Though my body/Is clothed in rags,/My heart is adorned/With wadded silk garment /When I hear (Amida's Teaching)!

Amida's compassion/Tenderly permeates/Every nook and corner,/Particularly me!

I invite you to the temple as we, together, delve into the experience of Okaru and so many others who encountered All-Inclusive Wisdom and All-Embracing Compassion (Amida Buddha) so that we are able to live in a life transforming deep awareness as they did.

I conclude my message today by quoting a saying originally by Tz'u-min (of China) which Shinran Shonin quoted in his "Notes on Essentials of Faith Alone" in praise of Amida Buddha's dynamic workings of Great Wisdom and Compassion which transforms our life.

That (Amida) Buddha, in the causal stage (as Bodhisattva Dharmakara), made the universal Vow: When beings (people) hear my Name (Namo Amida Butsu) and think on me, I will come to welcome them. Not discriminating...Soley making beings (people) turn about and abundantly say the nembutsu, I can make bits of rubble change into gold.

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP

*Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani delivered the following message at the Hawaii Kyodan Board of Directors Meeting on December 7, 2024.

Good morning. As this is the final Board of Directors Meeting for the year, I want to take a moment to express my heartfelt appreciation to the ministers and lay leaders of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii for your unwavering leadership and dedication. Your commitment is deeply valued, and I sincerely thank you for your continued efforts in achieving our shared mission.

I have submitted my written report, which also includes updates from my role as the Buddhist Study Center (BSC) Interim Director. If you have any questions or would like to know more details, please contact me.

As I shared in the most recent HQ Update, we hosted the Temple Presidents Retreat at the BSC on November 16. This retreat welcomed 26 temple presidents or their representatives and was designed to create a peaceful and engaging environment for networking, interaction, and mutual support.

The retreat was very well-received, and I would like to share some of the participants' comments:

- "It was good to talk to others in the same position."
- "Now I know that I have a network of resources if I need any help."
- "We are not alone."
- "Very engaging and meaningful."
- "This was so helpful as a new president coming in."
- "It was wonderful to network with everyone."

As the retreat concluded, presidents expressed a renewed sense of purpose and reassurance. They returned to their temples with fresh ideas and the confidence that they are supported by a strong network of fellow presidents and the Headquarters.

While there is no simple solution to the challenges facing our temples, districts, and state organization, retreats like this remind us that we can navigate these challenges together. Each of you plays an indispensable role in HHMH, and your participation is vital to our collective efforts.

In many ways, our work is like playing a soccer match. Imagine a soccer field where the goal represents our shared mission in the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii—to spread the Dharma and nurture our communities.

In soccer, no single player can control the entire game, no matter how skilled they are. Each player has a role, and success depends on everyone working together, understanding their responsibilities, and trusting their teammates.

Sometimes, the ball moves smoothly down the field, just as our projects and goals progress seamlessly. Other times, obstacles arise—like opposing players blocking our path. When the ball is intercepted, it's easy to feel frustrated. But in soccer, no single player is blamed. Instead, the team regroups, adjusts its strategy, and works together to recover and move forward.

There are moments of joy when we score a goal—celebrating a successful event, reaching a milestone, or welcoming more people to the temple. These achievements are the result of shared effort and determination. Every pass, every attempt, and every step forward contributes to the greater game.

Our journey in HHMH is a collaborative one. Ministers, Kyodan Board Members, Temple Presidents, Temple members ... each of us plays a vital role, and by working together, we will overcome challenges, celebrate successes, and continue toward our shared goal of spreading the Nembutsu teachings and serving our communities.


Please consider your own contribution to any of these or other worthy organizations making a difference in our community. Non-profits are a vital part of our social safety net that helps keep our community strong.

- 5th Place: Masako Sakata, Na'alehu Hongwanji "In Gratitude We Call Out Namo Amida Butsu"



INTRODUCING REVEREND TATSUO MUNETO — OUR GUEST SPEAKER FOR THE JANUARY 19, 2025, HO'ONKO (SHINRAN SHONIN'S MEMORIAL SERVICE)

Rev. Tatsuo Muneto was born in 1941 and grew up in Hiroshima, Japan. In 1964, he graduated from Ryukoku University with a B.A. in Buddhist Studies. Later in 1965, he was assigned the position of Assistant Director of Hawaii Kyodan Department of Sunday School.

He was the recipient of the Hawaii Kyodan Scholarship in 1967 and enrolled at Claremont University in California where he finished his Master of Arts program in Religion and Asian Studies.

