MIDNIGHT JAZZ CLUB - OBELISKS

I've been a fan of this band for a little while now so I was excited to hear this EP. And it is awesome. The band are an instrumental rock/ prog-rock quartet with song-writing ability to rival anyone. This 3-track (24+minute) EP drips with epic staccato guitars overlaid with beautifully evil lead melodies and is tighter than a tubby Texan's trigger grip. The rhythm section unleashes itself perfectly before taking aim and joyously exploding again.



The tracks dive and soar effortlessly through changes of timing and tempo. At times primal in a very focussed way, at times glossier than the inside of a tin of Ronseal wood gloss (no other makes are available) the entire EP flashes by, such is it's ability to hold the attention. I thought they would struggle to capture their fearsome live sound in the studio, but I was wrong. Think Tool/Jesus Lizard/QOTSA but more spooky. D.H.

SNAKES WITH TITS - TANGENTS

Upon hearing the opening bars of track one 'Slo' I thought I'd accidently put on mid 1970's Genesis. A euphoric cascade of Mellotron (or similar string machine) eventually makes way for one of the best opening songs on an E.P from a North East band I've heard for a while.

On 'Ophidiophobia' things get a bit grittier, with two slightly distorted guitars (read that in a Viv Stanshall voice) and a prolonged pseudo-doom introduction which turned out to be the entire song owing to it being a blooming instrumental!

I reviewed 'Tyranny' the other month so I'll not say much else about it other than so far, the E.P has a very smooth, cohesive flow in terms of track listing.

Phwoar, the next track on the E.P is entitled 'Garage Pasty' I could just smash one of those in right now. Ginsters are my favourite! It's a very effective showcase of Shell's voice.





The E.P bows out gracefully with 'The Dark' which I've also given a glowing review recently. An excellent ditty with an engaging, alluring introduction. I will also add this time that there are some well placed cymbal crashes and some sensual slide guitar. 4.1/5

A snare drum intro Buddy Rich would have been proud of (okay maybe not that jazzy) invites some quintessential Comp Sesh guitar work courtesy of Mr Smith with definite shades of Bernard Albrecht! It sounds like Dan the drummer is on vocal duties this time, and he does a sterling job with the snarls. Crawling is probably their heaviest, most anarchic and frenetic of their recent recordings with plenty of the Comp Sesh facets we are used to, such as the time signature changes. Another goodie, if not the strongest of their recent releases.

'Influencer Influenza' is essentially carried along by quirky little stabs here and there happening in the mix as opposed to a strong melodic hook. My favourite element of the track is (predictably) the keyboards which I always listen out for in songs I'm sent. MAX GAVINS - NORTH EAST LEGEND

You have to be a pretty well esteemed rapper to claim 'legend' status these days. So with this in mind, is Max Gavins' right to claim this accolade or is he simply a legend in his own mind? Let's investigate...

To begin with, the flutey synth motif in the instrumental is a bit overpowering in the mix, overshadowing his barz and his quasi-melodic chorus delivery somewhat. Lyrically, he's more than competent, a good mix of humour and own trumpet blowing cock sureness.

On reading the press release I was interested to see that Max had previously been known as Suus, a name which I recognised from watching Don't Flop Rap Battles back in the day. I was prompted to rewatch a few of his old battles, which I enjoyed.

The really busy synth/flute sound does get a bit annoying by the end, I have to admit. I'd like to hear Max again on a different beat because I'm not sure of the 'legend' angle just yet. 3.3/5

Ms. Pearl appears to have gravitated from Witch Pop to Witch Rock with her new release. Big drums, big guitars (and her usual BIG vocals) adorn 'Wolves'. Comfortingly, Shannon's lyrics are as archaic and esoteric as we have come to expect.

