


Our Thomas Estley Way character awards are bronze, silver and gold, depending on how many points have been accrued across all lessons and activities.

Well done to our student leaders who obtained a special award for outstanding leadership in last year's leadership projects, including those leaders (above) with our Principal and Chair of Governors.




## **Careers**



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## Attendance



At Thomas Estley Community College, we expect the highest level of attendance from all our students so they may develop their full potential during their time at school. Missing out on education has a significant effect on students' life opportunities. There is a strong relationship between good school attendance and achieving positive outcomes for children. It is recognised that attending school regularly can be a protective factor for children and young people.

Ensuring that children attend school every day will help achieve this ambition by maximising their education and social achievements as well as developing self-discipline, organisation and preparedness for the work environment. Improving attendance and reducing absence, especially persistent absence, is a priority for our school and Leicestershire County Council.

Everyone associated with the school – students, parents, all teaching and support staff and external agencies– must do all in their power to ensure that excellent attendance and punctuality maintain an integral part of the school's work.

Please ensure that you call to report your child's absence no later than 9.30am every day that they are absent with a clear description of their symptoms. This ensures that your child receives the correct absence code and makes it easier for staff members to track pupils' absences. If a call/message is not received by this time, you will receive a call or text message and the absence will be coded as unauthorised.

Thank you to everyone that has provided evidence of appointments which has helped us to keep a track of students exit and arrival times and enabled us to code their absences correctly.

REMINDER: As per our attendance policy and as stated in the attendance handbook, when a child has been absent for four or more days, we require medical evidence or sight of the child at home. Medical evidence can include a copy of the child's prescription with their name and the date on, a copy of an appointment confirmation for the child, or doctors/hospital notes/diagnosis with the child's name and the date stated. ## DfE March 2025 – Link between attendance and attainment in an assessment year


- At KS4, pupils who attended school nearly every day in Year 11 (with an attendance rate of 95-100%) were 1.9 times more likely to achieve the Grade 5 in English and Maths GCSE compared to pupils who only attended 90-95% of the time (relating to up to 2 weeks more time in school over the course of a year) and 3 times more likely than persistently absent pupils who only attend 85-90% of the time (relating to 4 6 weeks more time in school).
- This means missing just 10 days of year 11 reduced the likelihood of achieving grade 5 in English and Maths by around 50%.
- Pupils who attended school 90-95% of the time were also 1.6 times more likely to achieve Grade 5 in Maths and English GCSE compared to pupils who only attended 85-90% of them time, relating to an additional 2-4 weeks in school.

This demonstrates there are improvements in the chance of success from increased attendance by one absence band.

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

## Open College Evening





Amberwood Care Home in Wigston hosted a Scarecrow Festival this month, inviting local schools and community groups to take part in the event.


Our talented Friday Textiles Club rose to the challenge by designing, crafting, and naming not one, but two scarecrows in the hopes of being crowned the festival's winner!



## European Day Of Languages







## **Trips**









We hope our students and teachers are enjoying the beautiful new environment!








Our learners have already been trying out practical experiments this term, one pictured here. We believe that scientific curiosity and strong science results grow from engaging activities and great teaching. Well done to our science faculty, with great results in both separate and combined sciences at GCSE once again. 100% of students in biology and 95% of students in chemistry and physics, achieved at least a grade 5 (a strong pass) with a third of students achieving at least a grade 7 (the old A grade) and a fifth achieving a top grade 9 (A\*\*) across the board in separate sciences. Great work, everyone!








We were incredibly proud of our fantastic maths department. We enjoyed huge success with both mathematics and statistics again this year. As usual, our performance at grade 4 and 5 was high. By attaining these grades in maths, it keeps doors open for our young people as they progress onto post-16 courses and employment.

More than a quarter of our students achieved a grade 7 (formally an A) in maths, compared to just 16% nationally. These outcomes put us in the top 20% nationally for state and fee paying schools.

We offer GCSE statistics as an additional option, and a phenomenal 80% of these students achieved a grade 7 (A) or above. This smashed the national average of 21%! Well done to our hardworking staff and students in maths.




Thomas Estley year 8 religious education students have been hard at work reflecting on understanding viewpoints and learning about the range of world religions.




Joint players of the match went to Georgia and Ellie, whose link up play on the right hand side was strong throughout the match. A good result, 4-0, and through to round two.

Well done to all of our sporty youngsters!



Huge thanks to our year 10 coach Alfie who is continuing to coach the team as part of his university degree. We really appreciate him giving freely of his time.









Well done girls; you worked hard throughout. We're really proud of you all.







## Primary Masterclasses






We welcomed year 5 students from our feeder schools to our art/cooking masterclass. The pupils were able to experience a sample of art and cooking during their time with us.

## Out Of School Club






Thomas Estley Out of School Club have been having lots of fun so far this school year in their wrap around before and after school care sessions.





#### Headphones. Earbuds & Air Pods

If your child travels via school transport it is a good idea to have a contingency plan with them, for getting to the event that for any reason they miss their bus.




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
