Remembrance Day was first observed in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth. It was originally called "Armistice Day" to commemorate armistice agreement that ended the First World War on Monday, November 11, 1918, at 11 a.m.—on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

In 1931, Alan Neill, Member of Parliament for Comox-Alberni, introduced a bill to observe Armistice Day only on November 11. Passed by the House of Commons, the bill also changed the name to "Remembrance Day". The first Remembrance Day was observed on November 11, 1931.

Every year on November 11, Canadians pause in a moment of silence to honour and remember the men and women who have served, and continue to serve Canada during times of war, conflict and peace. We remember the more than 2,300,000 Canadians who have served throughout our nation's history and the more than 118,000 who

made the ultimate sacrifice.

The poppy is the symbol of Remembrance Day. Replica poppies are sold by the Royal Canadian Legion to provide assistance to Veterans.

Remembrance Day is a federal statutory holiday in Canada. It is also a statutory holiday in three territories (Yukon, Northwest Territories and Nunavut) and in six provinces (British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland and Labrador).

The national ceremony is held at the National War Memorial in Ottawa. The Governor General of Canada presides over the ceremony and is attended by the Prime Minister, Veterans, and the general public. In advance of the ceremony, long columns of Veterans, Canadian Armed Forces members, RCMP officers, and cadets march to the memorial lead by a pipe band and a colour guard. At the end of the ceremony, they march away to officially close the ceremony.

A Silver Cross Mother (French: Mères décorées de la Croix d'argent) is chosen each year by the Royal Canadian Legion to lay a wreath during the Remembrance Day ceremony at the National War Memorial in Ottawa on behalf of all mothers who have lost children in the service of their country.

CHIMNEY FIRES

A Fireplace becomes dangerous when accumulated tar or creosote catches fire or from uncontrolled burning or over-fuelling. Other causes of fireplace-related fires are substandard design or installation and lack of safety precautions.

Heating fires account for 36% of residential home fires in rural areas every year. Often these fires are due to creosote buildup in chimneys and stovepipes. All home heating systems require regular maintenance to function safely and efficiently.

Simple steps prior to the heating season will help reduce the possibility of a chimney fire in your home.



Maintenance - Good maintenance is a very important step in preventing chimney fires!

- Have your chimney checked every year by a qualified chimney professional.
- Burn only well-seasoned hardwoods.
- Install a chimney cap.
- Install a carbon monoxide detector.
- Have your chimney sweep ensure that your chimney has an appropriate liner.
- Following a violent storm, earthquake, flood or lightning strike, have your chimney inspected for damage - inside and out.

Prevention - Remember prevention is your best defense against fire.

- If you have a wood or coal stove, be sure it is installed at least 36 inches away from the wall. Keep combustible materials well away from the stove and chimney connector. Place an approved stove board under the unit to protect the floor from heat and hot coals which might drop out.

***Be Prepared – Know what to do in case of fire.
If you suspect a chimney fire,
evacuate your home and call 9-1-1***

Cooking & Baking Hints from Nolalu Community Cookbook 1975

- ◆ Thin slices of bread or cake can be cut if the knife is heated until quite hot, or dipped in boiling water for a few minutes. Wipe the blade dry before cutting
- ◆ Sprinkle a little coffee on the raw fish and it will keep the odour from smelling up the refrigerator. The coffee will not discolour the fish and is easily wiped off
- ◆ To prevent fish from sticking to the pan while frying, put a teaspoon of salt in the hot pan and rub it with wax paper
- ◆ When catering with fish, allow one half-pound of fish for each person when it is the main course. If it is a simple course a quarter-pound is sufficient. When using fillets, one fillet per person for simple course or two fillets for main course
- ◆ The splattering of hot grease can be avoided by placing a little salt in the frying pan
- ◆ All cooking fats and drippings should be kept in the refrigerator to prevent them from becoming rancid
- ◆ If a teaspoon of vinegar is added to the fat, it will prevent the food from absorbing the grease while frying
- ◆ For getting rid of grease in the sink rub it with Indian meal and it will be quickly removed. (Side note; can anyone tell me what Indian meal is)
- ◆ Coffee grounds thrown into the sink and washed down the drain will keep the drain pipe clean
- ◆ Brush a measuring cup with grease before putting molasses into it. The fat will form a coating so that the molasses leaves no trace of sweetness
- ◆ Package meats tightly in moisture proof wrapping before freezing it to prevent the drying effects of freezer burn. Freeze at 0degrees or less. The faster meat freezes the better its quality is retained. Use as soon as practical after freezing, they don't improve with age.
- ◆ Are you bothered with mice around your cooking area or elsewhere in the house? Place pieces of camphor where they frequently are, and they will soon disappear.
- ◆ Leftover meat will keep much better if the gravy is not poured over it. Gravy often sours more rapidly
- ◆ When roast meat cold, the flavour can be preserved, if it is wrapped in a damp cloth while it is still hot

