SAN NIGUEL - CAN YOU HANDLE THE SCANDAL?

Oooooo I do love a good scandal! One of my favourites is when Stuart Lubbock's lifeless body was found in Michael Barrymore's swimming pool after a drink and drug fuelled gay orgy. But can I handle San's latest album?



With a cover that could have been knocked up quicker than Specky Cult's new one (see right) complete with Stanglers-esque font I was looking forward to listening to this Newton Aycliffe lad's new offering.

San The Man doesn't let the idea of genre restrain him, ticking off Punk, Post-Punk, Indie and Blues amongst others to good effect.

San Niguel began the album during those dark, bleak days of lockdown. I wonder how many albums would not have come to pass without that collective enforced house arrest?

The production on Niguel's debut album is totally fit for purpose and does the job. The stand out tunes to me are Drunk on A Sunday and Mr. Trippy the Dodgy Ice Cream Man which harks back to the days of The Buzzcocks and The Damned.

He's released a lively album and if you're an old punk or simply like no frills unpretentious tunes then stick it on your Spotify or even better, buy the C.D. 3.5/5

SPECKY CULT - SERIOUSLY?

I enjoyed this brand new track by the acoustic-punk three piece From up north somewhere. For whatever reason I was instantly reminded of weird, female fronted, early 70's German bands, most notably The Rattles who released a classic occultpop hit called The Witch. The band's vocalist also has an air of Debbie Harrie about her voice.

The production is saturated and lo-fi, just how I like it. It sounds as though she's singing 'I am a Nazi'. I'm guessing that's not literal, but hey everyone's entitled to a political opinion.

A welcome touch of growling Hammond Organ really adds to the vintage flavour. 3.8/5

Let Go is a lot better than his other tracks I've reviewed previously in DIRGE, with a shiny sheen to the mix, plenty of dynamic changes and a semi-powerful chorus. Craig seems to be getting better with each release and he's obviously a hard worker as I have something of his to review pretty much every issue. SARAH JOHNSONE - SAME REFLECTION BUT I'M CHANGED

Teesside's Sarah Johnsone and her band come together cohesively as a solid unit on this release, polished and well packaged, although I'm not entirely sure why the EP cover is a still from that scene in Titanic I rewound loads when I was 12. Some kind of band in-joke?

Sarah's new joint is jam packed full of jangly mid 80's post-punk guitars, lush organ/pads which kind of remind me of Boards of Canada, although that's where any comparisons end. It looks like Johnsone is using a Casiotone in a video I watched. If Casiotones can make textures like that then I would like one too!

There are a few meandering parts of this EP that make me want to put something else on, a lot melds together into one sonic entity. There are a couple of 'intermissions' that are under a minute, like on Ladytron's first album which are a nice touch.

I wouldn't listen to this for fun but I bet loads of people would.

NORTHERN HOSPITALITY -RUNAWAY LIKE ME

Northern Hospitality are from Hartlepool, but I tried not to let that be a factor in my review of their new song 'Runaway Like Me'.

A drum intro reminiscent of Break on Through by The Doors gives way to a watered-down 'Breed' by Nirvana rip off. I was waiting for the front man to come in with "I don't care, I don't care, I don't care". But he did not. The verse comes around and the singer sounds likes Liam Gallagher after inhaling the helium from a day-old birthday balloon.

The chorus is listenable enough with plenty to keep you interested. Any 90's Britpop influences are flaunted at this point and it sounds upbeat, energetic and poppy while still maintaining a credible rock edge. Runaway Like Me is no frills, no bullshit Rock n Roll. It's not my cup of tea and could be classed as derivative, but as I am now technically old and grey, I did the Old Grey Whistle Test and I can still remember the chorus half an hour later, so it must have made some impact. 3.2/5

The Teesside group's newest single 'Don The Balaclava' is inspired by the classic 90's CBBC kids programme of the same name about Donald, a mischievous little balaclava who gets up to all sorts of japes, escapades and petty crime in the fictional Yorkshire town of Bally Valley. The front cover of this single looks more like something grime legend Ghetts would release. And I'd probably rather listen to him than this. A generic and oft overused guitar chord progression is joined ominously after a couple of bars by a pentatonic lead guitar lick. What follows is a descent into early 00's flavoured indie rock.

