

'Dress to Impress' day where children came to school wearing their favourite colour or outfit that shows who they are.




Trust Transition update

The pupils had an exciting afternoon being in a lab and learning about Bunsen Burners.

They were able to set and light the Bunsen Burner, change the flame and turn it off safely following all the instruction. Once this was achieved, they moved on to heating up pennies, first they had to change the flame to a blue flame and to observe the reactions that occurred to the coin and flame, this also tested their skills with holding tweezers and keeping their fingers away from the hot end.

The afternoon was fantastic, and all the pupils gained valuable knowledge and skills ready for when they start their secondary school journey this summer. Smooth primary to secondary transition is such a valuable part of Success AT's work.



Everyone involved had an absolutely amazing time, singing, dancing and performing in an arena of over 15,000 people.


The children behaved brilliantly, and all the adults who attended were incredibly proud of them all.






This month was British

Thomas Estley Preschool children had the opportunity to make a Mother's Day card for Mummy or someone special in their life.
They used lots of different mediums and techniques to create their cards which are totally unique to each child, as they each see the modelled idea in their very own way.

Preschool will be looking at planting, growing, food chains and life cycles during summer term. They started by making cress heads, children listened carefully to instructions to add cotton wool to pots before spraying them with water and sprinkling on their seeds.

Children learnt that seeds need to live somewhere warm and be kept a little bit moist, a windowsill is ideal. They also learnt that seeds come in lots of shapes and sizes. They will continue this theme during the spring and summer, and their first job is to sow wildflower seeds at the front of the playground to create a habitat for mini beasts, especially bees and butterflies.

The Oaks



The Oaks at Thomas Estley is our specialist SEND unit which offers a small number of secondary aged children with communication and interaction needs specialist support and therapy to enable them to participate with confidence in mainstream learning

Students in T**he Oaks** alongside class 7D, ASDAN and the Gardening club have been working on the garden area of the Oaks to make it look amazing.

They have worked together to carefully plan the project, being resourceful with the materials that they had to make something that would be both pretty, and that would encourage wildlife to thrive in our garden.

The students have since been working on putting their plan into action and have had great success. They learnt the proper way to use tools and equipment and got their hands dirty, digging, painting and planting.

They have planted hedges along the outside fence, built a flowerbed with wooden boarders, and even made some bug hotels for the local wildlife to enjoy.

We're looking forward to seeing the fruits of their labour as the weather improves and they can spend time outside in the lovely garden they have created.






