John Dickenson: Signer of the Constitution declared, "Rendering thanks to my creator, to Him I resign myself humble confiding in His goodness and His mercy through Jesus Christ for the events of eternity."

Charles Carroll: Signer of the Declaration of Independence. He was the last of the 56 to die. He declared "On the mercy of my redeemer I rely for salvation and on His merits not the works that I have done in obedience to His precepts."

John Jay: Original Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court and Governor of New York. Also one of the original founders of the American Bible Society. He was the 2nd president of the ABS. He declared, "Unto Him who is the author of all good I render sincere and humble thanks for His manifold and unmerited blessings and especially for our redemption and salvation by His beloved son, blessed be his Holy Name."

September 7, 1774: The original U.S. Congress opened with prayer. The opening prayer

lasted 3 hours.

John Adams wrote his wife Abigail that they prayed and had a bible study out of Psalms 35 + 36. They were so confident their faith grew to where they believed they could defeat Samuel Adams: The father of the British in the upcoming conflict. He told his wife Abi-"I rely upon the merits of Jesus father, who was a minister, and have him read them to the church. Now out of the 250 founding fathers we have at least 12 that were not Christians. They were Jefferson, Franklin, Joe Barlow, Henry Lee, Aaron Bur, Thomas Payne, Ethan Allen, Charles Lee and Henry Dearborn. Only 5% of the founding fathers were not Christian

But your average founding father started the American Tract Society, American Sunday School Union, Bible Society, Board of Commission for Foreign Missions and the Christian Constructional Society. Again, not bad for all being atheists, deists and agnostics.

Ben Franklin One of our least religious founding fathers. When the average life span was

35 Franklin was 81 when his body was falling to pieces, but his brain was still sharp. June 28th 1787 Franklin gave this speech to the then present Congress. Remember Franklin is the least religious of our founding fathers. He says, "In the beginning of the contest with Great Britain when we were severely in danger, we had daily prayer in this room for divine protection. Our prayers were heard and graciously answered. I have lived a long time and the longer I live the more convincing proofs I see of this truth, that God governs in the affairs of men. Except the Lord build a house they labor in vain that build it. Without his concurring aid we shall not succeed in this political building no better than the builders of Babel." He encouraged the Congress to pray everyday before they proceed to business. The least religious of the founding fathers tells Congress that they are not praying enough.

In 1952 the Supreme Court said, "...are you suggesting that we should separate religious instruction from public education?" The court went on to say, "...that would be impossible, that would violate all of our laws, all of our traditions. No way we will separate religious instruction from public education."

In 1962 the Warren Court started a war against religion. The court in essence said in Engel vs. Vitale, that we can't let you pray in public. Prayer in school has got to come to a grinding halt. And for the last

three decades Americans have been taught that this is the reason the founding fathers gave us the First Amendment. The implication being that the founding fathers found school prayer reprehensible; it was repugnant to them, and that is why they gave us the First Amendment.

If the founding fathers were so opposed to prayer in school why didn't they stop it? Why was prayer in schools for 170 years before the Warren Court discovered them saving we don't need this anymore?

The 1963 Warren Court said the founding fathers would never want the bible to be read in schools.

1782 the first bible printed in English in the United States was printed by the Congress of the US. These fathers went on to say "...this bible is for the use in schools."

And the Supreme Court today says the First Amendment mandates the separation of church and state. The Amendment reads, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof;... There is no separation phrase here.

The Constitution requires that everything said on the floor of the House and Senate be recorded in public records for our public consumption. This grieves many of our Congressmen and Senators today. The entire 256 founding fathers, even the non-Christians, never



even mention once the separation of church and state.

In 1789 James Madison summed it up like this:

"What we want in America is what we couldn't have in Great by a power within them or a Britain. We don't want it so the Federal Government will make us all one denomination. We don't want to all be Catholics, or Jews, or Anglicans, or anything else, we want our ability to choose our own denominations."

Can Congress constitutionally take prayer out of public schools?

Even though the 10 Commandments have formed the basis of civil law in the western world for years, the Court tells us they don't want to mess people up by forcing the 10 commandments down their throat.

Why has violent crime increased 694% since that time of taking prayer and bible out of our schools?

The Supreme Court seems to say that, by letting our kids see the Ten Commandments, we have set a very dangerous president. Why? If the kids saw the Ten Commandments,

they might obey them. We can't have that, can we?

Robert Winthrop: A statesman speaker of the House of Representatives said, "Men by word must be controlled either power without them. Either by the word of God or by the strong arm of man. Either by the bible or by the bayonet.'

The only way to control human

behavior is by internal restraints by the word of God. If people don't do it from the inside you are in trouble, because you have to beat it into them from the outside

What does America rely on today? The bible? The courts say that is unconstitutional. How about external force? So now we pass laws at a rate beyond belief, trying to make people act right, think right, speak right, behave right, and do right; and it doesn't help. Because if you can't handle the

inside, you will never handle the outside.

looking at the corner stone of the capital and said, "That rock is not the foundation stone of American Government. It's right here." He said (pointing at his heart), "Whatever makes men good Christians makes them good citizens."

How do we get from where we are, back to where we were?

William Patterson was a signer of the Constitution, from

ades after signing the Constitution. He said, "Two decades America has already become a world leader. People come here from all over the world to see what makes us great. It's the Constitution. As great as this document is, it will not guarantee that America retains good government. Nor will it guarantee that we have sound policies in America. be worthless..."

The 1992 Supreme Court case Lee vs. Weisman took up the question of prayer at graduation. Argument in this case was historical. The court was shown how our founding fathers not only had prayer, but also gave sermons at graduations. The court was shown an actual bible that our founding fathers printed, just for use in schools. And the case was lost, 5-4, with Justice David Souter, who cast the deciding vote against prayer, implying that although the founding fathers may have participated and condoned prayers at graduations, they may not have fully understood the Constitution.

What good is the Constitution in the hands of people like David Souter?

Proverbs 29:2 says, "...when the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice; but, when a wicked man rules, the people groan."

In the name of God, Amen. We, whose names are underwritten, the loyal subjects of our dread sovereign Lord, King James, by the grace of God, of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King defender of the faith, etc. Having undertaken, for the Glory of God, and Advancement of the Christian faith, and Honor of our King and Country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of Virginia; do by these presents, solemnly and mutually, in the Presence of God and of one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil Body Politik, for our better Ordering and Preservation, and Furtherance of the Ends aforesaid; And by virtue hereof to enact, constitute and frame such just and equal Laws, Oordinances, Acts, Constitutions, and Offices, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the General good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In Witness whereof we have hereunder subscribed our names at Cape Cod the eleventh of November, in the Reign of our Sovereign Lord, King James of England, France and Ireland, the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fifty-fourth, Anno Domini 1620.
