Nolalu and Lybster Township History

In Lybster Township just west of the intersection of Highways 590 and 588 is the village of Nolalu, the "hub" of the surrounding area. The village included the home of Archie Bishop's sawmill, the Farmers' Mercantile store, S.S. #1 Lybster school, the Finnish Organization and Rientola Halls, the Nolalu Post Office and the Nolalu Pee Dee railway stop. Building upon this foundation, the descendants of the homesteaders along with new arrivals such as Into Klamie continued to strengthen Nolalu as a vibrant and prosperous community.

In 1909 a group of Finnish farmers, feeling that a co-operative store would be to their benefit, formed the 'Farmers' Mercantile'. Among the founders were Henry Pelto, who is considered the first Finnish settler in Nolalu, Gust Maki, John Arola, John Oja, Sam Rajala and Hjalmar Seppala. Postal services began in 1903 as a catch post service, in which mail was simply dropped from a moving train, but by 1905 an actual post office was opened. The first school in Nolalu was S.S. #1 Lybster. It was a log structure built in 1910 across the river from the Farmers' Mercantile.

New immigrants became farmers raising livestock and growing potatoes, certain vegetables and some grains. However, the land, often hard red clay and otherwise rugged terrain in need of clearing from stumps and rocks, was not fertile enough to provide a living by itself. Some found work in, for example, road maintenance but most became bush workers.

Helpful Hints from the Senior Citizen Centre 2001

- ◆ Why toss your worn out t-shirts away when you can use them as handy fabric softener sheets. Just cut them up and keep them in a glass jar filled with liquid fabric softener. When your ready to dry clothes, wring out one of the rags and toss it in the dryer with your load of laundry
- ◆ Did you know that the basic ingredient of many commercial spot removals is 2 parts water to 1 part rubbing alcohol
- ◆ Fill the washer with warm water and pour a gallon of distilled vinegar into it. Run the machine through an entire cycle. The vinegar will cleanse the hoses and unclog soap scum from them
- ◆ Soothe your aching feet, add 3 tbsp of baking soda to a basin of warm water and soak.
- ◆ Cough syrup substitute, can't get rid of a little tickle in the back of your throat? Try this soothing remedy: steep honey, cloves, and lemon in hot water, pour into a mug...and sip away

