

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Come honor your mother!



It will soon be Mother's Day, but why is Mother's Day in May? In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill that designated the second Sunday in May as "Mother's Day." However, the start of Mother's Day goes back a little farther. Anna M. Jarvis wanted to honor her mother, who had passed away in 1905. Two years later in a church in West

Virgina, a memorial service was held to honor her mother Ann Reeves Jarvis. The following year, a memorial service honored all mothers. Anna M. Jarvis campaigned for the establishment of "Mother's Day" which would honor and acknowledge the contributions of all mothers that led to President Wilson's signing of the bill, it seems, with the words "to the best mother in the world, your mother."

It is one of the busiest times of the year for florists, restaurants and (previously the post office and telephone companies, but today probably) social media platforms. Did you know that at temples along with O-Bon and New Years, Mother's Day is one of those days that has the most Columbarium visitors and flowers?

It makes sense when you consider the special bond of a mother and a child who shared the same flesh and blood for nine months and, normally, those infant years of suckling mother's breast both for sustenance and security. Assuming a normal upbringing even later in life, that bond between mother and child remains strong. We often hear of stories when someone is at the end of his/her/their life or in a life-or-death situation many people call out for their mothers. Again, all mothers, wish that their child or children succeed in life, but when it comes to mothers who are devote Buddhist, we often find an added dimension.

A case in point would be the mother of the Buddhist Priest Eshin Sozu also known as Genshin, one of the Great Masters of Jodo Shinshu.

15 years of age, his mother sent Genshin to a monastery to become a Buddhist monk. He excelled in his studies and training that he eventually was invited to share the Dharma at the Imperial Court of Japan. When he did in compensation, he received lavish gifts from the Imperial Court. He decided to send some of it to his mother. However, the response he got was not what he had anticipated for she chided him saying "I received the gifts you sent. But while I am boundlessly happy with the diligence you have displayed in scholarship. It was not my intention that you become a grand monk traveling about in high style." Genshin immediately wrote an apology to his mother, and she replied saying how happy she was that he recognized the misguided path he might have taken and added saying now I can face death with a calm mind.

It is said, that in the seventh year of his studies that would make him 22 years old, he told his mother he wanted to visit her in the city, but she told him not to visit and concentrate on his studies, but in the 9th year of his training at age 24, he rushed down from the monastery to find his mother on her deathbed. He encouraged his mother to recite the Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu, Amida Buddha's Honored Name. After his mother's death, Genshin went on to write his famous *Ojoyoshu* which some modern scholars say may have influenced Dante. Dante wrote the famous "The Divine Comedy" of which the first part is most well-known as Dante's Inferno, which is a masterpiece of literature in the Western World.

Closer to home and our times, I recall a story related by a Buddhist Churches of America minister which shared the touching story of a mother and son. "A mother said to her son, "You said that I raised you to be the doctor that you are and that, at the alumni party given in your honor today, you respect me the most in this world. I am very grateful that you feel the way you do, but I am truly unworthy of such praise. It was not I, but Amida Buddha who raised you to be the respected doctor that you are. We were very poor when your father died. I did not have the courage to raise you by myself. There were many times that I thought about our dying together. Then I realized that Amida Buddha's compassion continuously embraces us. Amida Buddha understands my suffering. My suffering is Amida Buddha's suffering; my joy is Amida Buddha's joy. Realizing this I found courage to live. If you feel grateful to me, then please realize that it was Amida Buddha who raised you to be what you are. Lets' offer our gratitude to Amida Buddha together."

To conclude, please let me quote the Larger Sukhavatiyuha Sutra. Sakyamuni Buddha says "My concern for you,...is greater than the care of parents for their children. I have become a Buddha in this world,... I have...enabled people to acquire the...peace of unconditioned Nirvana." (omit) "If there are people who hear the Name of that (Amida) Buddha, rejoice so greatly as to dance, and remember him even once, then you should know that they have gained great benefit by receiving the unsurpassed virtue." (omit) "I have expounded this teaching for the sake of sentient beings...After I have passed into Nirvana, do not allow doubt to arise. In the future, (other) Buddhist scriptures and teachings will perish. But, out of pity and compassion, I will especially preserve this sutra and maintain it in the world for a hundred years more. Those beings who encounter it will attain deliverance in accord with their aspirations." (omit) "When the Buddha (Sakyamuni) finished delivering this sutra...all those in assembly, without exception, rejoiced at the Buddha's discourse."

I conclude by encouraging you, in the month of May, to come to the temple especially on Sundays to honor your mother and express your gratitude to her and Amida Buddha.

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP

"Reflection on the 80th Anniversary of the Kamikaze Attack and Burial on the USS Missouri"

On April 11, 2025, I had the honor of attending and offering the Invocation and Benediction at the 80th Anniversary of the Kamikaze Attack and Burial on the USS *Missouri*. This solemn event, hosted by the USS Missouri Memorial Association, served as a time of remembrance and reconciliation, marking eight decades since a significant moment in the Battle of Okinawa.

In April 1945, a kamikaze aircraft struck the *Missouri*, causing damage and loss. Amidst the wreckage, part of the plane and the body of the young Japanese pilot landed on the main deck. In a remarkable act of compassion, then-Captain William Callaghan ordered

that the pilot be given a proper burial at sea in accordance with naval tradition. Despite being an enemy combatant, the pilot was treated with dignity and respect—an extraordinary gesture that has continued to resonate through generations.

At the anniversary ceremony, we were joined by the descendants of Captain Callaghan, including his grandson, Mr. Carey Callaghan, who shared: "My grandfather's decision – controversial at the time, and maybe even today – was a humble one rooted in empathy, a sense of dignity, and a vision of the future that was a part of who he was every day."

Honolulu Mayor Rick Blangiardi also offered his reflections, stating: "This moment of remembrance stands as a testament to the power of reconciliation and the strength of peace. Captain Callaghan chose to respond not with hatred, but with honor and respect. That act of compassion continues to teach us that dignity and respect are not weakened by war; they are strengthened through understanding and forgiveness."

As part of my Invocation and Benediction, I shared these thoughts: "Despite the extreme conditions of the battlefield, there existed profound respect and compassion for an individual who sacrificed his life. This compassionate act transcended national borders, ideologies, and conflicting emotions. All lives are equally embraced by the Light of the Buddha's Great Compassion. While conflicts rage globally, people tend to alienate those with differing values, and I feel an urgent concern as divisions and isolation continue to grow. I sincerely hope that everyone gathered here today, both young and old, reflects on the power of compassion that enfolds all lives, nurtures a sense of oneness of all lives within our hearts, and walks together toward the realization of a society in which everyone can live a life of spiritual fulfillment. May we each return to our communities with a renewed commitment to practice compassion, uphold dignity, and foster mutual understanding and peace."

The ceremony concluded with a wreath-laying, followed by the scattering of flower petals by all participants—a quiet yet powerful act of tribute, memory, and hope for peace.

Hongwanji Hawaii is offering an introductory class on how to protect yourself and your sangha from email scams known as "phishing." The class is offered both in person at Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii Betsuin's Annex Temple and via Zoom on Saturday, May 10, from 10:30 a.m. to 12 p.m. Our expert speaker will

be Giovanni D. Williams, a cybersecurity advisor with the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA). The class is geared to a general audience and will not be overly technical. While the emphasis will be on email scams such as those experienced recently by sangha members, additional cybersecurity topics will be introduced for potential follow-up by temple leaders. 


Family Memorial Service
