MINISTER’S MESSAGE

Dear Sangha Members, Friends and Supporters of Aiea Hongwanji and the Larger Community of Aiea,

As we are in the midst of the O-Bon Season, I would like to briefly share a message about Dana. Dana is one of the Six Paramitas, which, when each are perfectly accomplished, will enable a person to become enlightened or a Buddha. Dana is variously translated as “Selfless Giving”, “Pure Giving”, “Giving from the heart with sincerity” and so forth. One may wonder why the words “selfless” and “pure” are used. The emphasis is on giving with a pure heart or giving without strings attached. True giving in Buddhism is when after one has given or done something one does not think “I did a good deed” “How will I benefit?” “I am proud of myself.” “I did something for you so next time you do something for me.” Dana is performed from the sincerity and purity of one’s heart without expecting anything in return not even a thank you.



However, this does not mean that the receiver or others cannot express their gratitude to the giver or donor. Donations and contributions do not have to be anonymous to be Dana. You can remain anonymous if you prefer and so in that case, please let us know. The crucial part about Dana is, again, not that it must remain anonymous, but rather that there are no attachments by the donor or giver. For an act to be Dana there should be no attachment to the item being given, no attachment to giving as the giver and no attachment to whom it was given.

In the story of Mogallana and his Mother, we are told that it was due to Mogallana’s Dana or Pure Selfless Giving of providing food or meal to the entire Sangha of monks and nuns, that his Mother was liberated from the suffering of insatiable greed that she was experiencing. Performing or doing Dana has a purpose in Buddhism. As one of the Six Paramitas, the purpose of Dana is to rid the self of greed by becoming generous and benefiting others through that generosity.

However, upon honest self-reflection, it is not hard to realize that it is not that easy to perform Dana. Amida Buddha realized that for an ordinary foolish being, it is practically impossible to do pure Dana as whatever I do is muddled by selfish thoughts and my ego. Thus, in Jodo

Shinshu Buddhism, performing Dana is not a requirement or a religious practice that a person must perfect to become enlightened and instead we find ourselves entrusting ourselves, one hundred percent, to Amida Buddha who has already promised/vowed our liberation by simply asking us to Entrust (Shinjin) and Recite the Buddha's Name, Namo Amida Butsu (Nembutsu) in awareness.

Again, Amida Buddha, knowing beforehand of my predicament, embraces me just as I am, greed and all, and then eventually transforms this foolish I into an absolute positive with birth in the Pure Land of Enlightenment. Let me make clear though that this acceptance by Amida Buddha does not make greed okay or it does not justify greed. What it does express is the all-encompassing loving Compassion of Amitabha-Amitayus/Amida Buddha.

In Jodo Shinshu or Shin Buddhism, we usually use another word to explain the so-called good things we do and why we do them. That word in Japanese is Hosha or Responding in gratitude. This Responding in gratitude to Amida Buddha's Great Compassion is an essential characteristic of a Shin Buddhist's life. As Shin Buddhists, out of gratitude for the Unconditional Compassion of Amida Buddha which embraces us just as we are, we respond by first reciting the Nembutsu of Awareness and Gratitude and along with that we try to be respectful, helpful, kind, and do things which will benefit others. I take it one step further by saying that in Shin Buddhism, the traditional teachings like Dana and The Eightfold Path which are the core (religious) practices of General Buddhism become guidelines and ideals that we, as Jodo Shin Buddhists, can incorporate into our daily living, not as precepts and religious practices for Enlightenment, but as guidelines on how to live a Buddhist way of life. We, the Nembutsu Sangha, inspired, motivated and nurtured by Amida Buddha's Great Lights of Wisdom and Compassion, are motivated to try to live our life more in accord with the Dharma.

I would like to conclude by mentioning that there are 3 Kinds of Dana: the Dana of No Fear (the absence or removal of fear), the Dana of Sharing the Dharma by Dharma Teachers, and the Dana of giving material gifts (such as money or other types of donations like food and in kind services like volunteering at the temple) to Dharma Teachers and the Temple by the Lay, out of gratitude for the sharing of the Dharma. I cordially invite everyone to please join us at the temple especially on Sunday mornings at 9:00AM for our Sunday Morning Services to learn more about the Dharma (or the Teachings of the Buddha) and what it means to live a Dharma-centered life as a Buddhist and in particular as a Shin Buddhist. See you soon!

Last month was eventful for our organization as members participated in the 66th Jr. YBA State Convention hosted by the United Jr. YBA of Oahu! Every year, members assemble to make new connections, discuss parliamentary business, and practice the Dharma together.

This year's theme, "Sangha: Our Interdependent Environment," intertwined the concept of interdependence, which we can apply to our connection with the Earth and the micro-communities we are a part of.

Our workshops during our convention helped us explore this concept. We learned about Native Hawaiian practices from students of the Hale Hāola Kanaka Cultural Institute. They shared their experiences about revitalizing and caring for the land. We cared for the 'āina by volunteering at Ka Papa Lo'i O Kānewai at UH Manoa by removing weeds from the taro patches. HONORING OUR PAST~

We were saddened when we learned that one of our longtime members, Itsuo Harada, peacefully left to the Pure Land on May 9, 2023. Those of you who knew and associated with “Opat”, the nickname his friends bestowed upon him, may not have been aware of his life history outside of the Aiea Hongwanji setting. Following is a brief biography as shared by his family.



Itsuo Harada was born in the Lower Village, Ewa Plantation to Sagami and Kichibe Harada, farmers from Hiroshima who immigrated to Hawaii to work at the sugar plantations. Itsuo had a real zest for life and had a penchant to broaden his experiences. He bodysurfed, cycled, played football and baseball, played the guitar, raised carnations, and even took up tap dancing! He was drafted into the army during the Korean War, but was fortunate that the armistice was signed right before his deployment to Korea.

He married Frances Silva whom he met at his best friend’s wedding where he was the best man and she was the maid of honor. With marriage came greater responsibilities that led him to pursue a career beyond that of a plantation laborer. He attended technical school at night and worked part-time as a house painter, all while working full-time at the plantation. He persisted with this multiple job scenario for 16 or 17 years, and once he got out of technical school he was hired by Hawaiian Telephone as a technician and later promoted to a field supervisor. He also worked part-time with KHVH (now KITV) as a cameraman for the Jack McCoy show and later as a technician in the control room. Subsequently, he worked for KONA (now KHON) as a technician loading and syncing video tape reels of commercials between program segments.

Itsuo’s goal of becoming an engineer was fulfilled when Hawaiian Telephone promoted him to be a Project Engineer at their headquarters. He was one of two engineers in that department that did not have a college degree.

Itsuo’s other goal was to eventually start his own company. He fulfilled that goal when he retired from Hawaiian Telephone at age 62 and started Tech Services, Inc., a telecommunications consultation company.

Itsuo finally retired at age 75 and became more active at Aiea Hongwanji. He joined its board of directors and was instrumental in the creation of the Lotus Adult Day Care Center, which to this day serves to care for our aging kupuna. Itsuo also was involved with the continuous maintenance and cleaning of the premises and buildings. People would know of his presence when they saw his signature classic Cadillac parked in the lot.

We at Aiea Hongwanji express our deep gratitude and appreciation for all the contributions that Itsuo Harada made for the betterment of the temple and the community in general.


