Come honor your father!



Last month, we observed Mother's Day by remembering and honoring our mothers. Thank you to so many of you who came to Mother's Day Service. Further, wasn't that Mother's Day lunch so delicious?!

This month is Father's Day. Please join us to honor your father on Sunday, June 15th at our Father's Day Service. In advance of Father's Day, let me share with you a story from

the episode of the life of Genza (full name is Saburo Ashikaga). Genza is well-known as a *myokonin*, one of the wondrously devout people of Jodo Shinshu or the Nembutsu.

However, as a preface, let me share an Dharma article written by the late Rev. Gyomay Kubose found in his book "The Center Within."

Sensei shared "When we consider our lives today, our lives are very comfortable, even more than that, luxurious. We appreciate some things, but our sense of appreciation is so shallow today. Unless we go through trouble and hardships, we really do not experience real appreciation.

In a similar fashion, Enlightenment is difficult to realize when everything is going well. In other words, fortunate people can be very unfortunate as far as religion is concerned. (omit) ...because of ...good fortune, there could be less motivation to deepen your awareness and appreciation of life.

When everything is going well-health is good, plenty to eat, enough money-perhaps we feel we do not need Enlightenment. However, we need Enlightenment because inevitably we will encounter trouble in life. We will have many problems-be they personal or social, physical or psychological. Having so many problems means that we have many occasions to become enlightened.

Many times it is only through unfortunate conditions or situations that we realize the value of friendship, kindness, or love. It is ironic that through unfortunate events, we attain a fortunate life. Life is full of such ironic contradictions. It is important to take the time to think about the reality of life. We should take the time for self-reflection and re-evaluate our lives."

Such, we can say, was the life of Genza. In a book about Genza's life by Terumi Fujiki, it shares the following episode of Genza' life. Genza was a hard worker, but he was an avid pursuer of the Dharma and spent a lot of his time in religious pursuits. Genza's younger brother, at that time in his life, did not appreciate his brother Genza's enthusiasm for the Buddha-Dharma or Nembutsu. He probably said, "...Genza, you went to Kyoto leaving all the work to us. What did you gain? You can't buy rice fields with Namnandabutsu!! I don't care about Shinjin at all!!" The author surmises that "Genza himself was probably unable to find a word to express his struggle and suffering."

In the meantime, at age 24 (in 1866) Genza became a father when a daughter was born. Then, in 1869, a son was born to Genza and his wife Kuni. She was a hard worker too. They were so happy, but unexpectedly the son died even before they could name him. There is poignant scene in the comic book in which, soon after the baby's 49 Day Service in late January, one day when Genza was outside and had his hand open "Slowly and softly, a single snowflake fell gently on Genza's palm and suddenly disappeared. Twinkle, twinkle! Namandabu, Namandabu."

Genza could not forget about his son's passing away. Genza decided that he needed to visit Honzan, Nishi Hongwanji, once again, which by the way was 125 miles away, to listen to the Dharma. In Kyoto, he heard that "The Pure Land is the world filled with the Light of Wisdom. Your deceased baby is a Buddha who takes a vow asking you to be awakened to that world! Namuamidabu, Namuamidabu." However, Genza still lamented "Regardless of how much I listen, ...my understanding is paper-thin. What can I do-o?" It seems "Genza, again, returned sadly to his village" in Tottori prefecture.

Genza continued to diligently work his fields. Then, it happened! The event that would change his life forever. To find out what happened, please join us on Sunday, June 15th, our Father's Day Service at 9AM, to find out what happened to Genza.

To summarize this newsletter message, I would to quote Rev. Gyomay Kubose again. He said, "We need to look into our lives and realize that we are really fortunate, not only in times of good health and plenty, but we are fortunate in every way. All our misfortunes enable us to really appreciate life." (omit) We take things for granted and never appreciate things when they are going well. When things go wrong, we become serious and look within. We look deeper into the reality of life and discover real appreciation in life. (omit) Religion is nothing but this way of appreciation."

Thank you and Namo Amida Butsu/Entrusting in All-Inclusive Wisdom and All-Embracing Compassion.

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP

Bishop Toshiyuki Umitani delivered the following Closing Remarks at the Pacific Buddhist Academy Commencement Exercise, which took place on Sunday, May 18, 2025, at the Moanalua Performing Arts Center. Nineteen students graduated from PBA this year.

PBA Commencement Exercise Closing Remarks

YESS Camp 41 was held on April 18-20, 2025, at Camp Erdman on Oahu. There were 34 participants (15 campers, 9 counselors, and 10 staff). The theme was Mālama Amida with four guest speakers; Rev. David Fujimoto spoke about self-care, Christopher Wong spoke about conservation and taking care of the land, Emi Hashi spoke about taking care of friendships, and Bishop Umitani spoke about how Amida takes care of us. Throughout the camp, campers and counselors played games and mixers, performed skits, had a campfire, engaged in deep conversation, had intimate counselor-led services, did morning stretches, removed invasive species/planted native plants around the campgrounds, had an energetic Wicked-themed dance, shared feelings at the candlelight ceremony, ate good food, and discussed the Dharma. It was a busy yet fun and enjoyable weekend, with many new friendship connections formed. We hope to continue on the tradition of YESS Camp, and provide young people aged 13-23 the chance to connect with the Dharma in their lives, for many more years to come.

Living Treasures of Hawai'i recognizes and honors individuals who have demonstrated excellence and high achievement in their field of endeavor and the larger community, who through continuous growth and selfless giving have made a significant positive impact on our local society.

The program was inspired by the Living National Treasures (Ningen Kokuho) of Japan. In 1976, Bishop Yoshiaki Fujitani instituted the program within the Hongwanji at the suggestion of Paul Yamanaka, a local business executive. Initially established to honor those committed to perpetuating our islands' distinctive cultural and artistic heritage, the recognition was expanded to consider persons across sectors and communities who are making Hawai'i a better place. KAHUKU HONGWANJI SCHOLARSHIP

The Kahuku Hongwanji Mission closed its doors in February 2013 after serving its membership for 111 years. To maintain the legacy of the Kahuku Hongwanji Mission and to develop the future generations of the Hongwanji, Kahuku Hongwanji Mission established a scholarship to support students at the college level.



Eligibility:

The applicant must be a student attending or registered for enrollment in an accredited university, college, or a post-high school program in the State of Hawaii.

The applicant must show interest in Buddhism, and be active in a Hongwanji program, either at the Hawaii Kyodan level or at a branch temple.

The applicant must be a full-time student and registered for a minimum of 12 college credits per semester.

The applicant, at the time of the application, must have a required minimum high school, college, or university in Hawaii GPA of 2.5.

(*Those who registered for enrollment and not yet received Hawaii college/university GPA must submit their GPA after the first semester.)

The applicant must submit the application form with an essay on "Dharma and My Life".

Application Deadline: July 31st of the year of application

Scholarship Amount: \$2,000.00 each / two recipients



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE




To Our Sangha, At the April 27th Lady Eshinni and Lady Kakushinni Day service, we paid tribute to Shinran Shonin's wife and