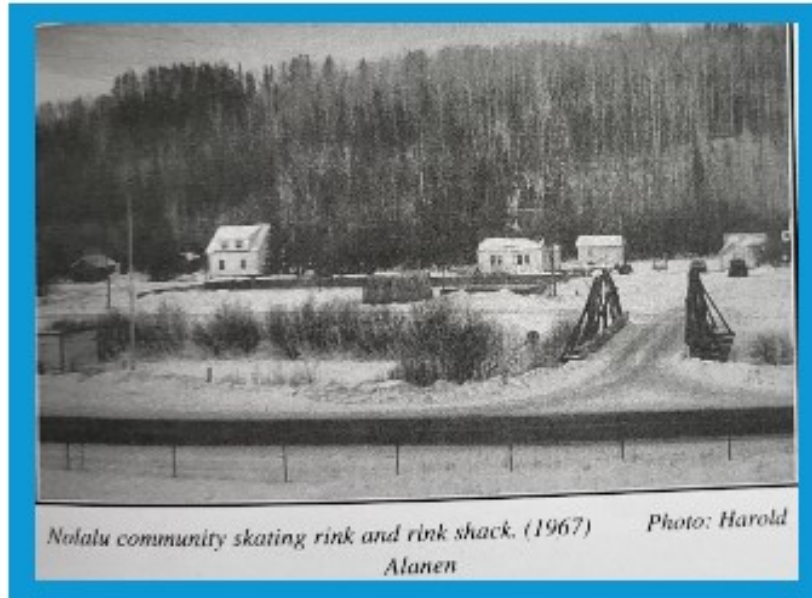

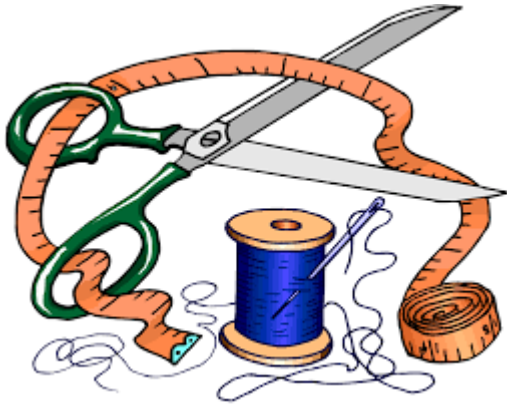

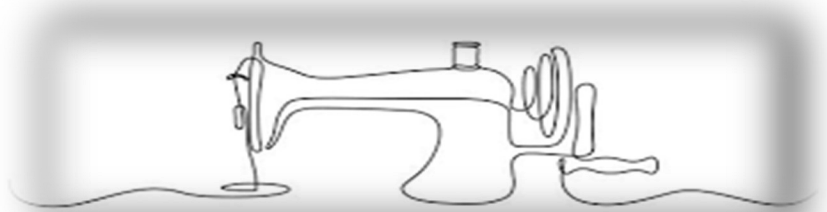

Molasses Raisin Bars

1/2 cup oil or shortening	1 cup brown sugar
1 large egg	1/4 cup molasses
1 & 1/2 cup flour	1/2 cup wheat germ or flour
2 tsp baking powder	1/2 tsp ground cloves
1 cup raisins	Pinch of salt

Cream shortening, sugar, egg, & molasses. Add flour, baking powder, salt, & spices. Stir in raisins. Spread mixture thinly on a greased cookie sheet and press firmly with floured fingers. Sprinkle with sugar. Bake at 350F for 15 to 20 min. Cut and store in an airtight container

Below are some excerpts from past Grassroots editions; 1990, 1992

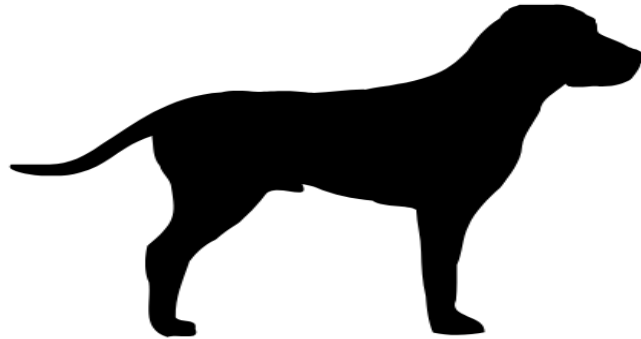
- ◆ Crayon marks and scuff marks can be removed by rubbing on toothpaste. Then wipe with a wet cloth

Campfire – small fire for the sole purpose of cooking or warmth

No restrictions on the time of day as long as there is no fire ban in place.

Prepare the site by clearing a space for the fire. Scrape the area down to the soil and remove all combustibles such as pine needles, grass, leaves and twigs.

A small fire is safer, easier to put out, and easier to cook on.

Stay nearby – never leave it unattended. If YOU started it, it is YOUR responsibility to tend until it is extinguished.

Put the fire out by pouring on lots of water, and stirring the ashes with a stick. Repeat until no more smoke comes from the ashes, they don't hiss and everything looks wet.

Brushfire – a larger fire used for burning brush or grass

Can only be set 2 hours before sunset and must be out 2 hours after sunrise.

Cannot be larger than 2 meters by 2 meters.

Keep the fire at least 2 meters from any flammable material.

You must have the tools in order to extinguish the fire on hand.

Burn only one pile at a time.

A responsible person must be present at all times to tend the fire.

