
PARADE OF PIANOS

H.R.2102 Major Richard Star Act



Contact your legislators and urge them to support the Major Richard Star Act, which would authorize combat-injured veterans to receive their earned Department of Defense retirement pay for years of service and their Veterans Administration disability compensation for lifelong injury.

Currently, these combat-injured (and often seriously disabled) veterans are subject to a cost-saving offset where their retirement pay is reduced for every dollar of VA disability received. To reduce earned retirement pay because of a combat disability is an injustice; the compensation for these injured veterans is not the place to achieve savings.

The Major Richard Star Act aims to provide concurrent receipt of veterans' disability compensation and retired pay for comb at-disabled veterans, addressing a long-standing disparity in benefits.

PURPOSE OF THE ACT:

The Major Richard Star Act is designed to amend Title 10 of the United States Code, allowing certain veterans—specifically those medically retired with combat-related disabilities—to receive both their full military retirement pay and VA disability compensation without offset. This means that veterans who were injured in combat and have less than 20 years' service will no longer have their retirement pay reduced by the amount of their disability compensation.



Major Richard Star

BACKGROUND:

The act is named after **Major Richard Star**, an Iraq and Afghanistan veteran who passed away from service-connected cancer in 2021. His story highlights the struggles faced b many veterans who are denied full benefits due to bureaucratic rules that penalize them for injuries sustained in service.

WHO QUALIFIES?

The act primarily targets **Chapter 61 retirees**, which includes veterans who were medically retired due to combat-related injuries and have a disability rating of at least 30%. To qualify for the benefit under this Act, veterans must be receiving **Combat-Related Special Compensation (CRSC)**.

LEGISLATIVE STATUS:

Introduced in March 2025, the **Major Richard Star Act** has garnered significant bipartisan support, with over 185 co-sponsors un the House and 43 sponsors in the Senate. This broad coalition reflects a shared commitment to rectify the injustices faced by combat-disabled veterans.

IMPLICATIONS:

The act addresses a critical financial disparity for veterans, allowing them to receive the full benefits they have earned without the burden of offsets that previously reduced their retirement pay. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that around 50,000 veterans may benefit from this legislation, which aims to provide much-needed financial relief.



In summary, the **Major Richard Star Act** represents a significant step towards ensuring that combat-disabled veterans receive the full compensation they deserve for their service and sacrifices.

President Jrump Signs Order to Rename the Department of Defense as the Department of War

President Trump signed an executive order on Friday to give the Department of Defense a new name: the Department of War.

Speaking from the Oval Office, Trump said the rebranding reflected a new tone for the country and its military.

A White House fact sheet explains that under the executive or "secondary title" for the Department of Defense.

According to the fact sheet, the order will also authorize Defense Department officials to substitute the word "war" into their titles. For example, the Secretary of Defense could use the title Secretary of War.

Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth appeared to acknowledge the change in a post on social media on Thursday, writing simply, "DEPARTMENT OF WAR."

President Trump had previously signaled that a change was in the works. During an appearance in the Oval Office last month, Trump said that War Department "just sounded to me better."

Trump does not have the authority to change the department's name without congressional action. The legal name was established by Congress in 1949, when it renamed the newly unified military service branches under a new "Department of Defense" following World War II.

In a statement to NPR, constitutional scholar Steve Vladeck confirmed that, while the president is free to *refer* to the Pentagon by whatever name he chooses, its "legal name can't change without Congress." After signing the order on Friday, Trump indicated that the administration would ask Congress to codify the change into law but also said, "I'm not sure they have to."

Almost from the country's founding, the army was overseen by the War Department, but the sprawling agency took on its current name following an act of Congress in 1949. At the time, the change marked the culmination of an effort by President Harry Truman to unify the Air Force, Army and Navy under the umbrella of a single department.

As the largest department in the U.S. government, even just changing signs, seals and titles could prove costly. In 2023, an Army official told Congress that an effort to rename only nine Army bases would cost taxpayers \$39 million.

Putting a Stop to Loneliness During the Holidays

As we approach the fall and winter seasons, we have much to be thankful for, indeed. As the weather begins to cool, the numbers of creepy critters start to decline, and colors in nature transition to beautiful orange and red hues. For many, the thought of pumpkin spice lattes and delicious apple treats becomes a signature delight.

For some, however, the beginning of the holiday season may include feelings of loneliness and even depression. One study found that upwards of 38% of individuals over the age of 65 reported some degree of loneliness (Steed et al., 2007). A segment of these individuals also specified that weekends and holidays contributed to their feelings of loneliness.

To avoid feelings of isolation and sadness, we can take various steps to limit these sometimes-persistent feelings. These include:

- Check on others! If you are feeling lonely, someone else is most likely feeling the same way. Give your friends a call and see how they are doing. This simple gesture can also lead to a get-together, which could entail some hot apple cider or pumpkin spice lattes!
- Join some craft-making opportunities! These opportunities become more common around this time of year and are typically fun and holiday-focused (like creating a fall or winter centerpiece). You may even make new friends.



