

MINISTER'S MESSAGE Are you a contributor to World Peace?

Yes, you can and it's simple! On Friday, September 20, 2024, we will be observing our 5th Annual Ring your Bell for Peace Day. Please participate by registering using the link found elsewhere in this Newsletter. Your participation will show that world peace is important, desired and we can all somehow contribute.

As we move forward, I would like to add let us not forget to address not only the outward conditions which bring forth

suffering including war, but just as importantly, if not more importantly, the inward internal cause or causes of suffering including war. In our attempt to address suffering and realize peace, we must focus on both the outward conditions and internal root causes of suffering. This is what the Buddha-Dharma shares with us. It is not only external factors that result in war and violence that need to be addressed, but we must also each reflect on our own hearts-and-minds which is all too often affected by our anger, greed and ignorance which results in arguments, battles and war. To me, we need a compass and a new perspective to guide and inspire us one which from the very start is all-inclusive and all-embracing.

Please allow me to share about the Hiroshima Peace Bell. The bell, significantly, has a map of the world without boundaries engraved on it. Further, two significant sayings inscribed on the bell are "Know thyself" by Socrates and a Pure Land Buddhist verse from the Larger Sukhavativyuha Sutra referring to Amida Buddha's promise "Emitting a great light with my majestic power, I will completely illuminate the boundless worlds; Dispelling, thereby, the darkness of the three defilements, I will deliver all beings from suffering and affliction." It speaks of a Great Light of Wisdom and Compassion which illumines and nurtures us to understand the preciousness and equality of all life and promises that one and all will attain perfect peace and happiness. The sound of the Hiroshima Peace Bell encourages us to wisely know our true self, both our strengths and weaknesses, and to be inspired by a great Compassion which excludes none and includes all within its embrace. Our rescue is this Great Wisdom and Compassion which includes everyone and everything in its embrace and tempers our negativity with awareness and where in gratitude of that Great Compassion and deep lament of my limited self, we respond to it by embracing the aspiration for peace and harmony in the world for both self and others.

However, how do we awaken? There is a particular bell known as the bonsho (in Japanese) of which the Hiroshima Peace Bell is. According to Tradition, this type of bell originated in India and in China, Korea and Japan, its sound is regarded as the Enlightened Voice of the Buddha calling out to us to awaken. Traditionally, on New Year's Eve at Buddhist Temples, the bonsho bell is rung 108 times to awaken us from spiritual slumber so we can start the New Year fresh. The deep reverberating sound of a large bonsho. bell permeates to the deepest recesses of a person's heart. As its resonating sound passes through every cell of our bodies to reach the very core of our heart. There, it stirs the heart to become more open and receptive, sensitive and aware.

In our case for Peace Day, the bonsho bell rings the message for world peace and an important part of the message is that while we address the outward physical conditions such as nuclear weapons and the clash of different ideologies and sometimes even religious institutions which can lead to violence including war, let us each not forget to also look inward into our own hearts and minds for those negative thoughts, feelings and emotions of hate, greed, arrogance, and fear based on our self-centered ego which are, many times, the cause of our unwholesome actions and behaviors.

As we feel the sound of the bonsho bell and other bells on "Ring your Bell for Peace Day," may they touch our hearts, minds and bodies awakening us to the Enlightened Call of Great Wisdom which asks us to acknowledge the importance of mutual respect and appreciation and Boundless Compassion which aspires for the peace and happiness of all life and, even if ever so slightly, inspires us to move towards harmonious non-violent co-existence and the peace and well-being of all peoples of the world or in the spirit of, as we say in Hawaii, "kakou" or all!

May we all, Buddhists and non-Buddhist alike, be guided and nurtured by All-Inclusive Wisdom and All-Embracing Compassion so that as the Larger Pure Land sutra further states, "The land is prosperous and people live in peace, so there is no need to use soldiers and weapons. People respect virtue, cultivate benevolence, and diligently observe propriety and humility."

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP

35th Annual Hiroshima Peace Service Ceremony Commemorating the 79th Anniversary of the Bombing of Hiroshima

Tuesday, August 6, 2024

Buddhist Message of Peace Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani, Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii

Today, we gather here in solemn remembrance of one of the darkest chapters in human history – the devastating bombing of Hiroshima in 1945. The city of Hiroshima, a city once vibrant with life, became the epicenter of unimaginable suffering, sorrow, and loss. On this day, we pause for a moment to honor the memory of those who lost their lives and to show our commitment to stand in solidarity with those whose lives were affected by the consequences of war.



Prince Shotoku, the Imperial Regent in Japan during the early 7th century, is widely regarded as the founding figure of Buddhism in Japan. He wrote the following in the Seventeen-Article Constitution.

"For all men have hearts, and each heart has its own leanings. Their right is our wrong, and our right is their wrong. We are not unquestionably sages, nor are they unquestionably fools. Both of us are simply ordinary beings (*Bonbu*). ... For we are all, one with another, wise and foolish, like a ring with no end."

It is a stern admonishment to us all. It is easy to criticize or judge others, to see the flaws in others while remaining blind to our own. "Bonbu," a term that refers to ordinary beings, signifies our inherent limitations – our ego-centeredness, our propensity for judgment, and our inability to see beyond our own perspective. Prince Shotoku's words caution us against the arrogance of assuming we hold the ultimate truth, as this very mindset is what leads to division, conflict, and, ultimately, the horrors of war.

