

MINISTER'S MESSAGE Do you see it? Do you appreciate it?

When you drive into the Temple parking lot, you cannot miss the brightly colored yellow lantana profusely blooming along the length of the wall. It

is probably the first thing that captures your attention. How-

ever, in one corner of the lawn, there is a lone lily plant also growing and flowering. Have you seen it? I always pass by it and my eyes rest on it for a moment. As I do this, it reminds me of a message by Reverend Ya-

He shared that as we live our life as

Buddhists I hope that we do not see people and things in our world only for their utility value. In other words, that we do not value people and things only from the standpoint of how we can benefit from them. In America or the West, nature is, too often, considered something to be used for our benefit. That is, we no longer look at things with an attitude that the thing itself is sufficient reason for it to exist. For example, a river is no longer seen as having value as flowing water. It is looked at for how many kilowatts of power can be generated if a power plant is built across it. The value of trees is calculated not for their beauty, but according to how much lumber it can produce. Similarly, people are no longer valued as individuals, but for the work they can do and so on. Some would say "How mottainai" which is often translated as "What a waste." However, the original meaning of the word "mottainai" implies that if you consider something only from the point of view of how we can use it and we disregard the essence of it that is "mottainai."

There is a story about Rennyo Shonin, the 8th Spiritual Leader of the Hongwanji. He once found a piece of paper that was carelessly left in the hallway. He said, "This belongs to the Buddha" and he placed his hands together in gassho (a gesture of reverence and respect in the Buddhist Tradition) and bowed to the paper. When we consider everything as "belonging to the Buddha" we accept water as water, a scrap of paper as paper and acknowledge its value for itself not according to how much we can profit or benefit from it. The Buddhist attitude is that everything in the world has its own reason for existing and has its own unique value. This is one way the expression "those of blue color emit blue radiance; those of yellow color emit yellow radiance; those of red color emit red radiance and those of white color emit white radiance. They are exquisite, wonderful, fragrant and pure." in the Minister's Message continued on page 2

Smaller Sukhavativyuha Sutra about the various colored lotuses in the Pure Land can be interpreted. When we consider the value of things by how useful they are to us as the most important characteristic of it we miss the true beauty of it. Buddhism tries to awaken us to the beauty of and the essence of all things including people around us.

Rev. Kubose shared that the Buddhist religion is about awareness. In our lives, unless we are aware life will not be meaningful. He shares about Basho, a famous Japanese poet who authored a 17-syllable poem

about a flower called a nazuna. (See photo of Sheperd's Purse or the Nazuna from Wikipedia.) The nazuna is a small insignificant flower, but Basho wrote a poem about it. He wrote "Look carefully. The nazuna blooms along the fence-ah!" We might wonder, why did he choose to write a poem about such a flower. Well, he learned something from this flower that everyone just seemed to ignore. All around us are many wonderful and beautiful things, but unless we are aware (of them) so



much will be missing from our life. It is supposed that Basho walked many times along the fence he mentions in the haiku poem, but this one day, it was different because he truly noticed for the first time the nazuna blooming along the fence. In the bright morning sunlight, it was blooming with every petal, every leaf. How beautiful, how noble, he must have thought. Hardly anyone looks at it; no one praises it and yet there it is blooming with all its might. How about me? How are we living our lives? The Teachings of the Buddha are everywhere-all around us-if only we open our mind's eye. The beauty of the Buddha's Teaching is that it is found not only in the temple or in a sutra, but actually all around us. Just as Basho learned a great deal from the tiny nazuna blooming along the fence.

Awareness is what makes life meaningful. Our life may not be perfect, we have our problems and challenges, but without awareness it will be just another day. To learn Buddha-Dharma is to become aware of life itself. To learn Buddhism is to transform one's life living with a new perspective.

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP


*Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani delivered the following message at the Hawaii Kyodan Board of Directors Meeting on September 14, 2024.

"ACHIEVING THE GOAL TOGETHER"

"The mission of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii is to share the living teachings of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism so that all beings may enjoy lives of harmony, peace, and gratitude."

The teachings of the Nembutsu hold a profound power—the power to transform our ordinary existence into something extraordinary. Jodo Shinshu reminds us that within the allencompassing Wisdom and Compassion of Amida Buddha, every life—yours, mine, and all others—is equally valued, affirmed, and cherished.

In these challenging times, the message of Jodo Shinshu is more important than ever. It offers us a path to a more harmonious and compassionate society. But our mission cannot be achieved in isolation—it requires the collective effort of all of us. Together, we have the power to create a positive impact on individuals and the world.