I believe every artist should experiment and make progressions in their musical sound, otherwise what's the point? I do prefer Shannon's more earthy, electronic, ambient stuff but this is a decent listen too. Wolves is released upon the new moon on March 29th. Awooooooooo! 3.8/5


CARL GREEN IN PARTICULAR - MUNDANITY & MUSTARD

Quirky, unpretentious and idiosyncratic, (sometimes bordering on Vaudeville) with a myriad of contrasting musical flavaz to please the lugs of the listener. Carl Green has engineered a fun, self aware record, a hill top beacon of originality overlooking a fog saturated North East valley, which is woefully occupied by Catfish & The Bottlemen devotees.

The EP is certainly one to be listened to in its entirety. There is no real stand out song. Not that this is a bad thing, the tracks synergise and complement each other to create a mood, rather than having one standout BIG song. The ditties are all delightfully timed, long enough to get the musical themes across but short enough not to get boring (other regional musical artists, take note).

My favourite tune from the EP is a toss up between 'Cherish The Mundane' (those Vaudeville vibes) and AI - XYZ which (no sarcasm intended here) sounds like a track from The Chuckle Brothers seminal 1995 album 'To Me To You', an album which I hold with great fondness in my heart and one that is begging for a Record Store Day vinyl release. Speaking of albums, apparently Carl has one due later in the year, so stay tuned for that, yeah? 4/5

BENEFITS - CONSTANT NOISE

I'm finding Kingsley's voice rather soothing these days. Also, I notice myself pondering his lyrics more intently without the incessant shouting. Parts of the album sound like something a Hare Krishna would put on the CD player at meditation classes to 'get you in the zone'. Others, bona fide electro funk fests complete with hard bars by 'Shakk'.

Some of the lyrics, while maintaining an able and highly inventive use of wordplay and vocabulary are starting to show signs of repetition, making it hard to envisage where the band can go next in terms of lyrical progression.

Benefits have certainly reincarnated themselves both musically and stylistically following their debut album 'Nails' but the stark messages Kingsley portray are largely his usual tried and tested observations about perceived negative aspects of British society. Bennies could start to write songs about love or whatever they wanted, but they'd become 'just another band', devoid of their U.S.P.

If their third album flops (which I hope it doesn't as I've grown quite fond of 'em) at least the dulcet toned Sir Kingsley of Hall should be able to forge a successful career on the audiobook narrator's circuit. 4/5

THE REPLACEMENTS – LET IT BE (1984)

The Replacements mean everything to me. They've been my favourite band since I was a kid & have gotten me through so much. It's no exaggeration to say I wouldn't be here if it wasn't for them. They had this loveable drunken loser thing going on that I fully embraced pre-transition. But to write & play songs this well, you need to know what you're doing before you hit the bottle. That's what I didn't get. Until I found sobriety. This record has 3 throwaway tracks & is still perfect. That somehow says a lot about them.



BABES IN TOYLAND - FONTANELLE (1992)

Probably the biggest influence on what I wanna bring to Dinky Bossetti. Kat Bjelland was an untouchable frontwoman, switching between a witch's cackle & howl & little-girl-lost in a schizophrenic second. The press tried to build a feud between her & Courtney Love which is what men love to do, pit women up against each other. It's the same kind of misogyny that claimed Kurt Cobain must have written the wonderful 'Live Through This.' But listen to 'Pretty On The Inside.' There's clear progression there. And jeez, who wasn't influenced by Kurt back then?! I've met Babes' drummer Lori a few times & she's just the coolest.



RIHANNA – UNAPOLOGETIC (2012)

Rihanna is my Queen. I've seen her live 18 times & if she ever tours again I'll quit everything, rob a bank & follow her around the world. She's everything; talented, beautiful, fiercely intelligent, funny, courageous. And she doesn't give a shit what people think. Forget the genre, she's the ultimate Rock Star. My first ever tattoo was a lyric from 'Diamonds;' "I choose to be happy," which I got on the 1st anniversary of starting hormones.



