

## MINISTER'S MESSAGE "Thank you" to Thanksgiving!

Reflecting upon this time of the year, it seems that November and December including the New Year, is a time when food plays an especially important role in festivities. At Thanksgiving, we have turkey, pumpkin pie, corn on the cob to name a few. Then, as Christmas approaches, we have family dinners and parties. One week later, it is New Years. Again, with food such as "Year-end buckwheat noodles" (toshikoshi soba) and "Japanese soup containing mochi rice cakes" (o-zoni) being an important part of the celebration.

With the Thanksgiving Holiday just around the corner, let me

share an interesting story entitled "Thank you, Thanksgiving" by David Milgrim published by Scholastic. It's a story about a little girl who as she goes on an errand, along the way, says "thank you" to almost everyone and everything. For example, she says thank you to the boots that keep her feet warm, she says thank you to the music she hears playing, she says thank you to the pretty clouds in the sky, she says thank you to rabbits and ducks she passes along the way and so forth and lastly, she thanks the Thanksgiving Holiday. She is expressing gratitude for the wonderful Thanksgiving Holiday that has brought her so much joy and happiness as she enjoys the warmth of family, the good food and all the things that have made the Thanksgiving Holiday possible including the Thanksgiving Holiday itself. And so, at the end of the story, she says "Thank you, Thanksgiving." Now, this may seem a bit strange, in that normally, we do not say thank you to a holiday or observance. However, when we deeply reflect what she is expressing is very appropriate. If it wasn't for the Thanksgiving Holiday, all that she enjoyed and treasured would not have happened and so as she says we should appreciate even the holiday itself which provides us with the opportunity to gather as family and friends to express our gratitude.

This story, then reminded me, of something that we emphasize in Buddhism as part of the "Four Gratitudes," and that would be Gratitude to other Sentient Beings. For it is due to other sentient beings that we are able to live our life and do the things we do in our life. As Buddhists, let us not forget to express gratitude or say "thank you" not only for the food, but also to the food. There is only one word that differs in these two expressions "Thank you for the food" versus "Thank you to the food", but the meaning of the expression changes drastically (because of it) and that is what I would like to emphasize with this message. We are used to hearing and using the expression "thank you for the food," but saying "thank you to the food" is not a common expression in English or America. This is a reflection of our attitude or perspective about food.

In the Buddhist Tradition, gratitude is expressed both to the food and for the food. The two traditional Japanese expressions which beautifully express this, are the Japanese Words of Thanksgiving Before and After Meals which at its simplest is saying the words "Itadakimasu" before a meal and "Gochisosama Deshita" after a meal. At the end of a meal, we say "Gochisosama Deshita." This expression, based upon the Chinese characters that are used to write it, has the meaning of "running horse". Thus, the image that

used to write it, has the meaning of "running horse". Thus, the image that comes to my mind is of our host or cook busily running around shopping gathering all the ingredients by horse with a carriage or cart to prepare the meal which you have just enjoyed and thus the saying of, "Gochisosama Deshita" acknowledges the generosity, the effort extended by our host or cook. It expresses

appreciation for the food one has just eaten especially acknowledging, thanking the host or cook. On the other hand, to me, the expression "Itadakimasu" expresses appreciation to the food. The expression "Itadakimasu" can be translated as "I humbly and gratefully (even reverently) partake of this food" expressing gratitude to the food itself. It expresses my gratitude to the food with my expressing my humbleness in receiving this food. I lower myself below the food before partaking of it to express my humility and gratitude.

It, also, expresses my awareness or understanding that this food that I am about to eat is not a given. It is something very rare and very precious. It is another life. Other life is supporting my life. It is my acknowledging that because of the sacrifices of others, in this case, the plants and animals including the elements of nature, my life and my living is made possible. It is "arigatai" so precious and rare. Further, the attitude of "mottainai" which commonly manifest itself as feeling that one is "undeserving of this food" and being sure "not to waste."

Some people have mentioned that after hearing a message such as this, they feel guilty about eating. Please be assured that the intent of the message is not to make us feel guilty about eating. It aims at trying to bring about a certain awareness, an understanding, a realization, as to the preciousness of all life including the food we eat and just how grateful we ought to be.