Additionally, there are others—whom I call 'affiliates'—who may not be formal members but who support the temple during key events, like bon dances. While we don't have official numbers, I estimate there are about 12,000 affiliates.

Our current propagation efforts largely focus on these groups—members and affiliates. However, our reach can go much further. A recent survey shows that many people have a personal interest in Buddhism, even though they are not connected to any specific organization. Roughly 5% of Hawaii's population identifies as Buddhist, which is about 70,000 people.

But beyond this, we have an even greater opportunity. Approximately 67% of Hawaii's adult population—around 700,000 people—express an interest in spirituality, even though they don't identify as Buddhist.

I believe now is the time for us to broaden our horizon and reach out beyond our immediate temple communities. The message of Jodo Shinshu has the potential to resonate with many more people.

As Bishop and as the BSC Interim Director, I have shared these statistics with the BSC Committee, the Commission on Buddhist Education, and the Ministerial Training Committee. I've stressed that, for the future survival and growth of Hawaii Kyodan, we need to engage the broader community. I deeply appreciate those committee members who have already begun to review their programs and activities with this broader market in mind.

But the responsibility of propagation does not rest solely on our ministers or certain committees. It must be a team effort, a collective responsibility. Each one of us—whether a minister, temple president, member, or board member—has a crucial role to play in spreading the Nembutsu teaching.

Let me share an analogy: think of a café, such as Starbucks. The mission of Starbucks is to inspire and nurture the human spirit—one person, one cup, and one neighborhood at a time. People go to Starbucks not just for the coffee but for the entire experience. The coffee may be excellent, but what keeps people coming back is the warm, welcoming atmosphere—the sense of belonging they feel as soon as they step through the door.

A successful café offers more than just a product. It provides a space where people can relax, connect, and enjoy a pleasant environment. And it's not only the baristas who are responsible for this. Many workers,

departments, HQ, and the entire organization work together to create this positive customer experience.

In the same way, our temples should function. The Buddha's teachings are like the coffee in a café—they are at the heart of what we offer. Ministers, like baristas, are at the forefront, sharing the Dharma. But just as a café requires more than its baristas to create a welcoming environment, our temples require more than just the ministers. It takes all of us, working together, to create a space where people can feel at home, build connections, and leave the temple feeling spiritually fulfilled.

We all carry the "brand" of our mission on our shoulders. As ministers, members, and leaders of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, every interaction—whether inside the temple or in the broader community—reflects our values and the Buddha's teachings. Each of us helps shape the identity of our organization. Together, we create a lasting impact on those who come into contact with us.

As our Kyodan faces declining membership and a shrinking pool of leadership, working together becomes even more critical. By uniting our efforts, we can achieve far more than any one of us can achieve alone.

So, I ask you: How can you, as an individual, a temple, or a committee, contribute to this collaborative effort to share the Nembutsu? I deeply appreciate your tireless dedication to this mission. But I invite you to reflect on this question—either on your own, with your temple members, or with your committee members.

Remember, we are all carrying the "brand" of Hongwanji. Every effort, no matter how small, contributes to the greater mission. And these efforts must be recognized, shared, and communicated effectively.

Let us recommit ourselves to the mission, to one another, and to those who are waiting to hear the timeless message of Shinran Shonin. Together, we will continue to spread the joy of living in the Nembutsu.

IMPORTANT SECURITY NOTICE: BEWARE OF RECENT PHISHING EMAILS

We want to alert our community about recent phishing attempts targeting our temples and members. Fraudulent emails have been sent that appear to come from our ministers, but in reality, they originate from unknown email addresses, such as rev.reverend@keemail.me. These emails typically request gift cards or money, and may instruct recipients not to call the minister and to respond only via email, claiming the matter is urgent and confidential—such as surprising temple members with a gift. These emails are not from our ministers. Scammers likely created fake email addresses using our reverends' names to exploit their public role and the trust of our community. Please be aware:

- 1) Our ministers will never ask for gift cards or money via email.
- 2) If you receive such an email, do not respond or click on any links, as this may compromise your security.
- 3) On our website at https://hongwanjihawaii.com/temples/, you can look up email addresses for temples & ministers.
- 4) If in doubt, call the minister or temple office directly to verify the email's authenticity.
- By staying vigilant and reporting suspicious emails, we can protect our community and help to combat cybercrime.