Yet, even as we acknowledge our own bonbu-nature, we find hope in the teaching of Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism. Shinran Shonin taught us that such a "bonbu" like ourselves is the primal target of Amida Buddha, the Buddha of all-inclusive Wisdom and Compassion. The Light of Wisdom and Compassion shines upon us, illuminating the path from our ego-centered existence to a life of oneness and understanding. It is through this Light that we can transform our minds clouded by greed, anger, and ignorance into hearts of generosity, compassion, and wisdom.

As beneficiaries of this all-inclusive Wisdom and Compassion, I believe each of us bears a responsibility. With hearts of self-reflection, we must cultivate an environment where wisdom and compassion toward one another flourish, transcending boundaries of nationality, race, religion, and all others that separate us. The journey from hatred to understanding, from conflict to peace, begins within each of us.

In one of the Buddhist scriptures called "Sanbutsuge" from the Sutra of the Buddha of Immeasurable Life, a statement goes as follows: "The great voice of the Perfectly Enlightened One resounds throughout the ten quarters." It teaches us that there is no place where the voice of Truth does not reach. As we hit the Hiroshima Peace Bell today in commemorating the 79th Anniversary of the Bombing of Hiroshima, may we all listen to this voice of truth, the voice of Wisdom and Compassion, and rededicate ourselves to the pursuit of peace, reconciliation, and the creation of a society where every individual can live in peace, joy, and gratitude.

With humble reflection, I recite the name of the Buddha. Namo Amida Butsu.

2024 YBICSE REPORT

Thanks to support from the Honzan and the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii Headquarters, six fellow young Buddhists from Hawaii and I had wonderful experiences through the 2024 YBICSE (Young Buddhist International Cultural Study Exchange) program in Japan this summer from July 2 to 12, 2024. This year there were 19 participants and four chaperons from the districts of the Buddhist Churches of America, Hawaii, Canada, and South America.


We stayed at the Hongwanji Monbou Kaikan and participated in morning services at 6 a.m., followed by the Confirmation Ceremony at the Hongwanji. Former Monshu Koshin Ohtani (Zenmon sama) officiated the Confirmation Ceremony on July 5. Ty Wakahiro from Mililani Hongwanji Mission participated in the ceremony and received his Buddhist name.


We went to Hongwanji-related sites, Mt. Hiei and Otani Hombyo Mausoleum, to learn the history of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism. At Hiroshima Betsuin we attended the Memorial for All Those Who Perished in War and we heard Hiroshima atomic bomb survivor Mr. Mikio Saiki share his memories and hopes for the future. During the discussion with Mr. Saiki, he told us that he would visit the Pearl Harbor National Memorial in August.

My son, Yuma, and I welcomed him when he came to the Pearl Harbor National Memorial and the University of Hawaii at Manoa to talk about his experience. We were able to hear his testimony again here in Hawaii on August 18. Mr. Saiki said, "We should learn from the past, to share new ideas of the future." Through the activities at the Honzan as well as by visiting Enryaku-ji Temple on Mt. Hiei, Hiroshima Betsuin, and Tsu-kiji Hongwanji, we deepened our appreciation of the teachings of Shinran Shonin and learned about the anti-nuclear and peace movements.

I believe that all participants including me can make use of this YBICSE experience in our Nembutsu lives, and we shall endeavor to keep ringing the bell for peace.

Why September 29th?

The memorial service is held annually on the Sunday September 29 — the day in 1943 that Sgt. Shigeo "Joe" Takata of the 100th Infantry Battalion became the first Japanese American soldier killed in action in World War II. Sgt. Shigeo "Joe" Takata was hit by shrapnel and fought death long enough to point out the location of the enemy, action for which he was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross. Sgt. Takata rests in eternal peace at Punchbowl.

In 2007, Frank and Helen Takenouchi introduced Project Dana to Aiea Hongwanji. Over many years, they supported seniors in our community. They kept them company when their caregivers needed to run errands. They checked in on seniors living alone. Transportation to appointments and shopping assistance was provided. Then COVID changed the way we interacted with one another. We are much more considerate about not spreading our illnesses, no matter how minor. And we are less likely to interact with people we are not close with for the services they provided with their original Project Dana group. Yet, as the years passed, Helen and Frank cultivated a culture of unspoken Dana among the BWA and Senior YBA Hosha crew. They will say it wasn't just them, and that is true.

No one thinks about what they are doing as Dana works. It is just the right thing to do. "Hey, you want me to pick you up on Sunday?" "Where have you been? Long time no see. We miss you." "You not feeling well? I'm going to drop off some soup for you. I made extra." "Can I stop by and visit you?" Conversations like this are commonplace at Aiea Hongwanji.

The former Executive Director of Project Dana encouraged us to renew our energies and focus on our AHM community. It is starting slowly by acknowledging the AHM culture of helping each other and our aging members. Every little act is acknowledged. It surprised us when we started to list the services they were providing. At AHM, no service is too small, and participation continues to grow. The official volunteer list is growing, and they often report on the services they want to provide. Our Lotus Adult Day Care Center has received a few services and donations from our volunteers. Not all of our services can be called official Project Dana services. We do it anyway; it's just the AHM Way.


