


### MINISTER'S MESSAGE

### A Lasting Gift for Someone You Love This Holiday Season!



I am sure many of you are already pondering "What shall I get for (name) this year as a holiday gift?" As we approach the Holiday Season starting with Thanksgiving to New Year's which abounds with gift giving and sharing our life with each other, please allow me to share the thought of sharing a gift especially with our young. A gift that will last their entire lifetime and even beyond.

Robert Thurman, renown American Buddhist, attributes Sakyamuni Buddha to saying,

"...every intelligent being could understand the truth, that such under standing would lead to direct experience of reality, and that such ex perience would result in freedom, happiness and transformation. The greatest gift one could give others thus was teaching; it could help others come to understanding, freedom and happiness." (omit) "to en counter reality and be transformed by the encounter, one had to un derstand it, not just believe it. ...To understand something requires a process of inquiry, examination, and experimentation-in fact, a process of education... To make such a process available to his contem poraries and to posterity, the Buddha had to find a new educational institution, a school for people to learn about the Dharma and a community of people to live the Dharma. He called this new community the Sangha." (From "Wisdom and Compassion, The Sacred Art of Ti bet" by Marilyn Rhie and Robert Thurman.)

### As Shinran Shonin said,

"I have collected true words to aid others...in order that the process be made continuous, without end and without interruption, by which those who have been born first guide those who come later, and those who are born later join those who were born before." (From The Col lected Works of Shinran, Volume I, page 291.)

The gift I have in mind is the Dharma or Teachings of the Buddha, or as I share with the Preschool children, the "Wise and Kind Words of the Buddha." So much depends on our views, perspectives, thoughts and thinking. The guidance and nurturing we receive from the Buddha-Dharma can make a tremendous difference in our life. In fact, it is what can transform our life for the better especially the power of Namo Amida Butsu.

However, that is getting ahead of ourselves. Let's start at a more fundamental and easier level as an introduction. I would like to recommend the following books as possible gifts for especially our youth, but also the young at heart. These books are easy reading and simple and contain great messages for us. You can find most of them on the Internet for sale. These books can also be found in video format.

Some recommended readings are: "The Three Questions, Based on a story by Leo Tolstoy" and "Stone Soup" by Jon J. Muth, a Jataka Tale, "The Brave Little Parrot" by Rafe Martin, "The Fall of Freddie the Leaf" by Leo Buscaglia, "The Greedy Python" by Richard Buckley, "Because of You" by B.G. Hennessy and "The Golden Chain of Love" by Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii. These books or stories share about: what is important in life, the power of sharing with each other, perseverance and determination, impermanence including dying and connection, being greedy and its consequences, how one person can potentially make a difference for world peace, and the importance of interdependence encouraging positive thoughts, words and actions, respectively. These books/readings are not all necessarily Buddhist books, but contain important messages emphasized and valued by Buddhism.

Let me conclude this message by sharing two excerpts from Rev. Tatsuo Muneto's book "Dharma Treasures: Spiritual Insights from Hawaii's Shin Buddhist Pioneers." First, partially quoting a poem written by Ume Hirano of Kona, she says "In hearts of parents as immense as this universe, nothing is more cherished than a child. Due to the devotion of parents, the child may become successful and be honored like a blossoming flower. (omit) If you truly love your child, teach him/her well about the teaching of Buddha, attaining birth in the Buddha land of peace. That is the compassion of parents that forever remains." (omit) "Let us say the Nembutsu in gratitude, Namu-amida-butsu, Namu-amida-butsu." and secondly, a poem composed by Haru Matsuda, also of Kona, "My children, please go to sleep while calling on the Name (Namo Amida Butsu). Sound, sound asleep in the arms of Oya-sama (Amida Buddha)."

Finally, as we approach the end of 2024 and the beginning of the new year 2025, I would like to encourage you and your family including friends to join me at the temple especially on Sunday mornings at 9AM so we can avail ourselves to the Wisdom and Compassion of Supreme Enlightenment especially the Great Compassion of Namo Amida Butsu for a meaningful and fulfilled life. Hope to see you at the Temple!

# MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP TEMPLE PRESIDENTS RETREAT: BUILDING CONNECTIONS AND STRENGTHENING LEADERSHIP

On November 16, 2024, the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii held its first Temple Presidents Retreat at the Buddhist Study Center. Organized by Dr. Warren Tamamoto, Derrick Inouye, Nancy Shimamoto, Doris Oshiro, Prudence Kusano, and Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani, the retreat welcomed 26 temple presidents and representatives, providing them with time and opportunity, under very pleasant and peaceful surroundings, to NETWORK, INTERACT, and NURTURE ourselves and each other.



The retreat was inspired by Bishop Umitani's temple visits as a new Bishop, where he witnessed the incredible dedication temple presidents bring to their roles. In his welcome address, he expressed deep gratitude for their commitment to managing finances, maintaining temple properties, supporting ministers, nurturing their communities, and many more. He acknowledged the unique challenges each temple faces and emphasized the importance of collaboration and mutual support.

The program kicked off with a fun-filled ice-breaker facilitated by Nancy Shimamoto, fostering an atmosphere of open and engaging participation. Prudence Kusano presented each president with special leis adorned with colorful paper clips. These clips represent the different districts and headquarters, highlighting their interconnected nature. Doris Oshiro gifted each president with a cup of seeds to "Plant Your Garden of Daily Living."

Participants then broke into small groups to tackle key topics, such as attracting younger members, supporting small temples at risk of closure, encouraging member involvement, and cultivating future leaders. These groups, composed of presidents from various temple sizes and districts, shared diverse ideas and experiences, fostering a sense of camaraderie. Following the group discussions, representatives shared their insights with the larger group.

Derrick Inouye (Business Manager), David Atcheson (Communications Coordinator), and Emi Hashi (Youth Specialist) provided a brief overview of their roles and responsibilities to the presidents, emphasizing that the HQ offers essential support and resources to the temples. Additionally, Dennis Tashiro of Windward Buddhist Temple presented effective strategies that have helped strengthen his temple's activities and engagement.

As the retreat concluded, attendees left with a renewed sense of purpose and the reassurance that they are not alone in their journey. They returned to their temples with fresh ideas and the assurance that they have a network of fellow presidents and the support of Headquarters to help navigate the challenges ahead.

This inaugural retreat was a meaningful step in enhancing leadership throughout the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, fostering the ongoing vitality of our temples and communities.

#### **CONDOLENCES**

**Reverend Eijun Kujo,** a former Kaikyoshi minister of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, passed away on August 31, 2024, at the age of 87. Rev. Kujo became a Kaikyoshi minister in August 1960 and transferred to the BCA in August 1981. A private funeral service was held on September 14, 2024, at the San Mateo Buddhist Temple.

**Reverend Mary David,** a retired minister of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, passed away on August 1, 2024, at the age of 76. Rev. David became a Kaikyoshi Minister in April 2006 and retired in March 2014. Her memorial ceremony was held privately by her family.

### 2024 MINISTER'S LAY ASSISTANT RETREAT

On October 12-13, 2024, the annual Minister's Lay Assistant (MLA) Retreat convened at the Hawaii Betsuin Temple in Honolulu to train 12 selected lay members to serve their temples and ministers. These "fellow travelers" (followers who learn side-by-side with their ministers) showed resolve and dedication to spend two full demanding days in learning about Jodo Shinshu traditions. Pete Doktor, Alan Goto, Brandon Hee, Jennifer Kane, Rene Mansho, Rod Moriyama, Linda Nagai, Jaryd Oshiro, Raymond Takiue Jr., Dennis Tashiro, Evan Watarida, and Wayne Yoshioka participated for their temples.

The primary focus was on how and why Sunday services are performed with workshops on altar setup, Kansho ringing, chanting, elements of the service, and Dharma messages. A faculty of Reverends Umitani, Baba, Hashimoto, Higa, and Soga; along with guest Rev. Dr. Jeff Wilson also provided insight on the additional roles of the MLAs in their temples, such as new visitor greeting and tours, MC scripting, and leading discussions.

Participating is an excellent way to learn and understand Shin Buddhist teachings. Temple ministers select lay members who show interest and integrity to represent their temples. The 2025 MLA Retreat will be held on October 25-26 at Hawaii Betsuin in Honolulu. Financial subsidies are available to support this training program.


