Module #1

Medical Radiography Technologist – Medical Radiography X-rated Exposures

- Participate in an X-ray experience
- Manipulate and expose an avatar and our life sized human specimens
- Review X rays to see what is right and what is wrong

Continuation of Module #1

Sonography

- Have the students participate in scanning each other's easily identifiable organs (gallbladder, kidneys, etc.)
- Scan Eva (our OB/GYN Simulator) to get exposure to obstetric scanning
- Review how ultrasound works and the different applications of the modality
- Do live demonstrations of more complex scanning (cardiac)

Dental Studies – Dental assisting or dental hygiene

- · Manipulate dental materials; create an imprint of your thumb and make a plaster thumb model to take home
- · Take dental x-rays using traditional film and digital technology
- Experience placing a rubber dam, and using a variety of dental assisting and dental hygiene instruments on a mannequin
- Mix and place temporary filling materials on a mannequin tooth
- Use a mirror and Vel Scope technology to explore the oral cavity

Medical Laboratory Technologist – Learn what happens in a hospital laboratory

- Determining your blood type
- Tell the difference between a cancer cell and a normal body cell

Nursing – A career in nursing can be many things (Health Care Assistant; Registered Nurse, Specialty Nurse; Nurse Practitioner)

- Work with mannequins to practice skills such as wound care, dressings, and cast care

- Find out how eyesight and hearing tests are done
- Real life case studies to learn about diseases.

Northern Medical Program

Our Story

The story of the Northern Medical Program is one of what can be accomplished when people come together to bring about change.

In June 2000, a critical healthcare shortage in Northern BC sparked a public rally with several thousand people in attendance. With presentations from local leaders, the rally led to a community demand for a medical school in the North.



From the time of the rally to the first class starting in the Northern Medical Program in 2004, it took just four years to make this dream a reality. Working together, representatives from UBC, UNBC, local and provincial government and others developed a proposal and then a plan to launch a medical school that would train physicians in the North with the key skills needed for work in rural and northern communities.





Northern Medical Program

To ensure success in meeting our goal of developing physicians with skills in rural medicine and health, the NMP has focused on cultivating programs that help students learn in a northern and rural context. This includes rural

family practice placements, immersion experiences in Indigenous and small northern communities, northern and rural research project opportunities, and clinical training in remote regional hospitals.

To encourage northern and rural students to consider careers in healthcare, including medicine, we have developed projects such as the Healthcare Travelling Roadshow, which visits rural high schools, and Northern Pathways to Medicine, a bursary and enrichment program which supports undergraduate students.

In the past decade since it was first launched, the NMP has been able to achieve numerous successes. We have been able to help recruit new physicians to the North who contribute not only to patient care in the region but also to the education of our students. Our academic faculty have developed leading research programs in both the medical and social sciences that provide benefits to the North, Canada and the globe. And we continue to see growing numbers of our graduates returning to work in the north as family doctors, specialists, and NMP faculty preceptors and leaders.



COMMUNITY SERVICE

HOW SMALL STEPS CAN CREATE BIG CHANGE

Community service is a non-paying job performed by one person or a group of people for the benefit of the community or its institutions. The one serving may be able to take something away from the experience and be able to



use any newfound knowledge or interpersonal discoveries to improve their future servitude and the people around them.

To gain the most from community service requires balancing learning with serving. Learning and serving at the same time improves a student's community while teaching life lessons and building character.

Community service-learning is "about leadership development as well as traditional information and skill acquisition." Therefore, the combination of people doing



service and learning at the same time teaches them how to be effective and, more importantly, how to be effective about what is important to them. It improves their overall experience and application opportunities they gain from it. By adding service to learning, and balancing the two, community service can become more than just the simple act of serving. By being a classroom, a hands-on learning experience, and an opportunity to change the community, people are able to not only serve, but impact themselves as well. It takes small steps to create big change and this is what service-learning hopes to achieve.

Positions within AiMHi

Residential Care Workers support people who have a developmental disability with daily living skill. They enhance the quality of life for people and ensure that their physical, medical, educational, recreational, social and cultural needs are met. They keep up to date and accurate records and reports. Provides a safe and clean environment.

Community Support Workers play an active role in developing and maintaining Person Centered Plans and provide support in the areas of life skills and community access to people who have a developmental disability. Assist, facilitate and evaluate people's needs and determine what services can be provided to enhance their quality of life and promote independence.

Family Support Workers liaise, advocate, and assist families in developing community support based on the strengths and needs of the family. Develops strategies for obtaining goals and provides support to families with an adult or child with a developmental disability in the home.

Employment Training Specialists plan and carry out personalized programs for people with developmental disabilities to assist them to obtain and maintain gainful employment.

Infant Development Consultants in collaboration with families, develop goals and implement plans for children 0 to 3 years old, with special needs and/or developmental delays or at risk for developmental delays, which facilitate the child's development. Support and play an active role in a Self-directed Team

Managers provide leadership in supporting people with developmental disabilities and their families, and are responsible for coordinating and monitoring service delivery to people supported by AiMHi.





Positions within AiMHi

Human Resource Assistants provide a variety of clerical assistance in an office in the areas of human resources, payroll and benefits; prepares reports and performs data entry; maintains benefits records; enters advanced bookings into electronic scheduling software and informs relief workers of short notice assignments.

Accounts Payable/ Receivable Clerk maintains current and accurate payable and receivable ledgers according to AiMHi procedures.

Payroll and Benefits Assistant performs payroll and benefit duties, general Human Resources and administrative support.

The program consists of three majors,

The courses within the Program offer learning opportunities from a variety of disciplines, such as Life Sciences, Social Sciences, and Behavioral Sciences, in order to enable students to develop an understanding relating to all dimensions of Health.

Employed Student Nurse Program

The purpose of the ESN program is to provide an opportunity for student nurses finishing their second or third year of a BScN or RPN program to develop into the role of a professional nurse through the following:

- Engaging in summer employment within NH patient care areas
- Developing interdisciplinary teamwork and communication skills
- Consolidating previously learned concepts/skills in the nursing program
- Taking advantage of opportunities to connect theory with practice

Criteria for Employment

- Registration in a recognized nursing education program
- Successful completion of 2 or more years of a BScN or RPN program
- Able to provide proof of successful completion of all courses and clinical placements in current year of nursing school
- Ability to gain Employed Student Registration with CRNBC once hired
- Able to provide proof of Certification in Basic Cardiac Life Support