It's twee, it's unashamedly serious and it's devoid of irony. Even Michael Buble is more creative and original than this.

My favourite line is "All the things we say and do, full of love and laughter. With the ones we care about, till the morning after". Which rather unintentionally implies that the drink dries up, Boxing Day dawns, the hangovers kick in and the festive mirth evaporates. Which is actually quite a true sentiment, if only he meant it that way.

JENAMI FEAT. THE DUNWELLS -DO IT ALL OVER AGAIN

Sporting a cover that looks more like a page from a SAGA over 50's holiday brochure than the artwork for a new single I was a little trepidatious about what was to come when I gave Darlington's two piece Jenami a spin on my record player. The title reminds me of a Caravan album from 1970 called 'If I Could Do It All Again I'd Do It All Over You". But alas, this sounds nothing like the pseudo-prog group from Canterbury.



This tune is an unadulterated cheese fest. It's the aural equivalent of a 3-cheese pizza with added parmesan and processed cheese slices accompanied by some Dairylea dunkers.

"All you've got to do is let go" is the mantra of this Jenami/Dunwells collaboration. It's quite an upbeat, summery track, so I'm not quite sure why it was released in these dark, wintry months. But I do think this is their best track to date. It would lend itself well to being on the soundtrack of a sickly Disney kids' film. I enjoyed it. 3.2/5

GONE TOMORROW - STUN GUN

Remember when The Horrors were good? They released two solid albums, a middling one and the rest were totally dogga.

Well the intro to Stun Gun is a bit like if they'd carried on being good instead of disappearing up their own arse.



Clocking in at a refreshing 2.08 minutes, this Teesside group have kept it quick and to the point. Vocally I can't help being reminded of Brian Molko's nasally tone mixed with some snarls. The guitar solos don't need to be there, mind. The pentatonic widdling makes Stun Gun sound amateurish.

Gone Tomorrow would have been better off building on the atmospheric, bell like, FM style synths that were utilised on the intro.

All in all though, it's a good track with plenty of potential. 3.8/5

Daniel's voice is very easy on the ear and there's lush and varied instrumentation throughout. The stand out track on the album for me is "Time to Talk" which I hear is set to be one of the next singles.

Hide is released on January 19th, so buy it!

CAT RYAN - KING OF THE WORLD

As I ponder on Cat Ryan's new E.P, I can't help being reminded of that horrible, sickly scene from Titanic where Leonardo Di Caprio exclaims "I'M KING OF THE WORLD!"

Newcastle's Cat Ryan have produced a quirky little EP with almost African sounding rhythm guitar patterns. King of The World is an undeniably poppy release with electronic pallettes, glockenspiel (or is it a vibraphone?) and guitar, glued together by bass and live drums. The first stand out track for me is Rex Mundi (which is Latin for the EP's title). It's an up tempo bit of tuneage with a catchy chorus and some summery, Hawaian guitars.



Lost My Connection is one heck of an Indie-Pop banger too. All in all it's a solid EP, so you should stream it, buy it and share it. DIRGE recommends.





(presented brilliantly by Tracks Darlington) there was the asalways great mix of classic literature, read this evening by local writers Mary Atkinson, Marilyn Longstaff and Bob Fischer, and superb music from Eve Conway, Mayshe-Mayshe, The (red-cloaked, fur-hooded) Cornshed Sisters and The Bookshop Band.

But this time there was an added dimension. Tracks, funded by Creative Darlington and the Arts Council, had commissioned Darlington writer Pam Plumb to collaborate with musician Eve Conway. Working together, both created original pieces which were premiered at December's Hark! Pam read her story The Book Binder then Eve presented her musical piece which complemented and expanded on Pam's work. Both were received warmly by a hugely appreciative audience.