COUNTING CROWS - AUGUST & EVERYTHING AFTER (1993)

My experience buying this record led to me writing a novel in a previous existence. I remember vividly walking from my childhood dead-end, middle-of-nowhere village to the nearest record store a couple of miles away. It was a sweltering summer's day, I could feel the sweat & dust on my neck as I crossed the narrow country roads to relocate the path. I eagerly bought the CD – foregoing my usual excited, awkward, chatter to the cool guy who worked at the store – & hurried home. I thought the disc was faulty because there was ten seconds of silence. I was crushed. Then the opening notes of 'Round Here' filled my room. I still hear those notes in the same way. Magical. One of the most underrated bands & simply incredible live.



TOM WAITS – CLOSING TIM€ (1973)

Just a perfect record. I could have put Damien Rice in here as a favourite 'singer-songwriter,' but couldn't leave this out. Just listen to it, drunk or stoned or stone cold sober. Late at night. On your own. Listen & breathe it in. Feel it. Live it. I like his later records but for some reason he decided to sing like Rolf The Dog after the earlier stuff. His voice is so incredibly soulful on this. Wise beyond his years. Immaculate.



1977- Shellie and Scott met while working as Redcoats at Butlins in Scarborough. Disheartened by the mundane existence of the role while being Inspired by the punk movement and after discovering a mysterious portal during the knobbly knees contest, they transported through time to 2006 and started a psychedelic dub crossover Beach Boys cover band called Dub Only Knows. This concept didn't work particularly well so they transported further back to gain more inspiration with a view to setting up another project in the future. This era is now known as The Redcoat Redemption and they don't like to mention it.

1871 - Kim escaped from her role as a lion tamer from a circus and found herself transported through a hall of mirrors to a post pandemic/apocalyptic coastal town called North Shields where the frontman of a popular noisy boyband from Bristol was performing a DJ set. Shellie had now transported again to this location having a vague recollection of spotting Scott at a Procul Harum gig in 1967 after too many magic truffles. She found herself on a slippery dance floor and met Kim by chance. Kim told Shellie that she had always aspired to be a drummer. Perplexed, Shellie explained that after the truffles she had a visitation from the ghost of a man called Steve Irwin who morphed into an archaeologist named Indiana Jones, telling her she was destined to form a band called 'Snakes With Tits' and that she would know when she met each member.

In their confused and now gin-soaked state, the gang headed outside for a cigarette to try and work out what year it was whilst doing an impromptu extended acapella version of "I've Been Loving You Too Long" by Otis Redding, a circumstance which only reinforced the strange feeling they'd already met in a previous timeline. They asked a reveller what year it was...

It was now 2021. Their time travelling days were far from over. They had to find Scott. 1993 - After navigating the apocalypse Shellie and Kim found themselves at a Smashing Pumpkins gig. Lo and behold Scott was on stage shredding as if his life depended on it. This was their moment. Shellie and Kim abducted Scott while backstage and bundled him into a wheelbarrow.

Snakes With Tits were born! 2024 - The Wheelbarrow hit 1.21 gigawatts and the time travelling trio were propelled through time and space, clinging on for dear life. They found themselves at a roller derby where Ben, a guitar slinging time lord with wheels for feet exclaimed "Ah, you've arrived! Welcome home! I can join you, but I have travelled too far, this must be the last stop on your journey". And from there SNAKES WITH TITS were together and Radgewave Mamgaze was born. "Snakes With Tits will return in... Snakes With Tits: Year of the Snake" • Definitely based on factual events! SWT.



INTERVIEW

IAN FAWDON

AUTHOR

I WAS RECENTLY SENT A COPY OF 'TOO FAR NORTH' A HISTORY OF THE MUSICAL LANDSCAPE OF NORTH EAST ENGLAND OVER THE YEARS.
I ASKED IAN THE WRITER TO ANSWER A FEW QUESTIONS ABOUT IT!



