Fury at building ban plan

PROPERTY owners stand to lose hundreds of thousands of dollars under a controversial proposal by Cessnock City Council.

Its draft Cessnock Local Environment Plan, 2008, includes a plan that would strip the building rights from some blocks smaller than 40.5ha.

Wollombi Real Estate agent Steve Annis-Brown said some land owners would be unable to build anything more than a shed on their

properties if the changes went through.
"The thing is that people bought these blocks of land with a legal entitlement to be able to apply to build on them," he said.

"They paid a price reflecting that entitlement so now if that entitlement is taken away then obviously the value of their block of land is diminished substantially, and I mean by 80 per cent.

"If you can't build on a block of land, the land is really of no value for any other use or purpose."