It's great to see how an event like this brings together both writing and music in such an enjoyable way as well as reinforcing valuable connections between local writers and musicians. AC.

A Cornshed Sister!

DELIA DERBYSHIRE

November 23rd marked the annual Delia Derbyshire Day, which celebrates the work and influential career of the BBC Radiophonic Worksop pioneer.

This year also marks 60 years of Dr.Who which Delia provided the iconic theme to. So, who was Delia Derbyshire?

Delia was born in 1937 in Coventry and showed a flair for music at an early age. She was offered a place at Cambridge Uni where she studied Maths and Music. She began to work at the BBC Radiophonic Workshop in 1962, with one of her earliest works being the Dr.Who theme tune in 1963.

Delia went on to record a large body of work in the areas of film & T.V as well as being part of 'White Noise' who recorded the seminal 1969 electronic album 'An Electric Storm'.

Her music career tapered off in the 70's with a resurgence in 2001 when she collaborated with Peter Kember. Sadly, her later life was blighted by alcoholism and Delia died the same year. Leaving us an important and enigmatic body of work that we should all be thankful for.

THE RETURN OF THE STUDIO THAT DRIPPED BLOOD?

Amicus Studios was a stalwart and second only to Hammer at the top of the British Horror scene for about a decade between 1965 and 1974.

Typically producing portmanteau films in the style of 1945's iconic Dead of Night, the people at Amicus released some amazingly spooky and sinister titles like Dr Terror's House of Horrors, The Torture Garden, Vault of Horror, Tales from The Crypt, The House that Dripped Blood, Asylum and my personal favourite - from Beyond the Grave.



Then, Amicus was gone, a ghost of cinematic glories past. Consigned to the annals of Horror history forever. Or so we thought...

Fast forward your Betamax to 2023, like a Phoenix rising from the ashes a small team of film industry darlings initiated the development of Amicus Mk 2 with the blessing of the family of late Amicus head honcho Milton Subotsky. Led by Lawrie Brewster of Hex Studios who said of the project "Our aim is to re-establish Amicus Productions as a beacon of independent British horror".

The team are attempting to source the finance via Kickstarter for a brand new portmanteau horror picture entitled 'In The Grip of Terror' set to star Laurence R. Harvey (Human Centipede 2) and Megan Tremethick. I've watched the pitch for it and was impressed by the energy that has been fuelled into the project. But will it be successful?

Only time will tell. I will say that the Amicus phenomenon was very much of its time, which is most of the appeal for me. Complete and unadulterated nostalgia for a period in the last century that I was never a part of. And I do hope the team can convey that. But, if Brewster and Co's evident passion for the genre and Amicus as a whole is anything to go by, they'll have a damn good go!

Sinisterly spawning from a short lived sketch show on BBC Radio One known as 'Blue Jam' in the late 90's, its creator and comic genius Chris Morris converted it to televisual format via Channel 4. Yeah, I can't quite imagine it ever being shown on The Beeb, can you? Especially not these days.

It's not even as though Jam was what's known today as 'politically incorrect' or offensive like Little Britain is considered now. It was just incredibly and horribly bleak, which is probably why I enjoyed it so much as a fifteen year old.

Subject matter such as rape, prostitution, insanity, isolation, infant death, loneliness, terminal illness, child abduction/murder and sexual paraphilias aren't usually synonymous with comedy, but for whatever reason Morris succeeded in getting laughs left right and centre from me, at the time and nearly 24 years later.

Another of the comedy's unique selling points was Morris' use of ambient and electronic music throughout the bulk of the sketches within the series. Artists he utilised included Brian Eno, Aphex Twin, Moloko, Amon Tobin, Massive Attack and Funki Porcini amongst many others, including pop artists like Minnie Ripperton, Sade and Prefab Sprout. Morris even produced some of the music himself, with WARP Records releasing a compilation of a selection of songs used in the radio show 'Blue Jam'.



Apparently, in a move that had never been witnessed before, Chris Morris asked Channel 4 not to bisect the episodes of Jam with an advertising break so the atmosphere wasn't compromised.

