GCSE Results Day








Thank you to our great staff, our courageous and kind students and to all the children and parents/carers who came to visit us. We hope to see you all again soon!

Our subject faculties have also been celebrating the achievements of the black community within their subject areas this month and our library has been promoting a selection of relevant reading.












At Thomas Estley, we are Showing Racism the Red Card.

Thanks for coming, everyone - from post-16 providers to students and families.



What is EBSA?

Emotionally Based School Absence/Avoidance/Anxiety (EBSA) is a broad term that is used to describe children and young people who have difficulty attending school and may have long periods of absence caused by emotional distress.

EBSA is commonly associated with emotional and physical distress and an inability to attend school, which can then lead to further anxiety about school. It is not the same as truanting which is not usually linked to an emotional cause like anxiety.

EBSA isn't a new problem, but young people feeling anxious about going to school regularly, has increased significantly since the pandemic and lockdown.

Signs of EBSA

Your young person might complain of anxiety symptoms, butterflies in the tummy, pins and needles or nausea.

They might complain that they have abdominal pain, a headache or a sore throat often, with no physical signs of illness.

You may notice that there symptoms are better at weekends and holidays, but worse on Sunday evenings and weekday mornings.



What Can I Do To Help?


Communicate with the school as soon as possible. Thomas Estley will work in partnership with you to address the issues and make a plan to support your child to attend school.

One of the key ways you can support your young person is by calmly listening to them and acknowledging their fears, because those fears are real to them. It is also important to reassure them that you and the school will work with them to make school a happier place for them.

Helping your child to understand that some anxiety is normal, how to recognise anxiety, how to cope with the uncomfortable feelings without avoiding them and teaching them by modelling this yourself, is how you can support them best.

It can be really hard to see your child unhappy. It's important that you have someone you can talk to about this – it could be a friend, family member or professional.


World Mental Health Day

Students toured the castle ruins and identified key features and changes in use over time, all gearing up to their history exam next summer focusing on a local site.












The Oaks at Thomas Estley visited Lutterworth Fire Station to learn about fire safety, life skills and careers.




A great evening of sport for our key stage three teams (left) in their opening matches of the season.

Well done girls, a great team performance. Player of the match going to Ria (right).




What a performance from our U13 girls footballers. Our second round match away at Coundon Court school was a great display of football. The girls were stunning across all areas of the pitch.

Player of the match went to Honey, who did a superb job marking Lutterworth's strong central midfielder. A brilliant match with a lovely atmosphere.








We were able to field an A and a B team against two teams from Kibworth and a Brockington team.

Mr Serridge and Mr Curtis have been really impressed with the quality of work produced by year 7 during the first rotation. Year 7 have been busy making abstract and animal themed key tags.

Students sketch a range of ideas before selecting one to draw in computer aided design (CAD). The mould design produced in CAD is then sent to our laser cutter. Once the mould is assembled, molten pewter is poured in and quickly cools to form the shape of their key tag.

Finally students use a range of finishing techniques to produce a polished finish. Great work year 7s!





Headphones Earbuds & Air Pods



Absence During Term Time

Where possible, please make medical appointments outside of college hours.



Students are not allowed to use mobile phones in college unless they have express permission from a member of staff. This is to protect students' learning and social development and is in line with our safeguarding policy. This refers to any use anywhere on the college site, including break and lunchtime - phones should be 'not seen, not heard.

Mobile Phones



KS4 Awards





Art & Cooking Masterclass








Seth has been a fantastic role model and leader for our out of school club younger children and shows all the signs of becoming a great future leader. We are very proud of him.


