty promises made from year to year the call for help from the board and concerned citizens at the meeting went out. Please email, call, or mail letters. Express your personal experiences and concerns, ask the question why and demand answers and action; let them know that our roads are <u>Unsafe</u>, <u>Unacceptable</u> and <u>Deteriorating</u> Quickly.


