

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

"Obon, Obon Its Festival Day!"

As we enter the summer months especially July and August, the Obon Season is already in full swing with several temples already having had their Bon Dances. Obon is one of the important Buddhist observances that we have. Did you visit your temple or a temple near you not only for the Bon Dance, but also for the Obon Service too? I encourage you to attend both the Bon Service and the Bon Dance. To be sure, the Bon Dance is fun with all the dancing, eating and being able to talk story with family and friends amidst the music



and taiko drumming, but Obon is also a time of deep spirituality. It is a time to reflect, remember and honor people who were and are a part of your life, and express gratitude in the spirit of Dana.

One of the central themes of Obon is Dana or Selfless Giving. In the book, "The Teaching of Buddha" it says, "A True Offering (Dana) comes from an empathetic heart before any request is made...a True Offering (Dana) is...the one that gives not occasionally but constantly." "A True Offering (Dana) is one that is given with pleasure, forgetting oneself as the giver, the one who receives it and the gift itself. True Offering (Dana) springs spontaneously from one's pure compassionate heart with no thought of return, wishing to enter into a life of Enlightenment together." Dana or Selfless Giving is one of the most beautiful, genuine and pure teachings of the Buddha. We are all encouraged to do it, but when we deeply self-reflect, we realize how challenging it is to perform pure Dana.

Let me share a personal experience that I had which showed me how hard it truly is for me to practice Dana. It happened on one of my trips to the Jodo Shinshu Center in Berkely, California. As not to cause an inconvenience to the Staff at the Jodo Shinshu Center and save several hundred dollars on plane fare for the Center, I decided to take a redeve flight to San Franscico which left late Sunday night instead of Monday morning. So, I arrived at San Franscico early Monday morning and with some free time. As it was my usual day off too, I decided to go SF's Chinatown. While I kind of knew where Chinatown was I didn't know the exact location. This was before we had all these apps as we do today. I figured out which BART station I had to get off at, but then I had to figure out which direction Chinatown was from the station. As I looked around trying to figure out which way to

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go someone came up to me and asked if I needed help. Well, being from Hawaii, perhaps I was a bit naïve and immediately answered "I want to go to Chinatown." He told me where to go, but as soon as he gave me directions he asked for money. I was kind of taken aback because here in Hawaii you wouldn't think of asking anyone for money for giving directions, right?

Now, I would have gladly given him a dollar or two, but my dilemma was that I had used all my dollar bills earlier for my BART ticket. The smallest bill I had was a \$10 bill. I had a hard time letting go of the 10 dollars. Let me tell you, at that moment, it was a real struggle. From the way this person spoke and was dressed, he didn't seem like someone who was just trying to get money from people for nothing. He was polite and friendly. He did give me all kinds of additional information such as if I didn't mind walking for 15 minutes or so I could walk to Chinatown instead of taking the bus. He also told me of places that the locals like to go to and so forth. He even offered me change. So, I ended up giving him \$7 as I needed some cash for my return trip on BART. When I did he was so grateful. It was such a sincere thank you that I felt like "What a bonbu I am." He so appreciated the extra \$5 that it seemed to make his day. I kind of assume that he could probably get a small meal with the \$7. Or was he something more? I can't give money so spontaneously to 100 people, but it seemed to make such a difference in that person's life for that day. I felt embarrassed and ashamed when I realized my attachment. From the standpoint of the Dharma, my gift of \$7 was not Dana because I was attached to it. Even though it was not Dana, my gift was appreciated by that person, and, gratefully, it did make me self-reflect which resulted in my greater appreciation of Amida Buddha's unconditional compassion. It was a wonderful Dharma enriching moment!

This experience, one among many, has made me realize what a bonbu or foolish being I am. Someone who has all kinds of attachments and self-centered thoughts. It has made me appreciate, even more, the great unconditional compassion of Amida Buddha who accepts me just as I am, faults and inconsistencies included, promising that I can attain the perfect peace, happiness and tranquility, equal to the Buddha's, by simply entrusting in Namo Amida Butsu, the Buddha's Name Which Calls Me To Entrust. There are no conditions placed upon me. Amida Buddha simply pleads and beckons "Do not worry. Simply Entrust (Namo) yourself to me (Amida Butsu/Buddha)."

Out of deep gratitude to Amida Buddha and in lament of one's imperfect self, a Jodo Shin Buddhist (to me) responds to Amida Buddha by reciting Namo Amida Butsu, the Buddha's Name That I Call in Awareness, Joy and Gratitude and by trying to live more in accordance with the Dharma. In Shin Buddhism, Dana is not required of us to be saved or attain Enlightenment, as we are saved by Amida Buddha's Compassion to which we entrust ourselves, but (to me) it does not mean that Dana is meaningless and of no concern to us. It is a virtue and out of gratitude to Amida Buddha, understanding its significance, we give in the spirit of Dana even if imperfectly. As it says in The Golden Chain of Love, "I will try to think pure and beautiful thoughts, to say pure and beautiful words and to do pure and beautiful deeds knowing that on what I do now depends not only my happiness or unhappiness, but also that of others." Let us respond to Amida Buddha unconditional compassion, but trying to live the Dharma.

