

Opening the show on this date of the tour was <u>Faithful Johannes x Neocia</u>. They delivered their ubercool beats and story-telling vocals with laid-back style and humour. The occasional homemade cardboard placard festooned with various lyrics drifted across the 'stage' giving audience members an insight into FJ's mind of whimsical musings and wistful introspection. Their set is always tight and very watchable.

Next came Ceiling Demons. I don't think this venue suited these guys. The two front men are energetic and loud and it was a bit abrasive on the ears in this small room. The night after I saw them again in Newcastle and enjoyed their set as the vocal level was matched by the music. The dark of the Lubber Fiend also contributed to their dark melodies and lyrics. I really like their use of live instruments and their gravelly hip-hop musical style.

I last saw Serengeti around 8 years ago and he is still awesome although he did the same frustrating thing of cutting short almost every single song he played. His beats and his lyrics are genius and it's such a shame that he seems to get easily bored with his own live show. He kept saying he'd do another one then get out of our hair. Thankfully the crowd kept persuading him to do more. Songs like 'Tracks' and 'Dennehy' and 'The Whip' are just sublime. He did some newer stuff which is also great.

Although Angels Cut is a neat venue, I don't think a sit-down set-up was right for this particular lineup. The next night at Newcastle saw much better performances by all the acts. But I still had a decent night and I appreciate all venues that put on live and original music. D.H

HIYA, JADE. THANKS FOR TALKING TO DIRGE! HOW DO YOU DECIDE ON WHICH SONGS YOU WRITE WILL BE USED FOR DINKY AND WHICH WILL BE USED FOR YOUR SOLO STUFF?

I don't sit down to write either solo or Dinky songs, but naturally the introspective ballad side tends to fit more with the me & and acoustic vibes, whereas the angry protesty ranty songs fit better with Dinky. I've brought songs to Dinky that the band didn't get on with or it didn't fit for one reason or another so then I've done those solo. I love being able to do both. There's the softer sensitive side of me & the screaming hellbitch too! Delicate flower, prickly thorns...

WHAT DO YOU WISH TO ACHIEVE NEXT ON YOUR 'MUSICAL JOURNEY'? SORRY FOR THE CRINGE TERM THERE!

Putting out my debut solo album is such a big thing of course, but it was finished months ago & I've already written the next album so I'm super excited to hit the studio as soon as possible to start on that. We've also spoken about doing a Dinky album which has been delayed somewhat by line-up changes, but hopefully we can start work on that before the end of the year. And just to keep playing, I'd live on tour & play every night of my life if I could. I can do that. I can't do real life!

YOU SADLY LOST YOUR MAM RECENTLY, HOW DID SHE SHAPE YOUR MUSICAL TASTE AND DID SHE HAVE A BIG PART TO PLAY IN YOUR MUSIC?

I remember raiding my parents' record collection when I was a kid & discovering Simon & Garfunkel & the Beach Boys who both became firm favourites. She also passed on a love of Elvis - who was her favourite artist & I remember watching his movies with her when I was little. She loved coming to my solo shows & even Dinky ones by the end... "Too sweary, too loud, your skirts are too short!" Her being at shows, especially since her diagnosis, always made them that bit more special & though it's not quite the same, I do feel her with me still. I'm still up there trying to make her proud. I decided to put her on the album cover before she passed because that photo was so perfect, so she got to see the cover & hear it.



I BRIEFLY TALKED TO YOU AT LAST TRAIN HOME, HOW DID IT GO AND DID YOU SEE ANY OTHER BANDS?

It was incredible. I was blown away by how many people came to see us, especially as we were on so early. But playing early gives you a chance to relax after & run around with your clash finder & check out the other bands. I love Venus Grrrls & Ruth Lyon so those were a given, but for me Lawn Chair – a band from Germany I'd never heard of – stole the day. Discovering new artists is what festivals are all about for me.

CARL GREEN & THE SCENE MACHINE MUSIC

THE FORUM DARLO

I know Roz as the creative force being the/this notorious Dirge Mag. Only notorious by the way as it's a bastion of truth and reality. And occasionally quite amusing. So it's intriguing for me to discover if the man's creative edge translates into his musical output? I miss the first song as usual not realising the live stream in the bar is actually Machine Music performing in the main room next door. Three people in folk horror robes and hoods play a sort of spooked funk rock mash up. I actually thought it was some old footage from the 70's.

