Fun Facts About Christmas In Canada

- Canada was first introduced to the Christmas tree in 1781 in Sorel, Quebec, by a German immigrant, Baron Friederick von Riedesel. The number of farms that grow Christmas trees in Canada is 2381. The most Christmas tree farms are found in Ontario, with 647 farms. The average area of land per farm allocated to growing Christmas trees is 55 acres in Quebec. Christmas tree farms in Quebec are, on average, the largest in Canada, followed by Nova Scotia with an average size of 52 acres per farm.
- 6.7 million litres The volume of commercial sales of eggnog in Canada in December. Virtually all eggnog sales are in November and December.
 \$449 million The amount of monthly sales of candy, Christmas chocolate and snack foods sales at large retailers in December, the month with the highest sales.
 \$549 million The value of consumer electronics, such as televisions and audio and video equipment purchased in Canada in December, with a 127% spike compared to average monthly sales.
 \$435 million The value of toys, games and hobby supplies, including video games, purchased in Canada in December, up a whopping 184% from average monthly sales for this category.
- As a general rule, Canadian children believe in Santa Claus. Canadians are especially proud to say that their country is the home of Santa Claus, and in some corners of Canada, Christmas is celebrated 365 days a year. They even have towns named for Christmas:

Reindeer Station (Northwest Territories) Christmas Island (Nova Scotia) Sled Lake (Saskatchewan) Holly (Ontario) Noel (Nova Scotia) Turkey Point (Ontario) Snowflake (Manitoba)



- Each year Canadian volunteers reportedly give 200,000 hours of time helping Santa answer letters from children all over the world!
- As a warm family tradition, most Canadians will sit down to a Christmas Day dinner that harks back to a traditional UK Christmas feast of roast bird, stuffing and sauces.
- And even before the final cleanup, Canadians will be planning for a post-holiday shopping extravaganza otherwise known as Boxing Day.

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

WHOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.



HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

- (1) More than **two of every five** decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.







Cooking & Baking Hints from Nolalu Community Cookbook 1975

- After cleaning a chicken or turkey, rub the inside and outside thoroughly with a lemon before putting in the dressing. This makes the meat white, juicy, and tender. Adding a teaspoon of vinegar to the water when boiling, also makes it tender.
- Drop a few small pieces of camphor in the box that contains the silverware, and it will prevent it from tarnishing. To remover scratches from silverware, rub it with a paste made of olive oil and putty powder. Rub gently with a soft cloth, then wash with hot water.
- Do not keep olive oil in a cold place as it is injured by freezing. Always keep it in an airtight jar or tin.
- Variations for a plain white cake: coconut, chopped nuts, citron and raisins, dates, or spices to the batter before baking (anise, caraway, or fennel seed are unusual and delicious)
- When water is boiled for drinking and cooking purposes, try pouring it from one pitcher to another several times before using. It will lose its flat flavour.
- If steel knives should become discoloured, dampened fine fire ashes will clean them effectively.
- Before putting new cast iron ware to use, it is always advisable to boil it.
- If your breadbox is rusty, clean it by rubbing it with emery paper, gently. To prevent further rusting, coat it with some lard. Good for cookie tins too.
- Cakes. If too much flour is used, the cake will crack on the top. It will rise over the top of the pan and have a coarse texture if baked in too slow an oven. If put in too hot an oven, it will brown on top before it has risen sufficiently. Do not move a cake in the oven until it has risen to its full height. Cakes require a moderate oven. The larger the cake, the slower the oven.
- Try cutting cheese into chunks, putting it in a covered fruit jar in the fridge. The cheese will stay fresh for a long time.
- To cut a slab of bacon into thin, even slices, first chill it in the freezer until firm.
- Mending knives. When they come loose from their bone or ivory handles, they may be repaired by powdering some resin, and filling the hollow with it. Then heat the iron stalk of the knife or fork, until red hot and press into handle until it is in its original place. Wipe off excess. Let alone until firm and dry.
- Brush tops of bread loaves with water before baking for crispier crust.
- Crystal glasswares or dishes are less likely to break if they are placed on the stove, in a pan of cold water, and allowed to come to a boil. Let boil for about 10 minutes and then allow to cool in the same water. If your water is hard use rain water.

Canada Post's Santa Letter Writing Service has been running for more than 35 years.

To date, more than 26million letters have been answered in over 30 different languages – including Braille – and letters have come from all around the world. The service processes an average of a million letters a year and roughly 200,000 elves (err, OK, volunteers from the Canadian postal service) donate their time to write or type replies on behalf of the Great Man himself.

Instead of the grey sacks used for day-to-day mail, all the Christmas letters are sorted into bright red sacks of the very kind Santa himself uses. What's more, the service is absolutely free. 'Letters to Santa do not require postage within Canada and the response from Santa is delivered free.

There are just three requirements. Firstly, all letters must be sent before 14 December. Santa is a busy man in December and needs plenty of time to get writing. Secondly, letters must be sent to the correct address: Santa Claus, North Pole, H0H 0H0, Canada. The postal code is particularly important: it was specially commissioned for the Santa post and letters won't reach the North Pole without it. Finally, while lists are fine, Father Christmas enjoys proper letters. Children are encouraged to write about their likes and dislikes, what they have been up to and what they would like for Christmas, and are free to include illustrations. They put a temporary cast while we waited quite a few days till they were able to get her into the operating room. She needed surgery to put a plate and pins in her ankle. Now she is on crutches and will be in physio-therapy for six months after the cast comes off. So life will be a little different around here with Rob and I seeing to getting our grandson on and off the bus, and doing a lot more of the chores. We got a crash course in how to take care of the chickens and the bunnies.