Reach out and touch someone and make new friends!

- Start a thankfulness journal. This type of opportunity can help you focus less on the negative aspects of your life and more on the positive ones.
- Give back to your community (locally or globally). These opportunities can be as simple as writing greeting cards, sending gift baskets to deployed military personnel, or even filling a box to send through Operation Christmas Child. This can also help cultivate your thankfulness.
- Invite others you may know and start your own holiday traditions by possibly hosting a gathering. It doesn't have to be fancy or elaborate. It can be as simple as having hot chocolate and watching your favorite Christmas movie. Or maybe you can build gingerbread houses together and have your own friendly competition.
- Lastly, maybe you can bring some joy and comfort into your home by putting up some decorations and experiencing wonderful, quiet moments filled with self-reflection. These moments can include sitting by a comforting fireplace, playing music, or reading your favorite book.

Seven Actions that Will Change Your Life



- 1. Men (especially), out of courtesy to the fairer sex, always put the toilet seat back down when through.
- 2. When you decide to make coffee, add a pinch of salt to the grounds. Why? Adding salt to coffee activates our sensory receptors. Sodium ions found in salt prevent the taste buds from sending signals to the brain for the bitter flavor. At the same time, this mechanism enhances the sweetness of the coffee.
- 3. When you go to the gas station to fill your gas tank, it is advisable to keep your gas tank at least half full to ensure the safety and longevity of your vehicle's fuel systems. Why? For several reasons:

Prevents sediment buildup: Keeping the tank full helps prevent sediment from clogging the fuel pump and filter, which can lead to engine damage.

Avoids condensation issues: An empty tank can lead to condensation, which can freeze and cause fuel lines to freeze, preventing the engine from starting.

Maintains fuel pump efficiency: A full tank allows the fuel pump to operate more efficiently, reducing wear and potential failure. **Reduces the risk of air intake**: Keeping the tank full prevents air from cause overheating and other mechanical issues.



How to save money at the gas pump!

- 4. When it's meal time and you are preparing to offer rice, take a glass and fill it with as much rice as you think you might need. Next, pour cold water into your cooking bowl with twice as much water as the measured rice. Place the bowl with water and rice in the microwave and cook for 20 minutes. You will have perfect rice every time.
- 5. When you decide to paint your walls—especially if it has been a while—purchase a box of TSP (Trisodium Phosphate) and mix with warm water. Wearing sturdy rubber gloves, wipe down the walls/area. Why? Using TSP on walls before painting is important because it effectively removes dirt, grease, and mildew, providing a clean surface that ensures better paint adhesion. It is an essential step in paint preparation, resulting in longer-lasting and more professional-looking results.
- 6. When you get your coffee and it has a "seam" on the top of the cup, always line up the spout hole with that seam. Why? To avoid spilling coffee on yourself. That bit of wisdom is especially valuable during night driving.
- 7. When you complete your "business" in the bathroom and use the last tissue, always replace the empty roll with a new one. Why? That is known as common courtesy in respecting the next person.

These are seven actions of many I have learned in my 75-plus years. I hope you find them likewise beneficial.

What's Hidden Beneath Our Commander-in-Chief's White House?





The White House is one of the most famous and instantly recognizable buildings in the world. Even if you've never actually taken the public tour of the East Wing and the Residence, you're likely still familiar with much of the building through news broadcasts, documentaries, movies, and TV series — although the latter two are normally shot on soundstages in Hollywood.

But beneath the pristine North Lawn and the Ionic columns of America's most famous residence lies a world that few will ever see. Under the White House, hidden from the general public, is a surprising amount of infrastructure providing an eclectic array of services, from secret tunnels to high-tech command centers and even a florist.

PRESIDENTIAL EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER

The most famous feature hidden beneath the White House is the Presidential Emergency Operations Center (PEOC). It was originally constructed as a relatively simple bunker during World War II to protect President Franklin D. Roosevelt in the event of an aerial attack on Washington, D.C. The bunker was later used during the 9/11 attacks, when a number of key personnel were evacuated from their offices in the White House to the PEOC. Afterward, extensive renovations turned the PEOC — located under the East Wing and accessible via a secret elevator — into a far more sophisticated

control center. While we don't know the extent of what's down there, we do know that there are televisions, phones, and all the necessary communications facilities for managing emergency situations.

TUNNEL NETWORK

It's believed that an extensive tunnel system connects the White House to other key government buildings, though the total length remains classified.

MOAA LUNCHEON PRESENTATION

"Life of a Judge Advocate"

Our guest speaker was Lt. Col. Thomas J. Brown, one of our very own members. Tom talked about Air Force Judge Advocate's array of legal issues they deal with and then about his experiences from 1970 to late 1990. Tom focused on three cases involving murder that he dealt with. One of them at George Air Force Base in which an airman named Ron B. Gillette was charged with first degree murder of his spouse, Beatriz. It was featured on Forensic Files, Session 10, Episode 11, which can be found on You Tube. The court reporter then was one of our members Lee Bogert.