The book is very well researched. How long did the preparation and subsequent writing take?

It took me 12 months to meet and interview the various artists and write the book. It then took another 11 months for it to be published.

Who would you say are the stand out North East bands of all time?

There are so many stand out bands from this region. The Animals were the first and achieved number one singles in the UK and the US. Lindisfarne in the '70s were, believe it or not, touted as the next Beatles and produced some fantastic songs and very successful albums. I was told that the Fog on the Tyne album was only outsold in the UK by Simon and Garfunkel' Greatest Hits album in 1972. In the 1980's Kitchenware Records, based in Newcastle, signed up four great north east bands in Prefab Sprout, The Kane Gang, Martin Stephenson and the Daintees and Hurrah! For me that was a creative high point for this region. So, loads of great bands, and it's still happening.

The book comes across as a passion project, is that how it started out?

I have always had a bias towards north east bands and felt there hadn't been a book written about the various scenes that had occurred up here and that maybe it was a story that needed telling. I therefore set out to look at each scene right up to the current scene in Sunderland, ending up with the highly talented Nadine Shah, from Whitburn.

What do you think of today's scene in the North East?


It seems to be really vibrant at the moment. With the aforementioned scene in Sunderland it seems that the bands themselves are at the forefront and one of the key driving forces for the city's economic resurgence and that may actually be a first in the UK. Great bands like Field Music, The Futureheads and Frankie and the Heartstrings are opening venues, recording studios and leading the initiative to get Sunderland recognised with Music City status. This seems to be inspiring exciting new acts like Swindled, House Proud and Patrick Gosling. It's also refreshing that less glamorous (not that Sunderland is necessarily glamorous!) places like Peterlee are producing exciting music from bands such as Marginal Gains and Fast Blood. Middlesbrough is also doing its bit producing great punky sounds from Benefits and Onlooker. So, all in all, it's really happening up here and generally the scenes appear to be self-sustaining and community based.

Have you any plans to write more books in the future?

Yes, I have written my next book about the greatest rock singer you've never heard. That is Ian Lowery, who was born in Hartlepool and grew up in Peterlee. Ian is a long lost and underappreciated musical treasure and his story is one of exciting highs, self-sabotage, crushing lows and tragedy but also one of great, great music.

When do you think North East music was at its strongest? Its 'hey day'?

I will fudge this and say it's had a number of 'hey days'. In the '60s the music scene was very exciting. People had money in their pockets and music clubs opened from Whitley Bay to Spennymoor and South Shields to Middlesbrough which would be packed out most days of the week. However, despite The Animals became one of the most successful bands in the world there was precious little success for any of the other bands who followed them, of which there were many. The reason for this may have been that The Animals tended to release what were effectively cover songs and the other bands copied this approach at a time when The Beatles and The Stones were writing their own stuff. The only songwriter of note at the time in this region was Alan Hull in a band called The Chosen Few. He would then crop up in Lindisfarne.



Lindisfarne are seen as a leading folk band but in reality the North East has been a recognised hotbed for folk music for over 150 years and folk clubs continue to exist up and down our region to this day.

The North East heavy metal bands of the late '70s and early '80s were a big part of a movement called the New Wave of British Heavy Metal which also spawned Iron Maiden and Def Leppard. Raven and Venom, in particular, have been quoted by massive bands like Metallica and Anthrax as major influences on them. Both Raven and Venom actually took those bands out on early tours in the US as their support bands. So, plenty of 'hey days' to choose from.

NOSFERATU

The old time 'Universal' logo prior to the opening credits was a nice touch. By that point I'd donned my studio headphones to be able to experience the nuances of the stereo soundtrack. I'd seen this movie previously at the Cineworld theatre in Middlesbrough which has since closed its doors (sorry Mal!) but I was rather high at the time and didn't absorb it as much as I probably could have. So for the repeat viewing I opted to watch it on my television.