I've heard MM's online material, it's a prolific output with huge stylistic variations and numerous spin off projects. The striking thing about it all, is the attention to musicality and detail but delivered in a nonchalant and seemingly oblivious to at least current conventions way. Which translates exactly the same way in a live setting. This is what Roz describes as his 'pop shit' project. For context I would translate 'pop shit' as comparable to the sounds of Eels, early Beck and even Gorillaz. Put some Stranglers bass in the mix. And a Casio tone disco preset. And a toy piano. Deliver it all like you're living in your world, not ours. Dance weird. And play guitar notes that shouldn't fit, but do. A creative force yes. 4.1/5 in accordance with Roz's own marking scheme.

There's three in the band now, it's only their third gig (please correct me if that's wrong) and there's realistically some gelling and refining of the performance to work on, but the material is all there. The audience love it, and the MM don't realise it. I like that. It's way off what you expect to hear on a night out in Darlington. Sing along and smile if you dare. It's edgy though. Mid set they played the superb 'Pedestrian Sex'. I could have listened to that one all night.

Carl has done his back in, he can barely walk, but this true gentleman of the North East music scene (and beyond, they made it to Number 3 in the finland pop chart oh yes!) is chatting away about his songs with us, right up until he's due on stage. The set, he tells us cheerfully, is going to be all songs from the bands early days which is "quite a long time ago".

He reminds me of Ade Edmundson. I have a vague recollection of seeing Carl play in one of his bands in the fuzzy past, so I'm expecting something really good like Devo. What we get is as fresh and relevant as anything being force fed to us by the music industry just now. In fact it's better.

There's a skilled way of writing songs like those performed by CGATS tonight that's in slow decline, replaced by the "I'm so bored I can't be arsed" school of lazy song writing by numbers. Which is fine, I don't care. But it's nice when you hear what's actually possible.

I can't help thinking this is a set of songs that's somehow been overlooked by the universe. I guess that goes with the territory, as in, being a band from the North East of England. Not LA. The set is absolutely full on angular new wave. Joe Jackson. Devo. Split Enz. XTC. Crowd are very happy. Carl does most of the show seated at a small kitchen table twitching and fidgeting manically n his chair. Its brilliant, like being sat in the living room with your slightly eccentric uncle after he's popped too much medication into his vodka and energy drink cocktail. And maybe a jazz cigarette.

The forum is a brilliant place, nice bar, nice people and a glorious stage and sound system. A few too many hideous tribute acts for me personally, but we can't change the world. JEFF BUCKLEY - GRACE (1994)

This album was the easiest and most obvious choice for me. Jeff probably has my favourite voice of all time, and this album has everything that I enjoy within music – darkness, dreaminess, anger, haunting beauty. Mojo Pin and So Real are my standout tracks. I'll always wonder what else he would have created if he'd made it past 30.



ALANIS MORRISETTE - JAGGED LITTLE PILL (1995)

It is the almost unparalleled brutal honesty and rawness that Alanis delivers in these tracks that sold this album as a top five. She is one of the artists who reminds me that it is okay to say exactly what you mean in a song without any sugar coating (You Oughta Know, I'm looking at you). Every time I listen, I find new wisdom in her words.



AMY WINEHOUSE - BACK TO BLACK (2006)

I wrestled with myself about this one, because I love Frank about equally to Back to Black. However, You Know I'm No Good, Wake Up Alone and Me & Deamp; Mr Jones are some of my most favourite tunes of all time and I had to pick one, so there we go. Amy was a true visionary, and she'll always be one of the very greatest as far as I'm concerned.



RADIOHEAD - THE BENDS (1995)

It could have easily been In Rainbows, but this was the album I had on repeat as a teenager and I still find it exciting every time I listen to it. It's full to the brim with angst which I weirdly find very cleansing. For me, not a single song is a skip, but special mentions go to Planet Telex, (Nice Dream) and Just.



ELBOW - SELDOM SEEN KID (2008)

I'll always have a massive soft spot for Elbow, and I bloody love this album. Guy Garvey's lyrics are poetry to me – The Bones of You includes some of my favourite lyrics of all time. Tracks like Mirrorball make me feel like I'm drifting down a river, while Grounds for Divorce makes me want to smash things for fun. What else do you need?

As an artist, you will earn roughly \$0.003 per stream on Spotify while Ek sweeps up the profit from ads and subscriptions. Not only that, but his platform is being flooded with bots and A.I artists. This means he can pay real creatives even less. As a user, you are funding Spotify either through ads or by paying for a subscription. All of this is going into the military industrial complex, while very few of your favourite artists make much money from it.



We can not bemoan the fact that we don't get paid for making art if we expect it from others for free. Nor can we hold up placards and wave flags against the horrors of war, knowing the fruits of our labour are funding it.

And what for? The hope that new fans find us, when we all know that algorithms are stacked against that anyway? Is the meagre sum we are paid more important than preventing a Skynet-style apocalypse?