Firmly left of field audio/visual distortions and manipulations added to a depressing and disorienting cornucopia of mental and emotional stimuli, and it's a shame that Jam was never to be heard of again. But luckily for you all 6 episodes can be found on that conduit of nostalgia, YouTube.

THE KILLER

NETFLIX

The first twenty minutes of David Fincher's latest movie is basically a Patrick Bateman style monologue, performed by the always watchable Michael Fassbender as the eponymous 'killer', in which he covers various topics and quotes from a number of historical figures (my favourite being one from Aleister Crowley) punctuated by The Smiths songs.

The serenity and introspective calm dissipates in a split second of folie and is quickly replaced by an intense action set piece on the streets of Paris, buoyed by the instantly recognisable hallmarks of a Trent Reznor/Atticus score. Fassbender cuts a lone, very much self-contained contract killer in what transpires to be an age-old tale of revenge on a gargantuan scale. It's also nice to see the classic Fincher monologue accompanying the remainder of the film.

The killer himself is a cool customer. I'd describe him as a more badass, more amoral, less sleazy version of James Bond. I would have given this movie a higher score if it wasn't full of Smiths songs.





PETERLEE IS BRUTAL A Dirge Day Out

Ever since I saw A Clockwork Orange when I was a kid my imagination has been fired by Brutalist architecture. So when I learned the other year that there was some virtually on my door step I vowed to visit one day, regardless of Peterlee being regarded by many as a shit hole. Well, I finally decided to take the kids for a grand day out to see the Apollo Pavilion, which was constructed in the middle of a housing estate in 1969 to mark the Moon Landings.

Trimdon and Fishburn amongst others. Once we reached our ultimate destination it was only a short walk up Pasmore Road to the Pavilion. It felt great to finally encounter it, although regrettably the three children were rather nonplussed.

Pasmore said of his creation "an architecture and sculpture of purely abstract form through which to walk, in which to linger and on which to play, a free and anonymous monument which, because of its independence, can lift the activity and psychology of an urban housing community on to a universal plane".



This didn't happen. It was vandalised and became haunted by local youths looking for somewhere new to hang out. I know, who would have guessed?

Well, as you can see in the pictures, it's still very much standing and it's definitely worth a visit if you're in the area.



Ex-Kraftwerk musikarbeiter Karl Bartos has re-scored the seminal 1920 forerunner of Psychological Horror 'The Cabinet of Dr Caligari'. As a huge fan of both Kraftwerk and the film I am awaiting the release in February with bated breath.

Although not greatly musically active since leaving Kraftwerk in 1990, Bartos has released two studio albums, both of which are pretty listenable. And unlike other former member Wolfgang Flur who regularly DJ's in the North East, Karl has a few Kraftwerk songwriting credits to his name, most notably The Robots from 1978.

Bartos has described the project as "narrative film music and sound design for Robert Wiene's psychological thriller".

The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari premieres in Frankfurt next year and is set to meld symphonic elements with synthesis. Bartos has also recently written a book about his time in Kraftwerk entitled 'Sound of The Machine'

OUR TOP 5

BBC Ghost Stories for Christmas



ARE YOU ALL COSY IN YOUR GROWN UP ONESY AND FLUFFY SLIPPERS? A GLASS OF MULLED WINE OR HOT CHOCOLATE IN HAND?

GOOD, THEN WE'LL BEGIN.

Lost Hearts (1973)

A genuinely creepy and rather sinister offering, adapted from a story by M.R James. A boy is sent to live with his much older cousin after being orphaned, where he is haunted by a boy and a girl combo with their hearts missing. The atmospheric cinematography is heightened by the ethereal music, including a track named Hyperion III, a 1966 avant-garde piece by Bruno Maderna. And I still experience a frisson of terror every time I hear a hurdy gurdy.