Colour wise, it's **gloomy** and monochrome, as you would expect from an Eggers production. The sets and locations are sumptuous and pleasing to the **Gothic** eye with some gorgeous shots of rural Eastern Europe.

There are a few visually striking moments in the film, most notably the approach of Count Orlok's horse drawn carriage and when we see Bill Skarsgaard for the first time. He cuts an imposing figure (Skarsgaard is 6' 3") with what is apparently a very accomplished local Romanian accent. The heavy, Darth Vader-esque breathing and long, protracted sentences do tend to verge on the comedic from time to time sucking you out of the atmosphere some what.



Minging!

To the folk dissing Nozzy's tash, it was actually true to the physical appearance of Stoker's original inspiration Vlad (The Impaler) Tepes. Although, in fairness, Dracula and Nosferatu are two different narratives so I would have preferred the 'classic' look, as seen in other Nosferatu portrayals. Orlok doesn't come across as suave and sophisticated like his Dracula counterparts, he's undead in the true sense of the word, a repellent, rotting body inhabited by maggots, demonstrated when Jonathon attempts, rather pathetically, to kill the naked vamp in his cryptlike daytime man cave.

The score is lush and the sound design is high end as you would expect, understated but impacting, maintaining a pervading sense of unease throughout. Overall, slightly disappointing but still worth a squirt.

I've seen some really raucous, high energy, singalong bands in Newcastle like The Stranglers, Ocean Colour Scene and Kula Shaker that I'd rank a lot higher in my list of top Toon gigs. B.J.M have a unique aura about them but their songs can tend to sound similar, with parts of the set getting a wee bit boring. Maybe that's just because I'm not a mega fan so I don't know all their songs. The ones I did know like 'Anemone', 'Pish' and 'Nevertheless' I enjoyed immensely. Then it was off for a sub standard Mini Mart sandwich and a pleasant sleep at Easy Hotel, Newcastle. Rock'n'roll!



HUGH CORNWELL NOSFERATU

A RETROSPECTIVE

An album that often gets overlooked by post-punk and goth music lovers alike, Hugh's 1979 album is a real dark freakshow featuring some eccentric collaborations and guests including Robert & Mark Mothersbaugh from Devo and fellow ex pub-rocker lan Dury.

In fact this dark humoured and gloomy album was a team effort between Cornwell and Robert Williams, the drummer from Captain Beefheart's band (who later appeared on Judge Judy as part of the classic 'Lydon Vs Williams episode).

The album is a bit stark at times, but the overall atmosphere and dystopian and supernatural themes more than make up for the slightly challenging listen. Go check it out!

Tell Dirge a bit about your musical background, the highs, the lows.

A recent review called me a 'musical magpie,' which is actually a much nicer way of saying 'jack of all trades'! However, the flipside of that is I've been enormously lucky in the past 25 years to have played all sorts of genres (jazz, folk, funk, pop, electronica), in all sorts of ensembles (theatre pit bands, classical orchestras, big bands, jazz quartets) and with so many great north east musicians who have challenged and pushed me musically.

Recent musical highs have included writing a full album and then recording it live in front of a studio audience with Slowlight Quartet, and recording two albums with HAV (an ambient-folk trio whose impact looms large on my OUTRI material). Less recent highs (pre-kids!) have included playing Glastonbury, performing live on Radio 4 on the 'Loose Ends' show and various tours of the UK and Europe (pre-Brexit when it was still easy to do for small bands).

Lows have included losing my mind playing for panto a few years running and playing too many wedding & function gigs to drunk and uninterested punters!

You've made the rather unorthodox decision of using solely your bass guitar and voice to make your music as 'OUTRI', how did that come about?

Great question! It all happened very organically from a number of different elements slowly converging. Firstly I realised that original music was where a lot of my passion for playing lies and alongside that the musicians that I really admire, in whatever genre, are the ones who are just doing their own original material, come what may, and ploughing their own path. Secondly I've done so much work as a side person for other musicians which often requires you to play to other peoples requirements and maybe 'tone down' your playing a bit that I wanted space to see what my own musical voice was.