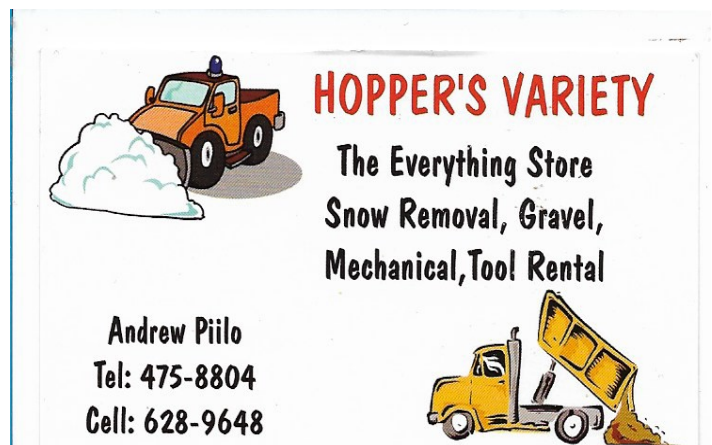

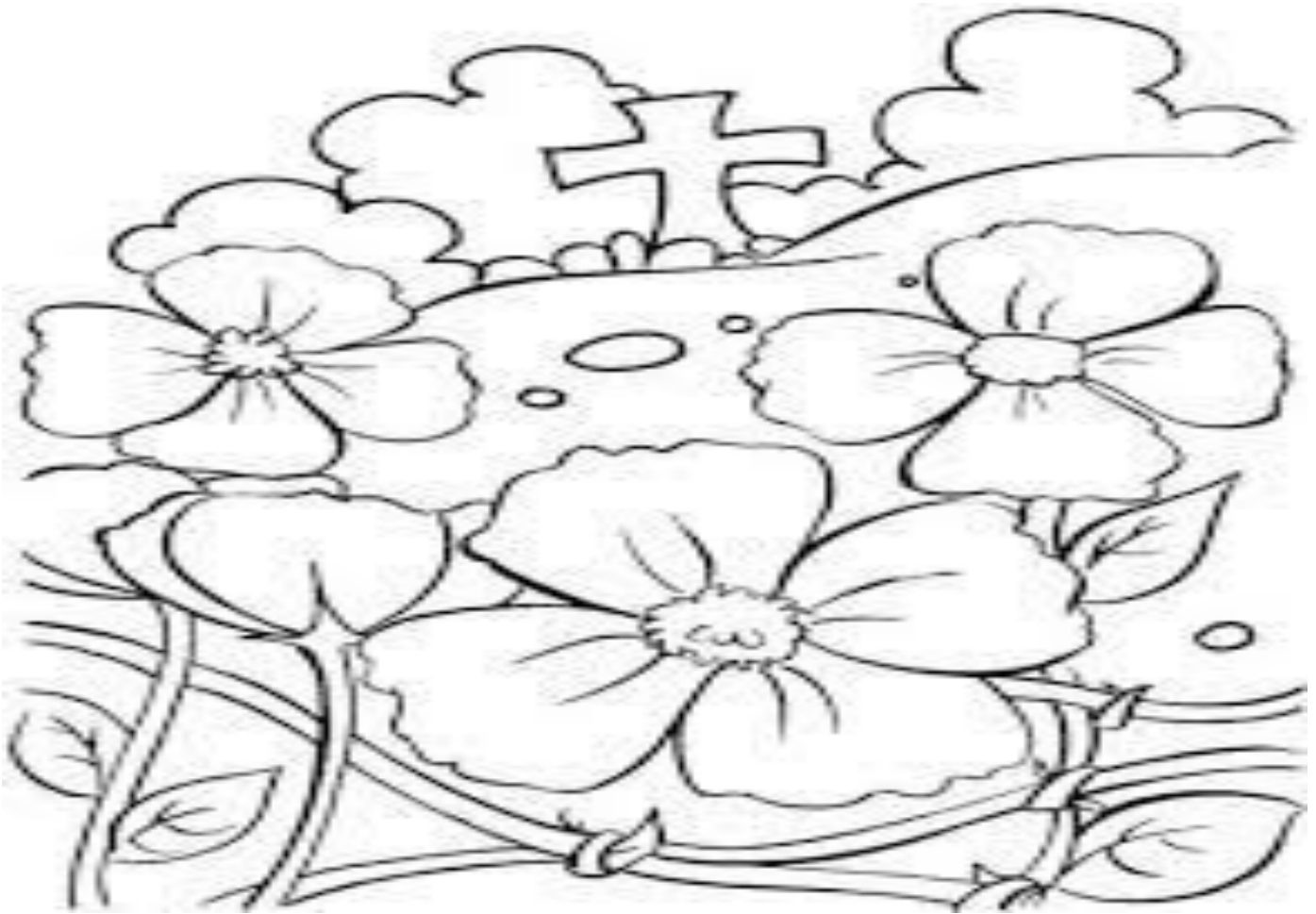