A MESSAGE FOR PEACE TO COMMEMORATE 80 YEARS SINCE THE END OF WORLD WAR II

This year marks the 80th year since the end of World War II. First and foremost, I offer my heartfelt condolences to all those around the world who lost their lives in that devastating war. I also express my deepest sympathy to those who suffered unimaginable hardship—losing family, homes, and enduring countless forms of sorrow—due to the war.

War is a collective act carried out between nations that takes lives and tramples upon the dignity of life. It is a tragic expression of human ignorance and foolishness in its most horrific form. During World War II, in Asia, the Pacific, and across the globe, both allies and enemies alike—combatants and civilians—suffered tremendous losses. On Japanese soil, Okinawa experienced a devastating ground battle. The atomic bomb-

ings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki annihilated both people and entire cities. Tokyo, Osaka, and many other cities were reduced to ashes through air raids. And yet, it is part of our history as a Buddhist organization that we once cooperated with and even glorified that war.

Shinran Shonin stated, "If the karmic cause so prompts us, we will commit any kind of act." When illuminated by the Buddha's teaching, we come to see our true selves—beings so easily swayed by circumstances that we are capable of the most tragic and shameful acts. Precisely because of this, we must never again allow such conditions to arise.

Since the end of the war, our organization has engaged in various efforts to realize peace, including an annual memorial service for all who died in the war. However, as those with no direct experience of war now make up the majority of the population, the painful memories of war are gradually fading. We must not forget our past—a past in which we failed to question the national and social context of that time, and mistook what was wrong for what was right. We must hold a deep sense of remorse and strive never to let our past fade away, guided by Shinran Shonin's words, "The nembutsu alone is true and real."

We are awakened to the reality that all life—past, present, and future—is embraced by the compassionate vow of the Buddha. We must honor those who came before us, cherish those living now, and convey our aspirations to those yet to be born.

Our organization should carry forward the painful stories of war passed down to us by our predecessors so that their experiences will not be in vain. People around the world continue to suffer from wars and conflicts even at this very moment. It is our important role as a Buddhist organization to sympathize with their pain and sorrow, deeply reflect on ourselves, and pass on the Nembutsu to the next generation.

Continuously reflecting on the past, questioning ourselves, and considering what we can do now and what we can leave behind for future generations —these are the matters of true importance. On the 80th year commemoration of the end of the war, I offer this message for peace.

Rev. Dr. Enrique Galvan-Alvarez was born in the Canary Islands, but has spent most of his adult life in the UK. In 2011 he obtained a PhD in Modern Languages and shortly after started working at the (all-online) Universidad Internacional de La Rioja, where he is now Associate Professor. He encountered the Buddha's teaching in 2003 and he started practicing under various Tibetan teachers. In 2011 he encountered Shinran Shonin's teaching and was deeply moved by the writings of Rev. Dr. Al Bloom, with whom he sustained a 5-year long correspondence. Rev. Dr. Galvan-Alvarez continued his study of Jodo Shinshu with other Sensei and Dharma friends, at Dr. Bloom's recommendation, in Europe, Japan and America. In 2019 he was ordained at Nishi Hongwanji. Since then he has been actively spreading the Dharma, both in English and in Spanish.

During the global Covid-19 pandemic, when all Buddhist activities went online, Rev. Dr. Galvan-Alvarez started forming a Spanish-language online group,

Jinen-kō, which now has members across the Spanish speaking world. He also serves the Jodo Shinshu UK community, by offering online sessions and visiting members in their homes across England. He was certified as Kyōshi minister in January 2025 and is currently organizing the 21st European Shin Conference, which will take place in Oxford in September 2025.

Eligibility:

Open to all ages and skill levels, including Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii members, affiliated organizations, and the broader community.

Submission Guidelines:

1. Alignment with Theme:

- Posters must visually express the theme "Nurturing Nembutsu: Sharing Gratitude."
- Participants should focus on illustrating how gratitude is expressed in their daily lives.

2. Content Requirements:

- -Visual elements should reflect how expressing Namo Amida Butsu recognizes the gratitude they have received from or shared with others.
- -The design should encourage viewers to reflect what it means to share gratitude with family, friends and the world around them.

3. Design Specifications:

- Posters may be created using any medium (e.g., painting, drawing, digital art) but must be submitted as a high-resolution digital file (JPEG, PNG, or PDF).
- Dimensions: Standard poster size (24" x 36" or equivalent in digital format).
- The design must be original and not include any copyrighted images or text.

4. Submission Process:

- Entries must be submitted electronically via the official submission portal by Friday, October 31, 2025.
- Each submission must include the artist's name, age, and contact information. A brief description explaining

the inspiration behind the design is optional.

5. Judging Criteria:

- Relevance to Theme: How well does the poster capture the essence of "Nurturing Nembutsu: Sharing Gratitude?"
- Creativity and Originality: How unique and innovative is the design?
- Artistic Quality: The overall visual appeal, including composition, use of color, and technical execution.
- Message Clarity: How does the poster communicate the message and teachings of Buddha and Shinran Shonin?

6. Awards and Recognition:

- Prizes will be awarded to the top 5 posters.
- Winning posters will be displayed at all temples, Hongwanji Mission School, Pacific Buddhist Academy, Buddhist Study Center, and featured in the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii's publications, website, and social media platforms.
- Winners will be notified on November 20, 2025 and announced at the HHMH Board of Directors Meeting on Saturday, December 13, 2025
