Valentine's Day, also called St. Valentine's Day, is held on February 14 and is a time when love is expressed with greetings and gifts. It has been suggested that the holiday has origins in the Roman festival of Lupercalia. The festival, which celebrated the coming of spring, included fertility rites and the pairing off of women with men by lottery. At the end of the 5th century, Pope Gelasius 1 forbade the celebration of Lupercalia, but the true origin of the holiday is vague at best. Valentine's Day did not come to be celebrated as a day of romance until about the 14th century. Formal messages, or valentines, appeared in the 1500s, and by the late 1700s commercially printed cards were being used. Valentines commonly depict Cupid, the Roman god of love, along with hearts. Traditional gifts include candy and flowers, particularly red roses, a symbol of beauty and love.

Groundhog Day—Thousands of years ago when animalism and nature worship were prevalent, people in the part of Europe where Germany is today, believed that the badger had the power to predict the coming of spring. They watched the badger to know when to plant their crops. This tradition was brought over to North America, predominantly to Pennsylvania, where it was the groundhog, not the badger, which made these "predictions". According to folklore, if the groundhog sees its shadow on February 2 it will return to its burrow, indicating that there will be six more weeks of winter. If it does not see its shadow, then spring is on the way.

The Groundhog Day concept first became popular in Canada in 1956 when Wiarton Willie became a household name for his early February weather predictions. Wiarton's Groundhog Day festival grew as Willie's fame increased. It became one of the largest winter festivals in Bruce County, Canada. There are also other groundhogs in different parts of Canada. For example, Shubenacadie Sam is reportedly the first groundhog in the country to stick its head out on Groundhog Day. Other groundhogs include: Gary the Groundhog in Ontario, Brandon Bob in Manitoba and Balzac Billy in Alberta.



3 cups milk


1 tsp. salt

Essential Oils





Home Fire Safety for Older Adults

Fire Safety for Older Adults

 Ontario adults 65 years and older are at higher risk of dying by fire than any other age group.

Common fire scenarios involving adults 65 years and older:

- People smoking in their living area or bedroom while sleepy. Burning cigarettes or ashes
 ignite furniture/bedding or clothing.
- 2. People reaching over a hot burner on the stove and igniting clothing.

Make sure a fire never starts by following these simple tips:

- If you smoke use large, deep ashtrays. If anyone in the home smokes, smoke outside.
 Never smoke in bed.
- Don't reach for danger! Wear tight-fitting or rolled-up sleeves when cooking and don't reach over a hot burner. Always stay in the kitchen when you are cooking.
- Always blow out candles before leaving the room.
- Ensure items that can burn are one metre away from space heaters.
- Avoid overloading the electrical outlets. Extension cords should be used only as a temporary connection.
- Avoid running cords under rugs, which can damage the cord and cause a fire.
- Install a smoke alarm on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Test smoke alarms once a month and replace the battery once a year, or whenever the lowbattery warning sounds.
- Know exactly what to do and where to go if there is a fire. Plan and practice your escape!
 Develop a home fire escape plan or refer to your building's fire safety plan.
- Know your local emergency number. It may be 9-1-1 or the fire department's phone number



My Mom and Dad love having their great grandchildren visit, they get a special smile on their face that lights up their eyes when they hear Amma, Papa, love you.

I am fortunate to also have great neighbours. A special thank-you to Sonya and Brad for looking after our place while we were in Thunder Bay taking care of all the illness in our family these past few months. It's nice to know that the chickens and rabbits are fed, and the house checked on when we are gone. I also met my neighbours down the road in December. A lovely couple who inquired if we had back up heat for the coming winter weather. So nice that everyone looks out for everyone else in this great community. Rob and I have enjoyed becoming a part of this community and helping out at the NCC. It has been great to get to know everyone in the area and really helpful to know who can fix things when you need it. I'm also a firm believer in shopping local, so it has been helpful to know who makes what, and where to buy everything we need. We now get our beef and turkeys locally, some handicrafts, water, vehicle mechanic, odds and ends, and of course local trades people have been at our house for months. The Grassroots readers have been helpful in guiding me in my gardening and where to buy things, which is so helpful when you are new to an area. I know it will be many years before this place is known as the Houle house, but for now we are the place where the old post office is and that is good with us. Having come from a very small village in southern Ontario we understand it takes about 20 years before the place becomes known as yours and not just the old post office, and we are ok with that. Nolalu has been so welcoming and friendly, we feel like we've always been here, and for that we will be forever grateful. Nolalu you are a wonderful community of generous, kind, and friendly people and we are thrilled to have become part of your village.