Upon his return to Hawaii Kyodan in 1970, he was assigned to various temples in Honolulu, the Big Island and Kauai. While on Kauai, he furthered his studies and received one unit of Clinical Pastoral Education in 1987.

He held the Rimbans' position at Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii Betsuin until his retirement on December 15, 2015 at the age of 75.

During his tenure at the local temples, he took time off to visit India twice, and also to visit the Silk Road in China for pilgrimage tours.

In 1995, he published a book titled, "Dharma Treasures, Spiritual Insights from Hawaii's Shin Buddhist Pioneers."

Since his retirement, he has been serving as a hospice volunteer at Navian Hawaii.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE AIEA HONGWANJI MISSION ANNUAL GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING ON JANUARY 25, 2025

MAJOR PROJECTS AND EVENTS IN 2024:

The following is a list of the major projects and undertakings that the AHM Board of Directors worked on in 2024.

- WE Painting was hired to repair the spalls and cracks on the western side of the hall, and the cracks in the floor of the atrium area.
- Cyber Insurance Coverage with a \$2 million limit of liability was added to the insurance policies for the Aiea Hongwanji Mission.
- Guidelines for Aiea Kyodan-sponsored funerals (Kyodan-so) were established and adopted.
- The Preschool replaced its broken dishwasher with a new one on lease.
- The columbarium (Nokotsudo) updating of the contact list for the niches continued, but there are still some niches that have no contacts.
- The AHM BWA held its spring Craft Fair which was a huge success.
- The tent fumigation of the temple building and parsonage was completed by Aloha Termite & Pest Control.
- Roto Rooter replaced the fill valve and stopper assembly for the parsonage master bathroom toilet.
- Roto Rooter also replaced the leaking flush valves in the hall's men's & women's restrooms, as well as the aged valves for the hall kitchen faucets.
- The exterior men's & women's restroom of the Lotus Adult Day Care Center were renovated under contract with Construction R Us. Design and Construction administration services were provided pro bono by Gerald M. Tokuno, AIA.
- AHM held an E-Waste collection day in June which provided a venue for the community to recycle their old electronic devices.
- On 6/14/2024, AHM sponsored the showing of the "Carving the Divine" documentary film.
- The expired AED pads for the Lotus Adult Day Care Center and Preschool/Hall AEDs were replaced with new ones. Child-sized pads were added to the Preschool/Hall AED.
- The Fire Alarm Systems for the Preschool and Social Hall were upgraded to comply with current codes.
- AHM supported the Jr. YBA 67th State Convention with a donation of \$250 for a full-page ad in the convention booklet.
- AHM hosted a Dharma Learning and discussion session with Dr. Ret. Rev. Kenji Akahoshi in August.
- Hall Rentals: Added Ballroom Dancing on Wednesdays, 7:15pm to 9:15pm; The Judo Club expanded their Thursday practice time slot to 5:30pm to 9:00pm (previously 6:00pm to 8:30pm due to Kumon's reservation which ended in December 2023.)
- Various repairs and improvements were made throughout the temple and preschool grounds in July (refer to the August 2024 Jiko newsletter for details.)
- The Audio-Visual Company was hired to troubleshoot the cause of the malfunctioning hall audio system. They reported that the amplifier was not working but were not sure if replacing it would solve the problem. They submitted proposals to upgrade the entire system, which was rather expensive compared to just replacing the amplifier. A volunteer replaced the amplifier at no charge and the system is now in working condition.
- The Preschool earned its reaccreditation which is good through 2030. It also passed inspection for its license renewal.
- The temple Dharma school program was restarted and rebranded as Dharma Fun.
- The Project Dana program is active at AHM with volunteers providing meals for the elderly and transportation to those in need.
- The parsonage sliding glass doors were replaced by Akamai Glass.

- The annual Bon Dance was held on August 24, 2024, and was well-attended by the community.
- The parsonage clothes washer's stabilizer suspension rods were replaced.
- The noisy ceiling fan in the parsonage's dining area was fixed.
- A new model car that was parked along the street shoulder by the Lotus Adult Day Care Center was damaged from AHM's weed wacking work. An insurance claim was presented to Pyramid Insurance to reimburse AHM for the payments made to the car's owner.
- In December, AHM members elected its Board of directors to serve the 2025 through 2026 term. The installation of the directors and its officers will be held prior to the start of its annual meeting and New Year's party on January 25, 2025.


