Getting to Know the History of the Area Kakabeka Falls

Kakabeka Falls, known as the "Niagara of the North," has a rich history rooted in both Ojibwe culture and its geological formation, with the Ojibwe name "Kakabeka" meaning "waterfall over a cliff". The Kakabeka Falls form part of an Ojibwa legend called Princess of the Mist. Legend has it that the Princess Green Mantle saved her village, sacrificing herself by leading the enemies over the waterfalls. It is said that, to this day, if you walk along the river bank to the falls, the courageous figure of Green Mantle can be seen in the mist.

Kakabeka Falls is the second highest waterfall in Ontario at 40 metres high. The rocks at the base of the waterfall and along the gorge contain some of the oldest fossils in existence; dating back to 1.6 billion years ago. The base of the waterfall is a critical spawning place for the at-risk Lake Sturgeon, Canada's largest freshwater fish.

Northern Wilds waterways have been at the crossroads of fur-trade river routes since the 1600s, including the Kaministiquia River canoe route connecting Lake Superior with Lake of the Woods and the West. One of its grueling portages was at Kakabeka Falls' Mountain Portage, first recorded in 1688 by the French explorer Jacques de Noyon. It was later abandoned for the shorter Grand Portage-Pigeon River route, and put into use again in 1803 onward.

Ontario Power Generation is planning redevelopment of 117-year-old Kakabeka Falls Generating Station. Originally built by the Kaministiquia Power Company to help power the area's burgeoning flour milling industries, Kakabeka Falls GS started with two units before quickly expanding. A third unit was added in 1911 and a fourth unit was installed in 1914. Ontario Hydro, OPG's predecessor company, purchased the station in 1949. The 117-year-old Kakabeka Falls Generating Station (GS), the second-oldest hydro station in OPG's fleet, still has much of its original equipment from 1906 in operation. With a peak output of 24.4 megawatts (MW), the time-tested plant continues to provide enough electricity from its four units to power about 25,000 homes.

In the winter time the formations of ice on the falls are magical, and you can see the crystalline structure absolutely sparkle in the mid-day sun. This is one of the most accessible locations to view a frozen waterfall in our region and it doesn't take long to get to the viewing platform from your vehicle. In the summer time you can stroll along the paths or go swimming at the park. The swimming is located just off the top of the falls and offers a different view of the falls. Whether it is in the heat of summer or the chill of a frosty winter morning, Kakabeka Falls is a sight worth visiting more than once.

History of Fireworks

Like many inventions, firecrackers/fireworks were created by accident, and by the search for immortality. Around 200 BC, the Chinese unintentionally invented firecrackers, but it took another thousand years before true fireworks came alive. *Baozhu* is a Mandarin Chinese word for firecracker. It means "exploding bamboo." The first natural "firecrackers" were bamboo stalks that when thrown in a fire, would explode with a bang because of the overheating of the hollow air pockets in the bamboo.

Around 800 AD, an alchemist mixed sulfur, charcoal, and potassium nitrate (a food preservative) hoping to find the secret to eternal life. Instead, the mixture caught on fire, and gunpowder was born! When the powder was packed into bamboo or paper tubes and lit on fire, history had its first fireworks! If you attended a fireworks show in 800 AD, it would be unlike anything we see today. Paper fireworks were used to scare evil spirits or to celebrate weddings and births and were simply thrown onto a fire, not blasted into the air. There were no added colors, so a "fireworks show" was just a series of small, noisy explosions.

The development of gunpowder in the 9th century allowed for more sophisticated and elaborate fireworks, which then spread westward via the Silk Road and later to Europe. The Chinese' fire arrow' was one of the first inventions with gunpowder being projected into the air. In the 11th century, the weapon consisted of an arrow and pouch of gunpowder attached near the arrowhead. Within the next 200 years, rocket cannons came to be, from which the technology became foundational to the later development of modern-day fireworks. By the 15th century, fireworks were popular in Europe, used for celebrations and entertainment. Fireworks with colours were developed in the early years of the 19th century and were made widely available in the 1830s. The magnificent update to the technology was credited to Italian inventors who added different metal substances such as aluminium, magnesium, barium, and more that could create everything from blue to red to green flames and sparks.

Today, with modern versions, fireworks come in various shapes with multiple colours and sounds. Current fireworks are typically made up of an aerial shell, a tube containing gunpowder and a number of small pods known as "stars". Each of the stars makes one dot in the fireworks explosion. A firework also has a fuse that is lit to ignite the gunpowder. When the metal salts, which act as colourants, are heated, their atoms absorb energy and produce light as they lose excess energy. In addition, different chemicals have different amounts of energy, creating different colours.

Remember when using fireworks to use caution and as always safety first. It is always a good idea to let your neighbours know if you will be lighting off fireworks, especially those with pets, as they can become startled and bolt into hoiding and become lost.



May is emergency preparedness month, and the goal of emergency preparedness week is to encourage our residents to take three simple steps to be better prepared in the case of an emergency. Emergencies requiring evacuation often strike without warning. It is imperative to be prepared ahead of time so that you can react quickly and safely.

Step 1: Know the risks

Here in Nolalu as part of our risk management plan we have identified 3 major risks that we either have faced or could likely face in the near future. These are flooding, wildfires, and extreme weather/extended power outages.

Step 2: Make a plan

Your family may not be together when an emergency occurs. Plan how to meet or how to contact one another, and discuss what you would do in different situations. Your plan should include things like evacuation routes and where to meet in case you are separated.

It should also your family's medical information like medication lists, allergies, and important medical history, as well as contact numbers for your health team.

You should include a list of emergency numbers, as well as family members in case you lose access to your digital copies of them.

Finally, this document should contain important information if you need to evacuate such as where the electrical panel, water, and gas lines are, and how to shut off these utilities.

Keep this document in an easy-to-find, easy-to-remember place (for example, with your emergency kit). Photocopy this plan and keep it in your car and/or at work, and a copy close to your phone.

If you are ordered to evacuate, take your 72 hour emergency kit, your wallet, personal identification for each family member and copies of essential family documents with you. Bring a cellular phone and spare battery or charger with you, if you have one. Use travel routes specified by local authorities.