To conclude, this is how the Buddhist teachings can help us to live better and more meaningful lives. So this Holiday Season, as we enjoy the Season and all that it offers us, I hope that it will be not only a happy and safe Holiday Season, but with a little bit of reflection guided by the Dharma, it will also be a very meaningful Season, one we can celebrate both in joy, reverence and gratitude. Please have a good, safe and meaningful Holiday Season! Namo Amida Butsu.

To Our Sangha,

On September 29th Aiea Buddhist Temple held its inaugural "Young Peoples Gathering" in the Lotus multi-purpose room. This event was led by Reverend Eric Matsumoto and Emi Hashi. The subsequent gathering was held on October 27th. The next gathering will be held on November 17th at 5:30pm at the same location. Its purpose is to provide a convenient venue for the younger generation to gather informally to reflect on the Dharma and for fellowship with others of their age group. It is open to anyone between the ages of 18 to about 40 who share the Hongwanji values of harmony, mutual respect, etc.



On Sunday, November 19th we will have a special guest speaker, Reverend Sol Kalu, for our Sangha Perpetual Memorial Service (Eitaikyo).

On December 3rd, we will be livestreaming the Hawaii Buddhist Council Bodhi Day Service in the Aiea Buddhist Temple for those who prefer not to attend it in person. Also in December, the Temple Beautification Day has been revised to Sunday the 17th instead of the 10th which is now scheduled for the Bodhi Day Family Service followed by our welcome luncheon for Reverend Eric Matsumoto and his wife, Tamayo. Please call in or email your RSVP for this luncheon and place your box lunch order by December 4th (See page 9 for details). Our traditional Mochitsuki (mochi-pounding & making) event is scheduled for Saturday, December 30th, from 8:00 am to 11:00 am. Volunteers are requested to show up as early as 3:00 am to help with rinsing the rice and cooking it. Help is also needed on Friday evening to wash and soak the rice among other preparatory activities. The following day, our New Year's Eve Service will be at 3:00 pm.

Notable events in January 2024 include our New Year's Day service at 10:00 am, Hoonko Memorial Service for Shinran Shonin on the 14th, and the New Year's party and annual membership meeting on the 27th which will also serve to honor our Keirokai members.

Work on our social hall foundation strengthening is wrapping up and repairs to the cracked walls will be underway in November. The social hall and adjacent kitchen vinyl composition tile flooring will then be removed and replaced with new VCT. Other upcoming maintenance projects for the first quarter of 2024 include the tent fumigation of the temple, Lotus, and minister's residence, replacing the carpet in the Lotus exterior lanai area, and replacing the interior and exterior carpet of the temple.

As a reminder, if you have not done so already, please pay your membership dues for 2023. The 2024 dues will become due in January 2024. See page 9 for dues amounts.

As the tax season approaches, many of you who are faced with taking Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) from your retirement accounts could avoid paying taxes on the amounts donated to qualified non-profit organizations, such as Aiea Hongwanji Mission, directly from your retirement account. ### **MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP**

#### "Authentic Individuality"

Today, we witness many sad news of hate, violence, and discrimination. A human criticizes, discriminates, hates, and hurts other human beings. It is truly a tragic thing. We are all different in our appearances, socioeconomic status, race, language, lifestyle, etc. Even family members who live in the same household have different thoughts and viewpoints. But we are all unique and beautiful. We all shine beautifully.

We seem like surfers who try to ride on a massive range of waves: waves of our life's challenges. Some waves are small, and others are too large for a single person to overcome. Sometimes, we succeed in riding on the waves; sometimes, we are overwhelmed and fail to ride on it. It would be wonderful if we could work together. It would be wonderful if we could freely extend our compassionate hands to those needing help. But it seems like we are all too busy in the pursuit of our own happiness. We are all too busy catching the waves right before us. In the ocean of our lives, we often fail to understand and care for the people around us. Perhaps we are too focused on catching the waves we want and feel that the people around us should not belong in the ocean we enjoy. Driven by such narrow viewpoints, we have no moment of peace. Such viewpoints are the primal cause of hatred and discrimination.

