

Helpful Hints from the Senior Citizen Centre 2001

- Add a little milk to the water when cooking cauliflower and it will stay white
- Beets require less cooking time when vinegar has been added to the cooking water. Add 1 teaspoon to a quart of beets. Cook beets with their skins on to help them retain their colour and flavour
- Cooking vegetables with their skins on retains more minerals
- Shape leftover mashed potatoes into a long roll; wrap in plastic film and refrigerate. The next day slice and fry patties in butter
- To remove stains from clothing rub salt into the stain immediately and wash as soon as possible
- Use toothpaste to get a mustard stain out of clothing. A small amount will do it
- Keep toilet bowls clean with a homemade solution of baking soda and vinegar. Using a toilet brush scour for a fresh and deodorized toilet bowl
- Vinegar in the rinse cycle of your laundry not only eliminates lint, it cuts down on the soap film so your clothes are completely clean. They are also softer and fresher
- Don't use the side of the can to remove excess paint from your brush. Use a straight piece of wire coat hanger fastened across the opening of the can. To hold it in place bend the wire at right angles, inserting the ends in two nail holes punched at opposite sides of the rim
- Heat lemons in hot water or in a warm oven, before squeezing, you'll get more juice
- At home or the cottage, baking soda poured down a toilet or drain, creates a favourable pH environment for faster bacterial action. One 500g. Box per month is recommended
- Diaper pre-soak, to remove stains and reduce odours, put 1/4 cup of washing soda in a pail and dissolve with some hot water. Fill the pail with cold water, add diapers and soak
- To remove pet urine smells from carpets, pour white vinegar on the soiled area. Wipe with a dry cloth
- Grass stains can be removed with vinegar
- A tablespoon of castor oil chased by water brings sick plants out of their slump
- Your African violets will bloom longer, prettier, and more abundantly, if you stick a few rusty nails in the soil alongside them



Spicy Pumpkin Loaf (Avril Dufault)

1 & 1/2 cups flour	2 eggs	1 tsp baking powder
3/4 cup sugar	1 tsp baking soda	1/4 cup corn syrup
1/2 tsp salt	1/2 cup oil	1 tsp cinnamon
1 cup pumpkin puree	1/2 tsp ground cloves	1/2 cup raisins
3/4 tsp ginger	1/2 cup chopped nuts	1/2 tsp nutmeg

Beat eggs. Add sugar, syrup, oil, and pumpkin and beat thoroughly. Put dry ingredients in a larger bowl and stir. Make a hole in the centre of the dry ingredients and pour the liquid ingredients in, all at once. Stir until well mixed. Add raisins and chopped nuts. Pour into a well greased loaf pan. Bake in a preheated oven at 350F for 80 minutes, or until tester (needle or toothpick) comes out clean. Remove from pan and cool well before wrapping.

<u>Zucchini Soup</u>

3 cups milk	2 cans chicken broth or 2	& 1/2 cups homemade chicken stock
2 medium onions, chopped	1/2 cup butter	3lbs zucchini, chopped or sliced
1/4 tsp nutmeg	1/2 tsp basil	desired quantity of egg noodles

AVOID A RECIPE FOR DISASTER THIS FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Fire Prevention Week (FPW) runs from October 8-14, 2023 and NEST is urging everyone in Nolalu to practice fire safety while cooking with some simple tips and reminders when in the kitchen.


Cooking remains the leading cause of residential loss fires in Ontario but by following a fire safe recipe, disaster can be avoided. Adding an ounce of prevention is the not-so-secret ingredient that will ensure your meal is one to remember.

Unattended cooking, distractions, and being under the influence of alcohol or other substances leaves you unprepared to act in the event of fire. It's also recommended to avoid a cluttered workspace around the stove and loose-fitting clothes that can easily lead to items catching fire. Consider creating a prep station away from the stove, avoid cooking under the influence of alcohol or other drugs, and secure loose hair or clothing.

We urge you to never leave the kitchen when the stove is on, not even for a minute. A fire can start fast and an unattended pot on fire will spread before you are even aware. If you must leave the cooking area, turn off the stove. Unattended cooking is not an accident and can be avoided by staying by the stove.

Distractions, unattended cooking, cooking while intoxicated, cooking utensils too close to a stove, and loose-fitting clothes are all a recipe for disaster. Fire safety in the kitchen starts with prevention and being prepared.

Ensure a working smoke alarm is installed on every storey of the home and tested at least once a month. Have a home fire escape plan that is practiced by everyone in the home for a safe escape in an emergency once the smoke alarm sounds.

Beware Blasto!

A friend of mine has a camp in this area, and a lovely young retriever dog. He sent me this message:

"Just a little FYI. Our dog tested positive for Blasto last week . Vet has seen more cases from Nolalu, Whitefish and Arrow. Presents itself with skin lesions, cough or wheezing . Keep a watch on your dog for early signs . Same with people working with old wood piles and damp shaded dirt . This is my public service announcement LOL . Enjoy the fall."

Blasto is short for Blastomycosis, which is a potentially deadly fungal infection, often affecting the lungs, picked up from spores from damp soils and woodpiles. It can affect animals and humans.

This was quite coincidental, as I spent Thursday morning in emerg, having had a wicked cough for over a week. I asked them to rule out blastomycosis, as I've been digging in the dirt putting skirting on a building. After X-rays I seem to be ok, but it's not to be taken lightly, as a neighbour's dog died from Blasto a few years ago, and my friend lost a young retriever to Blasto last year. It's definitely in the neighbourhood.

So beware, and wear a mask if you're digging in old damp dirt. Go to emerg or the vet (whichever is appropriate) right away if symptoms appear.


