

Cooking and Baking Hints from The Scoble Cookbook Almanac, 1983 Volume 1

- Keep milk from sticking and scorching by adding a little sugar to the pan and don't stir.
- Caffeine can be removed from tea by pouring a small amount of boiling water over the bag and let sit for 30 seconds. Drain off water and then make the required amount of tea.
- Southern Fried Chicken—stir in a little baking powder with the flour you use to coat the pieces of fowl. This makes a fine crisp covering when frying.
- Cutting your own chicken and chops from whole fryers and loins, will save 30-50% on your poultry or meat bill.
- Beater bowls will hold steady if you rest them on a damp cloth while you're mixing
- To make sour milk mix 1 tbsp lemon juice or vinegar to milk to make 1 cup, let stand 5 minutes
- A new powder puff can be handy for dusting a cake pan, rolling pin, or pastry board.
- Dust baking pans with ground nuts instead of flour to prevent cakes from sticking. The nuts will add a yummy flavour to the outside of a cake.
- When adding dry ingredients alternately with liquid, it is possible to overbeat, so beat quickly and lightly.
- ♦ 1 square of chocolate can be made by mixing 3 tbsp of cocoa with 1 tbsp of shortening
- If whipping cream is a little hard to whip, add a few drops of lemon juice and it will whip up quickly.
- Rhubarb wilts rapidly at room temperature. Store in fridge crisper and use in a few days. The leaves contain oxalic acid. The leaves if eaten in quantity it can be fatal.
- Separate eggs effortlessly by plopping into a kitchen funnel. The yolk will be trapped as the white drops through.
- Substitute Egg; use 2 tbsp vinegar mixed with 1 tsp baking soda. But don't try it for more than 1 egg.
- Brown sugar will not harden if stored in the freezer.
- Brown sugar that is hard can be softened by adding a slice of apple or a very fresh slice of white bread to the bag or canister in which it is stored.
- To avoid water boiling over while cooking vegetables, pastas, etc., add some margarine to the water.
- A Soap pad will not rust if some baking soda is put in the bottom of the container where it sits.

Snakes, Mother Natures helper

Garter snakes are a gardener's friend! Harmless to humans, they eat the pests that wreak havoc in your garden. They are a shy but helpful gardening helper who just wants to live peacefully in harmony with you—and eat your slugs!

Often called "gardener snakes," they earn that name by eating grasshoppers, slugs, grubs, and other insects. A large adult garter snake may even eat mice. Unfortunate-

ly, they also eat some critters such as frogs, toads, salamanders, and earthworms, which can be beneficial to the garden. Garter snakes won't bite you unless provoked. They won't chase you. They are really very shy and are not looking for a fight!

Garter snakes do produce a very weak venom, but the venom is so mild that it rarely has any effect on humans. The snake uses its venom to subdue larger prey items, like frogs and mice.

In the northern half of North America they hibernate below the frostline in the winter, congregating in large numbers in burrows and crevices to keep warm during the cold months. In the spring, they emerge and mate. This is why they liked to congregate at the NCC. It was nice and warm for them under the Centre. They will need to find a new spot this year as the Centre is now all sealed off.

Females only breed every 2 to 3 years. They bear live young in the late summer, usually having between 4 and 20 babies, though some can bear up to 85! Garter snakes are relatively harmless, beneficial predators of rodents and insect pests. They eat the cucumber beetles, slugs, and squash bugs. It takes 2 years for garter snakes to reach maturity and they can live to be 10 years old in the wild.

If you see one or two in your travels just go the other way and remember they are a beneficial part of our Ecosystem.

April Fools' Day

Those who insisted on celebrating the "old" New Year's Day became known as April fools and it became common to play jokes on one another. Some also say that it has to do with Mother Nature fooling us. Sometimes, a late March/early April storm brings snow, fooling us, since the calendar says it is spring. It has been celebrated for several centuries by different cultures, though its exact origins remain a mystery. April Fools' Day traditions include playing hoaxes or practical jokes on others, often yelling "April Fools!" at the end to clue in the subject of the April Fools' Day prank.



It's that time of year again – Fire season.

By law, you need a fire permit to burn wood, brush, leaves and grass outside during the fire season (April 1 – October 31) unless you follow all the rules outlined below **AND**:

- conditions allow it to burn safely until extinguished
- you take all necessary steps to tend, control and extinguish the fire
- you are not having an open fire in a restricted fire zone

If you don't burn safely or burn material without a permit when one is needed, you can be fined and held responsible for the cost of putting out the fire and for any property damage. You can apply for a permit through your local MNRF office.

Rules to burn wood, brush, leaves or wood by-products

- ignite the fire no sooner than 2 hours before sunset and extinguish it no later than 2 hours after sunrise **AND** burn only a single pile at any one time
- ensure the pile is less than 2 metres in diameter and less than 2 metres high
- keep the fire at least 2 metres from any flammable materials
- have tools or water adequate to contain the fire at the fire site
- ensure a responsible person tends the fire until it is extinguished

Using an incinerator

- ensure the incinerator is an enclosed device constructed of non-combustible material
- cover the incinerator with a screen having a mesh size of not more than 5 millimetres
- keep the incinerator at least 5 metres from any forest area
- keep the incinerator at least 2 metres from any flammable material
- ensure a responsible person monitors the fire until it is extinguished

Rules to burn grass or leaf litter

- ignite the fire no sooner than 2 hours before sunset and extinguish it no later than 2 hours after sunrise
- keep the total area to be burned under one hectare
- ensure the flaming edge of the fire does not exceed 30 metres in length
- have tools or water adequate to contain the fire at the fire site
- ensure a responsible person tends the fire until it is extinguished.




<u>Wild Strawberry Leaf Tea - A Spring Tonic</u> <u>From Grassroots April 1990</u>

Need a "pick-me-up" after winter, "out-of-sorts"? Try wild strawberry leaf tea for a Spring tonic that puts back that "all round good feeling". Wild Strawberry leaf tea has been known for centuries as a spring tonic. It was common knowledge that strawberry leaf tea was a cure for lethargy. Early settlers picked the little leaves as soon as they made their appearance in spring and mixed up their spring brew. After a long winter without fruits and vegetables, early pioneers often lacked Vitamin C in their diets. Wild strawberry leaves contain a high percentage of Vitamin C and a dose of this vitamin from the wild strawberry leaf tonic made them feel great.



To make this stimulating brew all you have to do is go out and find some wild strawberry plants. Pick a teaspoon of fresh leaves for each cup of tea. Tear the leaves into little pieces and pout boiling water over them. Cover and let steep for at least five minutes, then drink up. Not all leaves are created with the same flavour - so experiment and try leaves from other strawberry patches. Some patches will even produce the aroma of fresh wild strawberries.

To make the tonic gather several handfuls of leaves (take only a few leaves from each plant). Put leaves in a jar and pour boiling water over them. Cover and allow to sit overnight. Next morning strain out the leaves. This tonic will keep in the fridge for a day or two. It can be reheated for a hot drink or poured over ice for a refreshing cooler.