Manifesto point one involves a boycott of streaming services, particularly Spotify, both by consumers and artists. **m.P**

I CAUGHT UP WITH DALE DURING THE NIGHTMARE SEQUENCE IN 1989'S THE BURBS, AND DECIDED TO ROAST HIM.

HI DALE, THANKS FOR TO TALKING TO LITTLE OLD DIRGE! WHERE DO YOU THINK AMERICANA BASED FOLK SITS IN THE FIRMAMENT OF THE NORTH EAST MUSIC SCENE?

Hi Dirge, you're not little at all. For me all American folk is hugely influenced by Anglo and Scot immigrants and their music, many of whom were probably from our area. I typed out a huge essay on this but it'd take up too many pages I think. I cant speak for anyone else and don't know where my music or style of music sits in the North East music scene, there's loads of great writers here, I don't believe anyone sits above anyone else. Like all music, people love it, people despise it, I'm going to keep writing songs until I'm gone either way.

WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS ON THE STATUS QUO OF THE TEESSIDE SCENE AT THE MOMENT? DOES IT FILL YOU WITH HOPE?

Yes it does. Our area is full of amazing creative people, a lot people seem to be doing their own DIY things rather than wait for opportunities, which I'm fully on board with.

I do think more grants should be available for Teesside specifically, and that some of these should be for less commercially minded artists. I understand why the few funds that come in go to the same people with backing, organisation and financial viability, but this must change. To be honest it seems to be slowly getting there. I think the North East is the most densely populated artistic region in the country, and manages to do so with the least resources.



WHAT INSPIRES YOU THE MOST TO PICK UP THE GUITAR AND WRITE A SONG? WHAT COMES FIRST? THE LYRICS, A MELODY OR THE CHORD PROGRESSION?

All my songs are just little pretend stories based on my own life, people and scenery that I've known etc. I always have a lot of lyrics on the go, and musical ideas or concepts. In terms of inspiration, this is the first time I haven't been in a band since I was 14 years old, so writing songs is something I must do, it's my only musical outlet. I've tried to stop before, was not good. Some songs come out fully formed in 10 minutes. I've just finished one that I had the idea for 12 years ago. I think once you've established the parameters of your style, they come from elsewhere in their own time. We're just conduits. If you're meant to write music and don't then it will batter you, metaphorically.

INTERVIEW

J.P RIGGALL

OWEATHERSHIPBAND

YOU RECENTLY STARTED UP YOUR OWN LABEL SINISTER KID. IS THAT FOR YOUR OWN RELEASES OR ARE YOU HOPING TO RELEASE STUFF BY SOME LOCAL BANDS? IF SO WHO WOULD YOU LIKE ON YOUR ROSTER?

It's more of a pet project really, kind of a revamp of Bear Love Records. Facebook kindly removed me as admin from that page so I couldn't access it, and it didn't really fit with the Weathership aesthetic anyway. Sinister Kid does. For now it'll be our home, but long-term I'd love to put other stuff out. That'll probably be once I hang up my guitar though.

TELL DIRGE A BIT ABOUT THIS GIG AT CHRISTMAS, THE DARK DARK XMAS HAS BECOME A BIT OF A REGULAR THING, EH?

Yeah, it's become a tradition now. We started in 2013 at The Studio in Hartlepool, then moved to The Green Room in 2014. We've done every year since, except for the gap between 2019–2021. It's honestly my favourite gig of the year (though Stockton Calling might run it close). It's always packed with familiar faces and usually sells out. We called it 'Dark Dark Xmas' because we're naturally a bit on the melancholic side — apart from 2017 when Be Quiet Shout Loud! played and brightened it up!

HOW'S THE ALBUM RECORDING GOING? AND WHEN'S IT DROPPING? HOW DOES IT COMPARE SONICALLY TO THE LAST ONE?

We're currently recording partly on our own and partly with Jamie Donnelly (Up The Music Services). We're about 40% through — all the songs are written. The record follows a narrative about a man aboard a ship dealing with mental health issues, and a lot of current affairs run through it as similes, which I think people will relate to. Sonically, it's in the same ballpark as the last album, but we're pushing the dynamics harder: quieter quiets, louder louds. The plan is to release a run of singles over the next few months, then hopefully drop the full album in the first half of next year. Personally, I think it's my best lyrical work yet.

YOU LIKE BISCUITS. WHAT IS YOUR FAVOURITE BISCUIT?

Top two, hands down: Digestives and Bourbons. Both understated, both comforting — especially dipped.

I DIG THAT. NOT PARTICULARLY EXHILARATING YET SAFE AND COMFORTING. LIKE ROY CROPPER OFF CORONATION STREET. SPEAK AGAIN SOON, MATE! ROZ.