Schalcken The Painter (1979)

Extremely creepy period ghost story set in The Netherlands. Godfried Schalcken was a real artist in the 17th century, but this adaptation was based on the 1839 story Strange Event in the Life of Schalken the Painter by Sheridan Le Fanu. Utlising low key lighting and dour sets to create a feeling of distinct unease, the mood darkens even more when a sinister, ghostly figure is introduced to haunt the eponymous artist and make his life a living hell.



A Warning To The Curious (1972)

M.R James is adapted once again for this tale, set in the 1920's. Peter Vaughan plays Mr. Paxton. An amateur archaeologist who travels to the coast of Suffolk on a treasure hunting expedition of sorts. but someone or something has a real issue with anyone who dares to attempt to dig it up. There are a couple of (uncharacteristically for the BBC) violent moments and blood spill, made more horrific by the various pieces of dark classical music that really ramp up the spook factor.



The Stone Tape (1972)

Although (along with Schalcken The Painter) this more modern, sci-fi orientated tale wasn't part of the main Ghost Story for Christmas strand, it was broadcast on Christmas Day in 1972, so is still worthy of inclusion in this list and notably features a marvellous electronic score and sound effects by the BBC Radiophonic Workshop. A research team enter a reputedly haunted house and start to wonder if the stone walls are acting as some sort of recording medium that captures the voices of spirits.



Whistle And I'll Come To You (2010)

You've quessed it. Another M.R James adaptation. We follow the fortunes of James Parkin, touchingly and sensitively portrayed by the late, great John Hurt. James has left his wife who is suffering from dementia and travelled to the coast to get some respite by the sea, but he is haunted by apparitions and experiences strange goings on. Are they linked to his wife? And are the happenings his own internalised guilt and grief manifesting themselves? A highly watchable, spooky and poignant episode.

CAFE ETCH MIDDLESBROUGH



Well I was umming and arring about going to this gig but am I glad I did? Let's find out...

The X66 was on time for once so that was a good omen. So with my three kids (or Mini Dirgers) in tow we travelled through to the land of Parmos and heroin addicts.

I'd been to the evening's venue, Café Etch once before for a drink, it's a quirky little place with a couple of floors offering a good selection of food and beverages. The performance area is probably what you'd describe as bijou. It's about the same size as my front room, but with the various lights and things in it, has a charm about it. I got the kids a hot chocolate and myself a pint and began to watch Chump Wrecker, aka Ian Hanratty from Darlo.



He's quite a character is Ian, and a bit of a music scene veteran, being in such classic bands as Goatsniffer and Nemain, and I was quite impressed with his hardware based set. If it had been a bit later on and several pints or speckled Mitsis further into it he would have had the crowd dancing about like no one's business. Chump has plenty of stage presence which is a good thing when you're a one man operation with no projected visuals to fall back on. Speaking of one man operations...

Yes, up next to grace the stage of Café Etch was Stockton's Stock Image, dressed in his now iconic trademark pink suit, black T-shirt and loafer combination. He seemed to be a bit awkward on stage, probably due to his newfound sobriety, and fair play to him, I couldn't go up on stage by myself without a drink in my hand. He reeled off banger after banger to the point where I couldn't take anymore. I was a mess. I had that many of his melodies going through my

head simultaneously I thought I was going to have an

aneurysm.

And in the blink of an eye, top of the bill Stockton stalwarts The Golden Age of Nothing entered the tiny stage to round off the evening's proceedings. I've seen them live a few times now and always enjoyed the shoegazey gothiness of the Teesside trio. The electric viola put through a myriad of effects pedals is always interesting to hear in the songs which are downbeat yet paradoxically catchy, driven by the electronic drums like any self respecting Goth band. They topped off a great evening of music and I'm glad I went!





The fuzz were called to the theatre on Skinnergate in October when an unlicensed boxing fight got out of control, resulting in a man suffering what has been described as a 'life changing injury' as three quarters of his ear was ripped off during the bout. It is unclear whether this was simply a sporting mis-hap or a purposeful act.

I really like The Majestic as a venue so I hope this doesn't mean anything detrimental for their future, I highly recommend the pantomimes, we all went last year and had a great laugh. It's Cinderella this year and it's set to be a riot!