Tom Brown was born into a military-focused family, as his father worked as an aircraft engine engineer for the Army Air Corp at Wright Field in Dayton, Ohio during World War II when Tom was born in December 1943. Throughout his younger years his father would take him and his older brother to Military Aircraft events and an occasional ride in a smaller aircraft.

Tom developed a strong interest in the US Air Force seeking to be a pilot via Air

Force ROTC at Ohio State University in the mid-60s.

During his time at Ohio State, Tom lost his 20/20 eyesight which was required to be a pilot in the Air Force. So, he changed his focus to becoming an Air Force Judge Advocate. He applied to several law schools in his senior year at Ohio State and selected the University of Cincinnati Law School, which was close to home and his father's position as a jet engine engineer at GE in Evandale Ohio. Tom graduated with a Juris Doctor Degree in 1969 and passed the Ohio Bar Examination in his first try, which the Air Force required. Tom also married his wife Carol in August 1969.



Tom reported for his first assignment as a Judge Advocate in January 1970 at Malmstrom Air Force Base in Great Falls Montana in the middle of temperatures below zero Fahrenheit. Tom went on to a 21-year career as an Air Force officer and served two times overseas in England and Japan and at five other U.S. bases where he served as Defense Counsel, Prosecutor, Staff Judge Advocate, and Military Judge. Tom ended his time in the Air Force at the end of 1990 after he was offered a position to take over as CEO of a military Credit Union which later changed their charter to a regional charter in eastern San Bernardino County where he worked for 18 years.

Tom has been a MOAA life member 14 years and Chapter President three times. In 1995 Mojave Desert Chapter won "Chapter of the Year" when MOAA was "The Retired Military Officers of America."

Funded by DARPA, the United States Air Force, and NASA, the X-29 was developed by Grumman, and the two built were flown by NASA and the United States Air Force. The aerodynamic instability of the X-29's airframe required the use of computerized fly-by-wire control. Composite materials were used to control the aeroelastic divergent twisting experienced by forward-swept wings, and to reduce weight. The aircraft first flew in 1984 and became the first forward-swept wing aircraft to break the sound barrier in level flight.

Meet key flight test pilots and engineers who took the aircraft through its paces and get an intimate behind-the-scenes look at the events that shattered the analog world and ushered in the digital age of aviation. Reception begins at 1700 hours with the dinner and awards program starting at 1845 hours.

The Flight Test Museum is the custodian of a unique collection of aerospace systems, including record-setting jets, such as the SR-71 Blackbird, and space exploration systems, such as the Lunar Landing Research Vehicle, that have contributed to the advancement of technology pioneered at Edwards Air Force Base, California. Due to restricted base access, virtually all exhibits and aircraft have been unavailable to the general public. Currently, supporters are helping fund an effort to expand the museum to provide free access to all. The publicly accessible new wing of the museum will house prototypes and experimental aircraft that have a special connection with Edwards AFB, the U. S.A.F. Test Pilot School, NASA, and the Aerospace Valley. It will also offer K-12 students a

Edwards Air Force Base Jest Pilot Selected for Yearlong NASA Mars Mission Simulation

NASA SNEAK PREVIEW OF MARS MISSION HABITAT

A test pilot and instructor from Edwards Air Force Base has been selected as one of four volunteers to take part in a yearlong Mars mission simulation program led by NASA to study long-term human survivability on the Red Planet.

U.S. Air Force Maj. Ross Elder, who serves as director of operations for the F-35 Integrated Test Force and Air Force Test Pilot School instructor at Edwards Air Force Base, will take part in the Crew Health and Performance Exploration Analog program, base officials announced Monday.

Elder and his three fellow volunteers, Ellen Ellis, Matthew Montgomery, and James Spicer, will spend 378 days living inside a 1,700-square-foot mock-up of a proposed Mars habitat design at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, according to the space agency.

U.S. Air Force Maj. Ross Elder, who serves as director of operations for the F-35 Integrated Test Force and Air Force Test Pilot School instructor at Edwards Air Force Base, has been selected to take part in a yearlong NASA Mars mission simulation Provided by the U.S. Air Force

The mission is slated to begin on October 19, 2025 and continue through October 31, 2026.

"We are proud to congratulate Major Ross Elder on his selection as Commander for the forthcoming NASA - National Aeronautics and Space Administration CHAPEA Crew," according to a USAF statement. "Major Elder becomes the inaugural [Test Pilot School] staff member to be selected for this unique type of space mission."

While living in the simulated Mars base, the crew members will carry out tasks including science experiments, going on simulated Mars walks, operating robots and growing a vegetable garden. They will also test out newly developed technologies for space travel, such as medical diagnostic equipment.

The insights gained from the project will be applied to future missions, CHAPEA, Principal Investigator Grace Douglas explained. "The simulation will allow us to collect cognitive and physical performance data to give us more insight into the potential impacts of the resource restrictions and long-duration missions to Mars on crew

health and performance," she said. "Ultimately, this information wil design and plan for a successful human mission to Mars."

The upcoming CHAPEA mission will be NASA's second, officials said. The first mission ended in July of 2024.