And lastly with a family and small kids, finding time to rehearse and write with other musicians is really tricky, so on a purely practical level only needing to find time for myself to practice makes it very easy to make quick progress! The use of vocals alongside the bass has just occurred organically as well. I'm not a singer but being able to sample and manipulate my voice in real time just felt like a cool thing to add into the mix so I started doing it and haven't looked back. I've recently added a drum machine to the live setup so I'm looking forward to exploring that side of things more in the coming months.

What's the story behind the artist name, 'OUTRI'?

It's actually a made up word, meaning the plural of 'outro'. It came out of a recording session with Slowlight Quartet where we were joking about every tune we wrote having an outro and we just pluralised it. I'd been hunting around for a while for a project name that was 'open' and not easily tied to a specific genre and this just really jumped out at me.

What are your plans for 2025?

Absolutely heaps! I'm back in the studio at the end of Jan recording/filming another three live tracks to release slowly across 2025. I'm then intending to record/film a few more solo singles probably in mid June, hopefully with some live visuals being created at the same time (watch this space!). Then in November I'm heading up to The Old Church Studio in Thropton to record a duo album with Harry Bird. He's a fantastic songwriter and long term musical collaborator, the duo is very much inspired by the incredible Jon Hopkins/King Creosote album "Diamond Mine".

WEIMAR CINEMA FIVE OF THE BES

I think we can all agree that Germany is the greatest country on earth. Deutschland owns a culture and history so rich and varied that it's so easy to fall in love with the land and its volk. One thing the Germans have always been good at (apart from starting wars, of course!) is making amazing films. Here are five of my favourite early German movies.

Peter Lorre's breakout role sees him cast as a serial killer of children running rampant on the mean streets of Weimar Berlin. One of the last pictures to be directed by Fritz Lang before the NAZI party came to power, which resulted in Lang's decision to flee to America. 'M' was very much ahead of its time, demonstrating a gritty plot and utilising many new explorations within the newly introduced world of sound in the cinema. An absolute gem!



VAMPYR (1932)

Celebrated Danish director Carl Theodor Dreyer created a Gothic masterpiece with this otherworldly, fever- dreamlike tale of vampirism set in rural France. Surreal and magnificently shot with some wonderful set pieces (my favourite being the impish shadows on the walls that have a life of their own). Vampyr truly is a disorienting and discombobulating ode to the strange and fantastical which all Goths simply must see!



NOSFERATU - EINE SYMPHONIE DES GRAUENS (1922)

1922's Nosferatu, featuring the rather marvellously named 'Max Schreck' (Schreck meaning) 'terror' in German, and yes that was his birth name!) is the archetypal silent horror movie. Paving the way for so many horror films for years to come (and obviously still influencing film makers today) Nosferatu has a real air of occult mysticism both within the frames and surrounding its production. Look up the film's producer and art director Albin Grau and you'll see what I mean!



THE HANDS OF ORLAC (1924)

The first of two films in this list to feature the iconic Conrad Veidt sees the leading man portraying a famous concert pianist injured following a train crash, unfortunately leading to him having his (much needed) hands amputated! But wait, whilst he was lying in a state of unconsciousness the leading German surgeons of the time managed to successfully transplant a new pair of handies onto the mangled musician. What could possibly go wrong?




THE CABINET OF DR. CALIGARI (1920)

Probably my favourite film from the list, Conrad Veidt plays Caesare, a somnambulist controlled by the eponymous Dr Caligari. Addressing themes such as the horrors of warfare and mental illness, 'Caligari' truly is a silent mind fuck from first frame to last. It's the perfect movie. A celluloid microcosm of Germany in the 1920's, encapsulating those uncertain and violent times perfectly, yet still relevant today.
