



MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Memorable Memorial Day Weekend with Sadako



One of my favorite quotes from Shinran Shonin states: *"Those who feel that their birth (into the Pure Land of Enlightenment) is completely settled should, mindful of the Buddha's benevolence, hold the nembutsu in their hearts and say it to respond in gratitude to that benevolence, with the wish, 'May there be peace in the world and may the Buddha's Teaching spread!'"*

These words *"May there be peace in the world"* from one of Shinran Shonin's letters beautifully reflected the spirit of a very special day at Pearl Harbor National Memorial Park. Distinguished individuals from both the United States and Japan gathered for "Sadako's Peace Flame Ceremony, a ceremony dedicated to reconciliation and world peace.

As many know, Sadako Legacy is an organization promoting the wish of young Sadako Sasaki led by Mr. Masahiro Sasaki, Sadako's older brother, and Mr. Yuji Sasaki, her nephew. The organization hoped to establish an eternal peace flame monument in Hawaii using a flame originally created from an ember taken from the ruins of Hiroshima following the atomic bombing.

The ember was brought to Fukuoka by Mr. Tatsuo Yamamoto from the remains of a relative's destroyed home and business in Hiroshima. For many years, the flame symbolized the anger, hatred, and desire for revenge he carried in his heart. Eventually, however, Mr. Yamamoto realized that holding on to such emotions would not bring about any positivity. He transformed the meaning of the flame so that it came to represent a sincere aspiration for world peace. In this way, the original flame was transformed into a Peace Flame.

To preserve this symbol of peace, the flame was eventually donated to Yame City, Fukuoka, where a monument was built. Inspired by this history, Mr. Yuji Sasaki envisioned bringing the flame to Hawaii. Although creating a permanent eternal flame monument here proved challenging and a new idea emerged: a ceremonial extinguishing of the flame. This ceremony honored the flame as a symbol of peace while also acknowledging its painful origins and the transformation it underwent. The extinguishing ceremony held at Pearl Harbor encouraged all participants to reflect on transforming their own hearts and minds so that reconciliation and peace may begin within us and spread throughout the world.

Mr. Miyamoto served the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii as its President from 1992 to 1998, then as Immediate Past President from 1998 to 2008, followed by Advisor from 2008 to 2020, and finally as Honorary Advisor from 2020 to 2026.

DHARMA EDUCATORS’ RETREAT – MAY 2, 2026

Thirty-three (33) Dharma Educators from across the state came together on Saturday, May 2 at the Buddhist Study Center to network and engage in discussions about the future of Dharma teaching practices. A basic *Introduction to Jodo Shinshu Buddhism* was presented by Reverend Blayne Higa. Reverend Eric Matsumoto presented the *Jodo Shinshu perspective of the Golden Chain of Love*. Existing Dharma education resources ([Shin Buddhist Media Resources](#), [Dharma-Centered Living 101 seminars](#) by Trinidad Hunt, [Study Guide Presentations for Minister Assistants and Dharma Educators](#) by Reverend Kevin Kuniyuki, and annual opportunities to attend the Buddhist Churches of America’s Federation of Dharma School Teachers League) were shared by Debbie Kubota. Joan Tamori (Wailuku Hongwanji) shared an Enlightenment (Escape Room) Game. Prudence Kusano (Windward Buddhist Temple) put together activity kits for everyone to make their own “*Grateful Hands*.” Stephen Chinen (Mililani Hongwanji) led everyone in an activity to eat Hershey’s kisses in a mindful manner.

Dr. Miki Tomita-Okamoto, educational consultant and Wailuku Hongwanji BWA member, facilitated small group discussions on strategic planning. Discussions were held on Dharma Education vs. Dharma School, promoting educational programs for journey mapping tailored to specific individuals at our temples –school-age students, current members, inactive members (who attend memorial services), newcomers to Buddhism, etc. A closing circle culminated the day with everyone sharing their learnings and takeaways from the session, based on their “*Head, Heart or Feet*.” A Dharma Educators’ Handbook was distributed to all participants. Another important part of the day was the signing of an Oath to “End the War in Our Hearts.” Participants included Mrs. Akie Abe, wife of the late former Prime Minister Shinzo Abe; Mr. Hidetoshi Tojo, great-grandson of wartime Prime Minister General Hideki Tojo; and Mr. Masahiro Sasaki of Sadako Legacy from Japan. Representing the United States were Mr. Clifton Truman Daniel, grandson of President Harry S. Truman, and Pearl Harbor National Memorial Superintendent Tom Leatherman.

That evening, a special reception of 50+ hosted by the Aiea Community Association, coordinated by its president, Mrs. Claire Tamamoto, was held at Pearl at Kalauao to honor guests who had traveled from near and far for this historic occasion. Guests enjoyed a delicious dinner prepared

The reception began with Opening Remarks (by Yours Truly) and an oli by Kāōlinokaimana Yasuoka. Adding to the evening's inspiration were moving musical performances by the youth of Ohana Arts, who sang “Ichigo Ichie” and “Peace on Your Wings,” the theme song from the youth musical of the same name. The production has continued to inspire many for over a decade after its 2014 premiere as a commemorative project celebrating the 125th Anniversary of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii.

The evening concluded with heartfelt remarks from Mr. Masahiro Sasaki, who emphasized Sadako's spirit of “*omoiyari*” — thoughtfulness, kindness, and placing others before oneself. Attendees then joined together with Ms. Miwa Nakamura on ukulele in singing “Hawaii Aloha,” forming a circle around the banquet room while holding hands. Among those present were former Governor David Ige and former First Lady Dawn Amano-Ige, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Taniguchi, and Ms. Carol Hayashino, former Executive Director of the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawaii, among many others. Special appreciation is extended to Mr. Wayne Miyao, Dr. Warren and Mrs. Claire Tamamoto, the Aiea Hongwanji Buddhist Women's Association, Mrs. Sugiko Tomori, and Mrs. Tamayo Matsumoto for their generous assistance and support.

Without question, May 24, 2026, will long be remembered by the 200+ people gathered that day at Pearl Harbor National Monument as a historic and meaningful step toward reconciliation and lasting world peace. A special acknowledgement of Pacific Historic Parks, CEO Ms. Aileen Utterdyke and Staff, for their support of the ceremony at Pearl Harbor. Visitors are encouraged to stop by the Pearl Harbor Visitor Center, where a new display now features Sadako's paper crane, including two cranes folded by the Abes and donated to Pearl Harbor.

Our convention theme, "Live Peace, Live Aloha, Live as One in the Nembutsu," is reflected here. The sky-blue color of the Monto-Shikisho evokes Hawaii's clear skies. Its design features the red ohia Lehua blossom, a sacred native flower of Hawaii. A background pattern of origami cranes symbolizes peace. This imagery portrays the Ohia Lehua blooming beneath the Hawaiian sky, with cranes—universal symbols of peace—gracefully soaring above.

The 18th World Buddhist Women's Convention's Commemorative Shikisho costs \$60.00, and Wagesa for the minister is \$300.00.
