Summer Solstice

(Excerpts taken from various sources)

There is evidence that the summer solstice has been culturally important since the Neolithic era. Many ancient monuments in Europe especially, as well as parts of the Middle East, Asia and the Americas, are aligned with the sunrise or sunset on the summer solstice The significance of the summer solstice has varied among cultures, but most recognize the event in some way with holidays, festivals, and rituals around that time with themes of fertility. The summer solstice continues to be seen as the middle of summer in many European cultures, but in some cultures or calendars it is seen as summer's beginning.

In Sweden, midsummer is one of the year's major holidays when the country closes down as much as it does during Christmas. The Summer Solstice is known as Alban Hefin (Welsh) meaning "the light of summer", Medios-saminos (Old Celtic), Meitheamh (Irish), both meaning "midsummer". Welsh tradition places the summer solstice as one of "three spirit-nights", times when the veils between the world were thin. This is the longest day, before we begin our descent back into the darkness of the coming winter. It is considered the peak of the power of light, yet a reminder that everything changes.

Our Neolithic ancestors built monuments to track the sunrise and sunset of the winter solstice, and equally each monument would also work in reverse six months later for the summer solstice. Many monuments, such as the Callanish stone circle, also include the equinoxes, and so act as a giant calendar, marking out the time and the season. Stonehenge's processional way from the River Avon was marked by the sun's path during the solstices. Until not too long ago on the Isle of Man, bundles of straw were brought to the top of designated hills at midsummer to honour the sea god, Manannán mac Lir, who would sometimes appear in the guise of a crane, or who was honoured alongside the goddess Aine in Ireland in a similar fashion. Being one of the three "spirit-nights", the summer solstice has long been connected to the Otherworld and the Fair Folk, or faeries. This is the time of the fairy ride, the faery hunt, when the hosts of Faery emerge from the Otherworld to travel across this world.

Sipulipiirakka (onion tart)

3/4 cup water (105 to 116°F) 1 ркд астіve dry yeast1 1/2 cup all purpose flour 1/2 tsp salt

1 1/2 lb sweet onions

1/4 lb diced smoked ham (1/2in dice) 1 cup sour cream 4 eggs

1 tbsp caraway seeds Pinch of salt 2 tbsp oil or melted butter

In a large bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Let stand 5 minutes. Add salt, oil or butter, and flour. Beat until dough is smooth and satiny. Cover, let rise for 1 hour (until doubled). Cut onions into thin slices. Place in frying pan along with ham and cook over low heat until onions are soft (about 15 minutes). Remove from heat, stir in sour cream, eggs, salt to taste, and caraway seeds. Butter a 10 inch pie, quiche, or tart pan. Preheat oven to 400°F. On a lightly floured board, roll out pastry to fit prepared pan. Turn filling into lined pan. Bake 35 to 40 minutes until crust is browned and pie is set.







Propane Tanks and Barbecue Safety Tips

When Transporting Cylinders:

- Ensure propane cylinders are upright and secure during transport.
- Keep cylinder valves closed and protected during transport.
- Plug or cap cylinder outlets during transport.

When Using Cylinders:

- Ensure cylinders are upright and secure on a firm footing.
- Check cylinder connections and hoses for leaks by brushing a 50/50 mix of liquid soap and
 water onto all connections and hoses. Rising bubbles when you turn on the valve indicate a
 leak. Tighten connections or repair the hose until there are no bubbles.
- Keep cylinders away from flame, heat, and exits.

Using Propane in your RV or Camper:

- Keep all combustion exhaust vents on the exterior wall of your RV or camper clear of obstructions.
- Use stovetop burners or ovens only for cooking and not as a source of heat.
- Propane appliances require an adequate supply of fresh air for proper combustion. Ensure
 your RV or camper is properly ventilated to prevent build-up of carbon monoxide.
- Install a carbon monoxide alarm and propane leak detector.

Barbecue Safety:

- Ensure barbecues are on firm, level footing.
- Keep barbecues well away from the side of your house or camper and other combustibles.
- Make sure igniter buttons work properly before turning the gas on. If there is no igniter, insert a long match or barbecue lighter through the side burner hole before you turn on the grill controls.
- Keep barbecues clean of grease to prevent flare-ups.
- Stay by the grill when cooking and keep kids and pets at a safe distance.
- Turn off all burner controls and tank valves after each use.

For something a little different this month, here is a bit of information on NEST for those in the community who may not be familiar with it. It is my hope that this will become a semi-regular entry into Grassroots. If you have something that you would like answered, send us an email at the email address below and we will answer your question here.

NEST provides, on a contract basis, fire suppression - both structural and wildland, motor vehicle collision response, medical first response, public education, and emergency management during a large scale event to the LSB and by extension to the residents of Nolalu – Marks, Lybster, Strange, Hardwick, and Lismore townships.

NEST is comprised of two entities, the board which is responsible for the financial aspect of the department, and the fire department. We are looking for volunteers for both, and there is always a job that can be done, no matter your physical limitations or time commitments.

The board's duties are mostly administrative, meeting the second Thursday of the month at 7:00pm, location TBD. They are the ones who take care of the money side of things, and make sure that the bills get paid and the lights stay on.

The fire department is where the fun happens, or I may just be biased. We train weekly on Tuesday nights, and assemble at the East Hall (by Hoppers) at 6:30pm.

We are certified as a "limited" interior attack department. What does that mean for our residents? Well, we are fully certified and trained to make entry into a burning building, however, the conditions must be such that it is reasonable to do so, we have to have enough personnel on scene, and most importantly there must be a reason to do so, such as a live trapped victim.

