


MINISTER'S MESSAGE

The Peony and The Lion

When I visited East Asia, I noticed an interesting and unusual pairing in which peonies and lions are often depicted together in paintings for homes or carvings at temples. A ferocious lion and a blooming flower may seem like an odd combination, but together they provide an insightful message. The lion is the King of Beasts and as such all other ani-

mals tremble before it and very few will dare challenge it. However, there is a

even the mighty lion—a tiny parasite inside the lion.

tiny enemy that can bring down





The knowledge that our own worst enemy may not be an external enemy is helpful. We have a tendency to look outside of ourselves for that which might harm us. However, there are internal negatives, such as arrogance, self-centeredness, hatred, greed, selfishness, ignorance, and the like, which can cause us to hurt ourselves and others. The lion instinctively cures itself by finding a bed of peonies and allows the peonies to function as a medicinal herb. The lion freed of the parasite ceases to suffer. It finds relief and peace among the peonies.

The depiction of the lion and peony encourages us to look inward at our own hearts-and-minds and become aware of ourselves. It points to the importance of self-reflection and awareness in daily life.

If you take a close look at altars at Hongwanji temples, you will also find carvings of peacocks. The peacock is the animal most associated with Amida Buddha. The depiction of the peacock symbolically represents the dynamic working of Amida Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion which is able to transform poisons, such as ignorance, desire and hatred and lead one to enlightenment with our birth in Amida Buddha's Pure Land of Enlightenment.



PBA REFLECTS ON THEIR 18TH ANNUAL TAIKO FESTIVAL

Pacific Buddhist Academy held its 18th Annual Taiko Festival on Sunday, March 17th at the Moanalua Performing Arts Center. The theme for this year's festival was "Yaramaika," which translates to 'go for it!' The school's Hyaku Sen Ki Kai performance taiko group, led by Jay Toyofuku, comprises eight players. Among them are three seniors: twins Leilani and Jenny Chang (whose older sister Fern Chang graduated from PBA's performance taiko group in 2022), and Mari Miyasato, who recently returned from a six-week study abroad program at Heian High School in Kyoto, Japan.

This year, PBA alumni returned to perform in a number of pieces on multiple instruments including Zachary Agcaoili '14 and Tani Oshita '23 on taiko drums, Reverend Blayne Nakasone Sakata '14 on the Odaiko and sanshin, and Chihiro Okawa '23 on the Shime, Odaiko, and Shinobue. Agcaoili Sensei is one of PBA's taiko sensei and Rev. Nakasone Sakata is PBA's school chaplain. All proceeds from the Taiko Festival support PBA's mission to prepare students for college through academic excellence, enrich their lives with Buddhist values, and develop their courage to nurture peace. MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP

Within the HHMH Community, March 2 is widely recognized and celebrated as Hongwanji Day. The history of Hongwanji Temples in Hawaii began when Rev. Soryu Kagahi arrived in Honolulu on March 2, 1889, and established the foundation of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism in Hawaii. This year marks the 135th Anniversary.

Many documents record the living conditions of the early Japanese immigrants in Hawaii. One worker at a plantation in Puunene on Maui said, "In those days, many Japanese people died by disease, and I was asked to bury them in the cemetery after my work. At that time, there were no temples and no ministers. So, I chanted the Shoshinge I had heard as a child." For the people of the time when there were no temples and no ministers, I believe that the Shoshinge chanted by this lay person must have quietly but surely reverberated through the lands of Hawaii and given peace of mind and courage to the people who left Japan and were



living in Hawaii.

At that time, it seemed that there was not yet a strong momentum for overseas propagation at Honzan. Still, when Rev. Kagahi learned about the harsh working and living conditions of Japanese immigrants in Hawaii, he was determined to cross the ocean on his initiative to spread the Light of the Buddha-Dharma.

"Kagahi was deeply touched by the difficulties of these immigrants living in a strange country, knowing neither Hawaiian nor English, lacking the support of a sangha, the sustenance of the dharma. It saddened him to think no priest was there to perform the reassuring Buddhist rituals that provide a spiritual rhythm to the natural flow of life and death. As he reflected on all this Soryu Kagahi made a personal commitment. He must propagate Jodo Shinshu in Hawaii!" (From "A Grateful Past, A Promising Future")

There is no shortage of history when it comes to the Japanese immigrants and Jodo Shinshu in Hawaii. Through the untiring dedication of the successive ministers and lay followers, the Hongwanji temples steadily took root in Hawaii as 'abodes of Light and Love' (described by Bishop Imamura). Those who set foot in the abode of light and love entrusted themselves to the Light of Wisdom and Compassion of Amida Buddha that illuminates all beings equally as if they were his only child, and lived their lives to the fullest in the face of adversity while reciting the Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu.

Now, 135 years later, times and living conditions have changed dramatically. However, the Light of Amida Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion does not change. It always illuminates our hearts and minds, which are clouded by our own egos, and enables us to live a bright life that is embraced by the Light.

The Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii will observe the Triple Celebration on September 7 and 8 at the Ala Moana Hotel. I would like to invite everyone to join us in this commemorative event filled with the joy of Nembutsu. In deepest gratitude and appreciation to our Nembutsu predecessors whose names we cannot all mention but dedicated their lives to the growth and expansion of the HHMH and its temples and affiliated organizations, and with a grateful response to Amida Buddha's tireless calling, I recite Namo Amida Butsu.

NURTURING MIND AND BODY AT BUDDHIST STUDY CENTER SPRING FESTIVAL

On April 6, 2024, the Buddhist Study Center will host our first ever Spring Festival grand re-opening of the BSC to the larger Manoa/Moiliili/McCully/Makiki community. The purpose of this event is to showcase the Hongwanji and BSC offerings to the community and increase awareness of the facility to encourage participation and use. Everyone – students, faculty, community members, and families – is welcome.

The event will kick off at 9:30 a.m. with live entertainment performances in the downstairs Buddhist Study Center parking lot. There will be booths with food, games, and activities hosted by various Hongwanji-affiliated groups. Notable activities include a travelling bookstore by Honpa Hongwanji, Matcha with a Minister talk story teatime with Rev. Bert Sumikawa and Rev. Blayne Nakasone Sakata, flower arranging with Irene Nakamoto, and children's activities by Debbie Kubota and Susan Oshiro. Emi Hashi, the Youth Specialist for Honpa Hongwanji, will also lead a Buddha in Your Pocket mini butsudan craft for students and community members to take home and set up a reflection space of their own. We hope to encourage new members to join the Buddhist Study Center Fellowship Club.

Health and wellness workshops will be held upstairs in the BSC lecture hall. We will start with a workshop on coping skills at 10:00 a.m. by Rev. David Nakamoto. At 11:00 a.m., Lisa Yanagi, who also holds weekly classes at the BSC, will lead a yoga class for interested attendees. At 12:00 p.m., a demonstration on healthful cooking will be taught by Carolyn Uchiyama and Wahiawa Blue Zones. Finally, a bokashi healthy living workshop with Chikako Nago will be held at 1:00 p.m. to promote the sustainable practice of
