- 1. Has your raw, unvalidated APC data ever been used for planning work previously? If so, please tell us the year and which study.**

- 2. To confirm, you want proposals for the COA that include costs for providing transit schedules, blocks AND run-cuts? (Run-cutting is usually done by the operations contractor.)**

Yes. As described in Task 3 the Consultant will work in conjunction with the Authority and the Operator to develop the new routes and schedules including the preliminary run cut. The purpose of involving the Consultant in this effort is to work out issues that may crop up, particularly if new routes are introduced.

- 3. In Task 3 of the scope you ask for the consultant to develop “origin and destination data for each route.” Does StanRTA already possess data that could provide insights about existing routes’ riders’ origins and destinations?**

There is limited to no data available for origins and destinations. That is why RFP 2021-04 expanded Task 3 to include a more substantial population and transportation analysis using cellular data.

- 4. Addendum 1 to the previous RFP for this work included the information that translators will “be required to be certified, as required by the Stanislaus Council of Governments.” There is no reference to this requirement in the new RFP. Is this still a requirement? If so, who would be considered a “translator” in the course of this work? What written or verbal tasks would need to be done by a “certified translator”?**

The translator should be certified by a recognized organization such as the American Translators Association. The translator’s scope of work is at the Consultant’s discretion. The Authority anticipates that a translator’s services would be value added for community outreach, presentations, and the translation of written, auditory, and graphic materials.