Tanker Tales: Bull Low

(Larry Watson describes to Liz Pszczolko a long-ago version of a Nolalu fire tanker)

Larry: Bull low is really low. (makes low angry bull sound) In a lot of situations you can just start off in two. So that's why they call it a bull low. (makes low bull sound again for emphasis). My memories of that are going up the hill on the other side of Nolalu.

Liz: Down the highway heading south?

Larry: No over the bridge in Downtown Nolalu, up Old Mill road. On gravel.

Liz: Gravel? Oh my.

Larry: You get almost to the top, going as fast as you dare but you couldn't go too fast. The thing was probably way overloaded. Maybe they beefed up the springs but still, for the power it had and how it was built, it was not meant for that kind of weight, because not very far behind the driver's seat of this full size school bus was a tank that was this wide. This high off the ground and all the way to the back. That was all water.

Liz: So this bus was a regular sized school bus?

Larry: Yeah, a full size school bus.

Liz: And the tank filled up the whole bus?

Larry: Yeah.

Liz: Round tank?

Larry: No, square. Three feet high, maybe five feet wide and the length of the whole interior. Somebody made it, ripped the back off the bus, put it in.

Liz: How did you pump the water out?

Larry: Didn't have to pump it. It was so high off the ground you just backed up to the porta-tank, and open the gate valve at the back. Just like that. Anyway, going up that hill was a little bit tricky, and I remember doing it by myself, and you'd get close to the top and you were just out of power and the thing would (makes sound of a dying motor). You have to do something. Manual transmissions back then, gear cases, were not synchronized for bull low. Cannot get it into bull low until the vehicle comes to a standstill. You'd go up as far as you had power to go, put your foot on the clutch and on the brake but who knows...on an angle like this (demonstrates angle of hill with his arm).

Liz: (laughs nervously)

Larry: ...with that much weight. So you had a split second to get it into bull low and engage it again. But before I did that, I prepared. I opened the door. If the thing takes off that way, I'm gonna to spin the wheel so it doesn't go right down the hill, kill somebody or several people, and I can jump out.

Liz: Do vou remember how much water it held?

Larry: I'm guessing about 1200 gallons, but I don't know.

Liz: So I'm imagining a school bus basically half full of water.

Larry: Yeah. Liz: Basically.

Larry: Kinda heavy. Liz: Water is heavy.

Larry: Driving it was kind of tricky. Had to be careful. Especially on the corners. Lots of traction though.

From the Nolalu Heritage Cookbook 2000

Mansikkalumi ~~also known as Strawberry Snow

2 cups fresh hulled strawberries or 2 10oz packages of frozen whole strawberries

1/2 cup sugar 4 egg whites pinch of salt 3/4 cup heavy cream—stiffly whipped

12—16 whole strawberries

With the back of a large spoon, rub the fresh or defrosted frozen strawberries through a fine sieve into a small mixing bowl. Stir into this puree the 1/2 cup of sugar, a little at a time. Using a wire whisk, beat the egg whites and salt vigorously in a large bowl (preferably unlined copper) until the whites are stiff enough to form unwavering peaks when the beater is lifted out of the bowl. With a gentle under-over cutting motion rather than a stirring motion, use a rubber spatula to fold first the strawberry puree and then the whipped cream into the egg whites. Pour the strawberry snow into an attractive serving bowl, or individual dessert bowls and decorate with whole strawberries. This dessert can be served at once or it may be refrigerated for a few hours and served later.

1 cup consommé soup 4 cups water 2 potatoes 1 can chopped tomato



From the Editor's Desk


As I sit and type this I am sitting out on the deck watching my grandson zoom up and down on his scooter. Oh to be five again, without a care in the world except who will board my pretend train to the station. It is nice to sit out here and listen to all the different birds. Our hummingbirds are back again this year, there are eight of them. When they buzz around us going towards the feeder you can hear the rapid beat of their wings just in time to know when to duck. Two of the eight are careful flyers, while a third likes to see how close he can get to you, the rest just come and go. Of course our yard is a little noisier this spring as we have added ten more chickens to the flock. The new ones are young and are just starting to lay. They stuck to themselves for the first week but they have joined the others and are just one big group now. We are hoping to get some more ducks as well. I love the duck eggs for baking, and my grandson and I usually spend Saturdays baking while Mommy is at work. We are working on a new pen as we hope to get meat chickens this year if we aren't too late. If not there is always next year.

I have spent a lot of this month planning my new vegetable garden and sourcing out seeds that are already harden off for this climate. I've found the last two years the seeds that I purchased in regular stores like Walmart or Canadian tire, etc., the plants sometimes grow and sometimes don't. So this year I have bought seeds and plants off of farms close to Nolalu. I'm hoping for a better yield of vegetables this year. I also purchased some apple trees, a pear tree, some blackberry and raspberry bushes, and a haskap bush. I've learned that I will need another haskap in order for it to pollinate. Two of my elderberry shrubs did not make it through the winter but I still have one. It was a hard winter for a few of our new plants, not enough snow to protect them. We covered them with straw but it wasn't enough.

This year we have a proper garden, not just all my raised beds, so I will be able to put in more variety. My raised beds have now become my herb gardens, of which I am really excited about. I go foraging all the time to look for herbs to add to my apothecary. I make tinctures, cold infused oils, salves, and powders. To have so much more space to grow my own herbs is just what I need. I prefer to use natural home remedies rather than over the counter pills. Don't get me wrong I do use pharmaceutical medicines as they have their uses as well. I just prefer to try nature's way first. It is especially good for the everyday aches and ills that befall us. We still go to the doctor regularly and the hospital on occasion when needed, I was there today matter of fact, all is well, nothing a little bit of antibiotics can't cure. A time and a place for everything