From the Editor's Desk

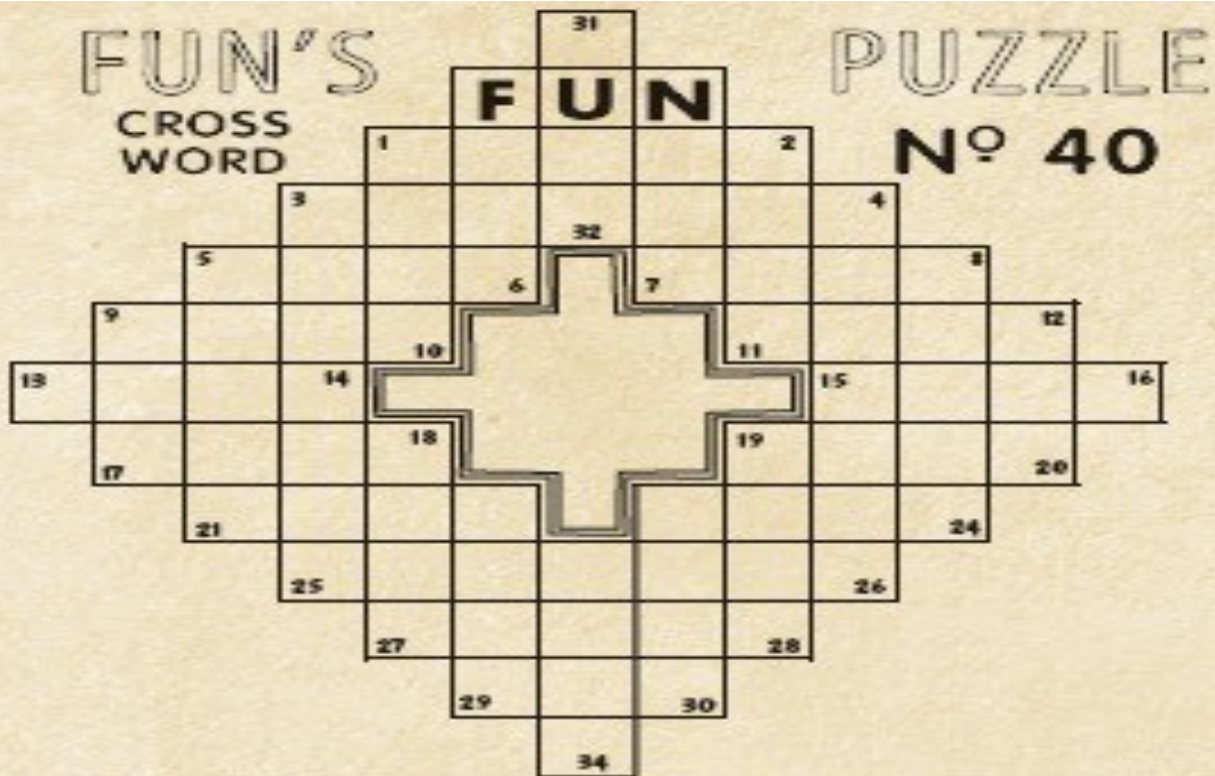
I can't believe this is the August issue already. Why does summer always seem to fly by? I guess it is because we try to pack so much into it before we are snow bound. I must confess that is exactly what we have been doing. Everyday there is something that needs to be done, and I put myself under pressure trying to accomplish it all. I think it is time I stop and smell the roses, take some deck time, or nature walks or foraging, time to enjoy summer not just work through it. We haven't even been swimming yet this year. We found some great little spots last year for picnics, swimming, enjoying nature. Now is the time to take advantage of them. My daughter suggested we go look for some wild blueberries, now that would certainly get me out and enjoying nature. I don't know where to look for them but that is ok, it's the journey that matters.

Speaking of berries, I was fortunate to get some Saskatoon berries this year. We have never had them before and I must say I love them. We have a small tree on our property that produced a few and that got us hooked. Thanks to a new friend, Mike, we were able to pick enough for jam. Just had to trade him a jar of it when it was done. It was well worth the trade, and he even helped me pick some. I'll be going back to forage on his property whenever we are able. I think raspberries are next, I need to replenish our stock of jam. We made strawberry jam and strawberry/rhubarb jam. I must say I really like the strawberry/rhubarb. My Mom has a nice little patch of it in her back yard and we have been picking it each time we visit. We have a little plant that we got a freezer bag from but it will be a few years before it is like my Mom's. My husband and daughter made me a fruit garden last week and I have half filled it with strawberry plants. I plan on filling the other half with raspberry plants and a couple currant bushes. So maybe next year I won't have to buy my berries for making jam. This year we hope to make raspberry jam and peach jam, as well as bread and butter pickles, might try dills for the first time. We are also going to do some zucchini relish, pickled beets, pickled beans, some apple butter, and some bumbleberry jam. If you have any ideas for pickling, jams, or preserves, I would love to hear from you. I don't have a pressure canner yet but it is something I am looking into. For now I just water bath the preserves. My Mom used to jar all kinds of things and when the kids were young I did to as a way to save money. Now I'm just getting back into but it is more to preserve a way of life and for healthier food choices that don't have all the chemicals used by the big companies.