Professor Kenneth Tanaka talked about "authentic individuality." Buddhism is the teaching to cultivate this authentic individuality. Authentic individuality means that each of us is unique, each of us can contribute to others, and each of us is precious and has dignity. "Oneness" that we talk about in Buddhism does not mean being the same. Say you are an apple; Oneness does not mean that you and others must be pineapple. Oneness means that an apple can exist as a pineapple. Apple has its dignity and place, and pineapple has its dignity and place. The Buddhist teaching of oneness teaches us that we are all, no matter who we are, illuminated and embraced by the Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion just as we are. In that awareness, we become aware of our self-centeredness and limitations and, at the same time, endeavor to cultivate peace and harmony, compassion for self and others, and live with confidence, conviction, and dignity. I understand this as the meaning of "authentic individuality."

A narrow viewpoint, characterized by limited personal experiences and a strong selfish attachment to oneself, can have far-reaching consequences that lead to hatred and discrimination. Buddhism teaches us the dignity of all lives and that all lives must be affirmed, respected, and appreciated.



### **BOWING IN GRATITUDE**

Members at Lahaina Hongwanji Mission were prepping that week for the upcoming Obon Festival on August 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>. It is ironic and poignant that we fretted a little about possible rain from Hurricane Dora. Then, on Tuesday the 8<sup>th</sup> the winds came . . . and the rest of the story is embedded in us forever, through personal experience, sharing of tales, and from the media. The fires in our beloved Lahaina town displaced about half of our 80 members. They are scattered over parts of Maui, the islands of Hawaii as well as the Mainland. We lost our Temple, Social Hall, Office, Minister's Residence and School Building. Weeks later we learned that one member, Matsu Osato, perished.

Even as we visibly or stoically weep over losses in lives, property, livelihood – one powerfully encouraging force is the overwhelming scope and depth of support we have received. This support has come from the innermost circles of family and ohana, friends, neighbors, from Lahaina Hongwanji members and relations. The support widened to the sangha of Maui Hongwanji temples, Honpa Hongwanji and statewide temples . . . and finally from the larger communities and agencies, local to world-wide.

We bow in gratitude to the following:

• Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani, Honpa Hongwanji Headquarters staff, Social Concerns Committee and Maui Wildfire Emergency Response Adhoc Committee for setting up the Maui Wildfire Disaster Relief Fund. • Kahului, Wailuku, Lanai and Makawao Hongwanji Temples for offering familiar and comfortable places for Lahaina members to gather, and for invitations to attend their services, as well as donations of gift cards. • Rev. Kerry Kiyohara and Rev. Shinkai Murakami, who offered their presence at weekly gatherings on Tuesdays and Thursdays at Wailuku and Kahului Hongwanji Temples.

It is a scene with a still relatively green lawn, which was so diligently watered and cared for by our member. On the lawn stands the red yagura ... dutifully repainted late summer for Obon. And the columbarium/nokotsudo still stands upright and seemingly intact. At roadside is the temple 'kiosk',

and visible inside the glass protection is the name, LAHAINA HONGWANJI, as well as a poster advertising OBON on August 11 & 12, 2023.

We are still awaiting the day we will be allowed back at Lahaina Hongwanji Mission to assess what our future will be. 

# **Qualified Charitable Distributions**

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is a distribution made directly by the trustee of your individual retirement arrangement (IRA), other than an SEP or SIMPLE IRA, to certain qualified organizations. You must have been at least age 70<sup>1/2</sup> when the distribution was made. Your total QCDs for the year can't be more than \$100,000. If all the requirements are met, a QCD may be nontaxable, however if the QCD is nontaxable, you may not be able to claim it as a charitable contribution deduction. You may be able to claim a charitable contribution deduction if you claim the income you are deducting as a qualified contribution. See IRS Pub. 590-B, Distributions from Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs), for more information about QCDs, and consult with your tax advisor to address your individual financial situation.


