

All of these times may vary, depending on thickness of hair and how severe the infestation may be

Helpful Hints from the Senior Citizen Centre 2001

- Throughout the home, washing windows with a mixture of lemon juice and water will keep panes bright and clean. To avoid streaking, use a natural linen towel to wash and a second towel to dry. Rubbing the windows with newspaper also helps avoid streaking.
- Cut down on dust circulating through your home by spraying the furnace filter with Endust. (Don't know if I'd want to do this)
- Hate the smell of mothballs? Try using cloves, instead. The odour is invigorating and fresh, and they work every bit as good as mothballs. Just place them in cheesecloth spice bags and hang them in closets and slip the bags into the pockets of garments while they hang.
- Scratches in glassware will disappear if polished with toothpaste.
- Cleaner blenders—make a hard to clean blender or food processor sparkle without taking it apart: fill it halfway with soapy water, cover and turn on for 10 seconds. Pour out dirty water and repeat, then let dry.
- Softer skin in the bath, add 1/2 cup baking soda to a full tub of warm water. Leaves the skin feeling silky and smooth.
- Eliminate mold and mildew in the bathroom by brushing on baking soda mixed with hot water.
- To eliminate lime and mineral deposits around faucets and fixtures, apply vinegar soaked paper towels. Leave for about an hour. Once the deposits have been softened, they can easily be removed with a moistened cloth. Avoid using this method on marble surfaces.
- To remove ball point pen stains—use toothpaste on the stain before you wash the article.
- Place thick pieces of lemon rind in a warm oven to dispel unpleasant odours.
- Fill an old nylon stocking with cedar chips and hang in your closet to keep it smelling fresh and free of moths.
- To get a musty smell out of old books, put them in a paper bag and leave for about a week. When you take them out, there should be no musty smell.
- Vacuum cleaning: to keep it smelling fresh, empty regularly. Place a small stick of air freshener on the bag compartment.
- To peel boiled eggs more easily, add a little vinegar before cooking

At the January LSB meeting NEST will be asking the LSB to enact a by-law to allow Fire Marque to submit claims to insurance companies on our behalf. Please join us if you have any further questions or comments you'd like to add to the discussion.

Here is a FAQ on who and what Fire Marque is and does:

What or who is Fire Marque?

Fire Marque Inc. is a Canadian company that works with fire departments of all sizes across Canada. We recover from insurance companies some of the costs fire departments incur while fighting fires or dealing with other insured emergencies impacting property.

Will the Fire Marque Program cost me any money out of my pocket? No. The Fire Marque Program includes a formal agreement with the Local Services Board and a process by which to recover the costs from your insurance company—not you.

Will my insurance rates go up as a result of the Fire Marque Program? No. Your property insurance policy already has the Fire Department Expense Coverage in it, this is over and above any amount that your home is insured for. Insurance companies have calculated premiums to include cost recoveries for your fire department's services.

If Fire Marque's invoice is more than my insurance coverage, do I have to pay the balance outstanding?

No. Fire Marque will only recover from your insurance company the limits of your coverage. There is NO cost to you, and it will not be deducted from your insurance payout. This is a separate fund, and a separate limit that only the fire department can access for payment.

What if I don't have insurance or my policy doesn't have "Fire Department Expense" coverage?

Nothing happens as there is no insurance coverage.

Finnish Coffee Bread (Avril Dufault)

2 pkg. yeast 4 cups milk 1 tsp cardamon 2 eggs 12 cups flour 1/2 cup margarine

1 cup sugar 1 pinch of salt

Prepare yeast as instructed on package. Let stand 10 minutes. Meanwhile, scald milk and add margarine until it has melted and then allow mixture to cool. Add to sugar and salt. Add 4 cups of flour and cardamon. Next add eggs and yeast mixture, mixing well. Add remainder of flour until dough can be kneaded. Knead lightly for about five minutes. Cover and let rise (1 to 1 1/2 hours) in greased bowl. Punch down dough and divide into four or six pieces, depending on results wanted. Make braided loaves and place on cookie sheets for second rising (1 to 1 1/2 hours). Bake at 375F for 20 to 25 minutes. If desired a sugar and water glaze may be brushed on after.

Variations: Finished dough; you may add cut up cherries, mixed fruit, orange rind, or raisins with glaze.

Or: Roll out dough with a rolling pin. Smooth on butter or margarine, sprinkle with brown sugar and cinnamon

You may add any or all of the above. Roll up dough as you would a jelly roll. Cut into 1 inch pieces and place in a buttered pan, brown sugar on the bottom is colourful. This will form a glaze. Bake as above.


